Green light for community complex

A new £4.5 million community complex in Borehamwood housing a library, youth facility and museum has been given the green light.

The central location next to All Saints Church in Borehamwood will also include a multipurpose community hall plus spaces for training, meetings, internet and conference use.

The development will enable the county council to replace the existing library in Elstree Way with one in the centre of the community, as part of the Libraries for the 21st Century strategy. It will also allow the council to replace the facilities formerly provided by the Lair Youth Centre on the old Lyndhurst School site – again in a central location.

"We're very pleased to have been given the go-ahead to create a modern and convenient library, youth services and other facilities in the heart of the local community," said County Councillor Keith Emsall, Executive Member for Community Safety and Culture.

"Thanks to all the partners involved in helping bring this project to life and for the individual funding contributions they have made to create this innovative community facility for all." Planning permission was granted by Hertsmere Borough Council on September 2 for development on the site, which is owned by two Church of England trusts. County council plans for the building include a library and museum at the front, and a community hall with meeting and activity rooms for the provision of Youth Connexions services, which will also be available for use by the wider community, at the rear.

Older people will benefit too as the new development will provide facilities for various recreational and cultural activities including exercise classes and indoor bowls as well as offer a place for older people to meet.

Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council have contributed towards the provision of an improved museum facility. Other key contributors and partners include Hertsmere Borough Council, East of England Development Agency, church authorities, and the trustees of the land.

Hertfordshire County Council is providing more than £3 million for the project, partly funded by income from the sale of surplus assets. Additional contributions totalling £1.3 million have come from other sources helping to foot the bill, including a grant of £600,000 from the East of England Development Agency and money from a Section 106 planning agreement.

Once the development is open to the public and established in the local community, additional income will be generated from hiring charges.

Work is expected to start on site in the autumn 2010, with the complex scheduled to open in December 2011.



Hats off to 125th Anniversary!

As the new Headteacher at St Nicholas I feel privileged to have started my post in the year in which the school celebrated its 125th anniversary.

To celebrate this auspicious occasion there was a church service on the 4th December 2009 at which we were honoured to have the Archdeacon of St. Albans the Venerable Jonathan Smith. In order to make the whole day more memorable the staff and children dressed in Victorian costume and the school commissioned a company to produce a special 125th medallion, which each pupil and staff member received.

The church service was followed by refreshments in the school hall and then afterwards the school's Parents and Friends Association hosted a St Nicholas Christmas Fayre.

Sadly there is very little archived information or photos of the school since 1884. However, I have been very kindly assisted by Borehamwood Museum who had some historic resources, which have been loaned to us. Apparently the original school was built in 1882-3 and opened in 1884 thanks to Henry Hucks Gibbs who lived at Aldenham House.

The original school site was on Elstree High Street and then around 1966-67 building works commenced of phase one of the new school where it stands today. The old rectory was pulled down to make way for our then new school. At that time the headteacher was Mr K.G. Shenton.

During the excavation of the site the workmen found a 14th century well which Reverend Lawrence Woods, Rector of Elstree Parish Church (1946-1973) believed was the water supply for the various rectories which stood there in 1360! An article published in The District Post in 1967 mentioned that the well would probably be incorporated into a small ornamental garden. Over 40 years later the well is still to be seen.

An old memory book dated March 1967 incorporates writing and pictures about the new school building produced by the

Another child wrote:'...and when we got inside we went to Mrs Knox's class and the milk did not come so we had to have cocoa and the field was covered in snow.'

An old newspaper article refers to the opening of the new school on 28th March 1967 by the Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, Major-General Sir George Burns. The Bishop of St Albans, the Rt. Reverend Edward Michael Gresford Jones also attended this special day and chatted to the children.

We are fortunate that Borehamwood Museum kindly gave us some old school photographs of the children in the old school house.

If you have any memories, information, old photos, newspaper articles etc on our school we would love to hear from you so that we can develop our archived materials for future generations.

Celebrating 100 years

In planning our year of celebrations to mark the 100th birthday of All Saints Church, Shenley Road we thought it important to capture the community spirit on which it was built.

The records from the 1890s reveal the wave of popular support, and how people enthusiastically came together from across the community to organise concerts, events and sales of work to help make it happen. The rest is now history, which we mark this year by celebrating the achievements and experience of the past, the energy and skills within the town today, and by building for the future in the spirit our forebears built All Saints.

We opened in March on a grand scale, with an evening of music and song led by a 175 piece orchestra, wind ensemble and choir of high school students from New Jersey, USA. It was a magnificent collaborative event shared with the Town Council and Allum Hall, and one we hope to repeat.

In June, we joined with the Town Council in fielding a centenary float, notable not so much for its decoration, but the opportunity for longstanding residents and representatives of some of the


nationalities now resident in
Borehamwood, to lead the parade.
During the festival All Saints hosted a
number of additional events, which
showcased some of the talented musical and
performing arts group's active in the town. The
Museum kindly put together a 'Through the Years'
exhibition on the life of the Village Hall, which
captured the story of its 84 years of service, and
joined with the Library Service and our project
manager to display the new community facility
planned for its replacement. The hall closed with a
nostalgic 'Hop' to celebrate its contribution through
the music of the generations who used it, and as a
parting farewell 84 helium balloons were released

Throughout the summer All Saints has been open on the first Saturday of the month for coffee, and we can now look forward for work to begin on the new community facility.

In the autumn we have a historical exhibition and floral display planned for the last weekend in October, and the Centenary Service of thanksgiving and rededication on Sunday 31st October.

issues and family breakdown.


Volunteers visit one family for a couple of hours each week offering them support, encouragement and friendship. In return volunteers benefit by gaining experience, confidence and making new friends.

Neighbourhood Watch

Neighbourhood Watch is a growing band of concerned residents who really care about their neighbourhood.

The main purpose is to create friendly and safe communities and to help the police by providing information that could possibly be the last piece of the puzzle which enables them to make an arrest. Hertsmere covers Borehamwood, Elstree, Bushey, Radlett, Shenley and Potters Bar.

During the Summer of 2009 we launched Dog Watch at a Dog Show in Bushey Park where we signed up 56 dog owners as members. The idea being that dog walkers walk at different times of the day to most residents and in areas where other residents don't visit. In this way they should be able to spot unusual happenings and dumped refuse and report them to the police. This launch was so successful that we decided to do it again in Borehamwood at Meadow Park on the 3rd July, Family Day. Unfortunately it was a very hot day and there were few dogs around but still we managed to sign up another 22 members. In Potters Bar on Fun Day which took place on the 10th July, another boiling hot day, we managed to sign up a further 10 Members. And it hasn't stopped there as many residents from all areas are phoning in to join up.

Horse Watch was launched on 13th July for farms, stables and private individuals and so far we have managed to recruit 17 members and this is still ongoing.

WIZO mums leave their children behind to help the children of Israel

20 British women traveled to Israel to participate in a six-day challenge to transform the lives of vulnerable women and children across Israel.

Eight participants from Elstree and Borehamwood were part of the sponsored venture, 'The Aviv Challenge' who worked hands on for WIZO, the Women's international Zionist Organisation. The UK's flagship project, The Rebecca Sieff Centre in the heart of Jerusalem, encompasses Europe's largest day care centre for children, a vocational centre and also provides a refuge for women suffering from domestic violence.

The UK team were taken completely out of their comfort zone with a variety of different projects, including creating a garden in the refuge, developing an outside eating and play areas, and creating paintings and murals. They also spent time working with youngsters teaching them traditional English recipes and running arts and crafts.

The team have already raised in excess of £35,000 and are planning to raise much more since returning home to help WIZO provide essential social welfare services throughout Israel.

Elstree resident, Nicky Miller, Chairman of WIZO AVIV commented: "We are delighted to been able to take part in the Aviv Challenge and raise such vital funds for WIZO's work in Israel. This is the first time we have hosted a charity challenge and we are grateful to all of our participants who have left their children in the capable hands of husbands and loved ones and set off to help those women and children less fortunate than themselves. As Israel enjoys being a modern day country, it also needs to endure the complexities of modern day life and we hope that the Aviv Challenge will help them become a small step closer to meeting these needs."

Hertswood School and Yavneh College join forces for the Affinity Project

The Affinity Project draws together gifted writers and talented artists from Hertswood School and Yavneh College.

The project has involved Year 7 pupils from both schools working together to write and illustrate short stories on the theme of 'bullying'. Over the course of the project, each group of pupils has visited the other group's school and spent time getting to know each other a little better. The project recently culminated in an event performance in the ARK theatre at Hertswood School,



where the pupils read extracts from their stories to an audience of parents, teachers and local guests of honour and reflected upon the impact that the project had had upon their understanding of each other's school. Typical of these comments was one from a Year 7 pupil who said, 'I came into this project wanting to get writing experience but left it with new friends who, if I had seen them in the street, I never would have spoken to.' Further joint projects are now underway.

Farewell to Mary

On 19th August, over a hundred friends and family gathered to pay their last respects to Mary MacKay.

They bid a fond farewell to a dear lady, who had died the previous week, aged 86. Tributes were made recalling her devotion to her family, and her involvement in so many aspects of community life, which had made her such a well-loved figure.

Mary grew up in Harrogate, where she trained to be a teacher. Soon after qualifying, she moved to Borehamwood, where she began her lifelong association with Parkside School. Following her marriage to Alec, Mary stayed at home to raise the family, Roderick, Peter, and Helen, before returning to teaching. Eventually she became the well-respected Head of Parkside School and, later, a devoted grandmother and great-grandmother.

Mary's hand seemed to be everywhere in the community. She had a great interest in craft and sewing, and was involved in the setting up of the Well End Craft Group, as well as being an active member of Elswood Embroiderers. She was also a member of the Borehamwood Garden Society and the Shenley Horticultural Society, and a stalwart of the local Women's Institute, where she was secretary for many years.

Barbara Norman, who knew Mary as a dear friend for more than 30 years, recalls: "Mary was a very hard working, loyal and diligent member of any organisation that she joined, and could always be relied on to 'help out'. She lived for her family, craft and sewing. I will miss her a lot."

Mary may have passed on, but she will be remembered with warmth and affection by all who had the privilege of knowing her.

New vehicle for Hertsmere Community Transport

A new wheelchair accessible car is available to Hertsmere residents who are also wheelchair users and unable to transfer into an ordinary car. Although it may be possible for Hertsmere Community Transport to provide a volunteer driver it is more usual for relatives or friends to take on this role. 'We show people how to use the wheelchair restraints and then they have a short drive to familiarise themselves with the car' says Ann Donato, Chief Officer of Hertsmere Community Transport.'

Hertsmere Community Transport also has two low floor wheelchair accessible minibuses used to deliver a door to door Shopper Scheme for those with poor mobility. This is well used in Elstree and Borehamwood where 2,708 passenger journeys were undertaken last year. These take place on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday mornings.

Other service run by Hertsmere Community Transport is the Community Car Scheme which has been in operation since 2001. It matches volunteers who use their own cars with people who request transport because of poor mobility or other special needs. Priority is



given to attending medical appointments but trips can be made to Support Groups, Care Homes and other leisure destinations.

'We are always in need of volunteer drivers' says Ann Donato 'and because we pay expenses no-one should be out of pocket.' For more information about Hertsmere Community Transport, please contact Ann on 020 8207 5055.

Sexual violence is recognised as both a consequence and cause of gender inequality and it cuts across age, race, class, ethnicity, faith and disability.



Film heritage

Elstree and Borehamwood has an unrivaled film and television heritage in Europe and was once known as the 'Hollywood of England' with some justification.

The dream factories once employed over 2,000 people at any given time and have produced thousands of films and countless television programmes. Even stars who did not work here have visited from Charlie Chaplin in the 1930s to Michael Jackson in the 1980s.

Over the decades Shenley Road became accustomed to seeing the screen greats whether it was Sophia Loren dining at the local Italian restaurant to Harrison Ford buying a newspaper in the newsagents across from Elstree studios.

The Beatles came in 1963 to appear on The Morecambe and Wise TV show and in 1966 the England world cup squad called in at the old ATV studio complete with the newly won World Cup trophy.

Local streets and parks have provided locations for everybody from East Enders to the 'On The Buses' movies and MacDonalds, when it was the Red Lion pub, included amongst it's customers Errol Flynn, Robert Mitchum, Tony Hancock and Trevor Howard.

At one time Elstree studios had been responsible for the six top grossing films of all time in the shape of the original Star Wars and Indiana Jones trilogies and many legendary directors have worked in the town including John Ford, Alfred Hitchcock, Steven Spielberg, Stanley Kubrick and George Lucas.

Today the BBC Elstree Centre is home to the highly successful 'EastEnders' and 'Holby City' whilst Elstree Studios continues to play host to many famous names recording pop videos, television programmes and making films.

This rich heritage stretching back nearly 100 years will be the subject of future articles in Town Crier so until then happy cinemagoing.
