

Since the last edition of the Town Crier Town Council leader Sandra Parnell and I have seen many of the social care projects we have initiated come to fruition. All of these projects have been



supported by our Town colleagues in a variety of ways. It has only been possible to undertake these projects because of partnership working and funding from a variety of sources. Partnership working brings together a whole range of statutory bodies: the police, the Borough, Herts County Council, Youth Connexions, Young Carers in Herts and the voluntary sector such as Cross Roads. The Carers Coffee morning at Maxwell is well established. The Inclusion Project took 18 months to get off the ground and this amount of time has seen the build up to the Young Carers project.

Summerswood Children bringing joy to soldiers in Sierra Leone

Hertfordshire's Armed Forces Community Covenant hosted a Christmas competition for key stage 2 children last December, to send pictures and messages of support to local troops from the 254 Medical Regiment who are currently

working in Sierra Leone to tackle the Ebola outbreak.

The competition, which was themed 'Helping others at Christmas', received an overwhelming response with over a thousand entries from 450 Hertfordshire schools. A shortlist of fifty entries was flown to Sierra Leone to be judged by troops who would be away from home over the Christmas period. The Regimental Sergeant Major in Sierra Leone said that

'all the soldiers thoroughly enjoyed voting on their

favourites, they found it difficult at first as all the art work was fantastic in their own right. All the artwork was then displayed around the tents to remind the troops that children at home in Hertfordshire were thinking of them.

The winning entry was created by Netra Chiliveri, a Year 6 pupil from Summerswood Primary School. RSM Graham Miller from the 254 Regiment, along with County Councillor Alan Plancey and Andrew Williams from Serco, attended the school's assembly on Monday 19th January to celebrate their success. Having won the competition, Summerswood Primary School has been awarded a brand new Apple iPad which was kindly donated by Serco. In addition, County Councillor Alan Plancey has donated £1,000 from his Locality Budget towards the school's new Library to thank all the children from the school for taking part in the competition.

Summerswood celebrates 30 years

On the 12th December Summerwoood School head, Sarah Kneller, hosted a special celebration of two important events in the history of the School. 30 years ago Summerswood School was rebuilt after a fire had damaged the previous building. A plaque commemorates that building and was unveiled by Town Mayor, Cllr Pat Strack, who has been a governor at the school for over 30 years. Present Chair of Governors, Scott Simpson, unveiled the plaque on the new block which has been erected to accommodate the change from a 1FE to 2FE school.

Many ex pupils also had the opportunity to be guided around the school by present day Year 6 students. A group of ex-students from Hertswood Academy reported that 'they had revived many fond memories and talked about their past experiences.'

The celebrations ended with cupcakes baked for all by school cook, Mrs. Bone. There was great excitement as balloons were released and family, friends, staff and pupils all danced and cheered. Summerwood pupils and staff sang a special song for the occasion. Later the Christmas Fair provided a fitting conclusion to the day.

Celebrating a Second Century of Film-Making and Television Production

As announced in the Spring Edition of Town Crier, 2014 was a very special year for Elstree & Borehamwood, marking the anniversary of 100 years of film-making in the local studios.

With the active support of the Town Council, as well as other councils, community groups and commercial

enterprises, local volunteer group Elstree Screen Heritage set out to deliver an

extensive programme of events and publications designed to do justice to the Centenary.

In the end it was a close run thing, but in early December the tired old highway signs at key "gateways" into the Town had been replaced by 8 new bright blue signs designed to welcome visitors

as well as returning residents to "The Home of Film and Television". With the support of County Councillors and officers, Hertfordshire County Council added a long-lasting tribute to the achievements of the men and women who work in our local studios, past and present.

And just a week later, another two heritage panels were added to the Film and TV Heritage Trail. Standing by the Eldon Avenue gates to the BBC Elstree Centre, these panels mark the site of the Neptune Studios where film-making started in the Town and describe how that original site has been home to a series of studios, including ATV and now, of course, the BBC.

Jointly funded by Hertsmeres Cllr. Cohen and the BBC, these panels were unveiled with the enthusiastic assistance of the BBC's Head of History, Robert Seatter, and actress Annette Badland, currently appearing in EastEnders as "Aunt Babe".

While that completed the programme which was planned for 2014, it's important that this Centenary milestone continues to be remembered. Film and TV activity in the Town keeps growing. Elstree Studios is increasing its capacity while the BBC Elstree Centre is now well into a multi-year redevelopment to transform its site. The BBC will also be reminding us that 2015 is the 30th anniversary of the ever-popular EastEnders.

Meanwhile, the Town Council has agreed to support further work to make the Town more attractive and to add to the Film and TV Heritage

Trail. Additional improvements will be carried out at the Allum Lane Gateway by the railway bridge and a new heritage panel will be designed and installed.

Elsewhere another heritage panel, celebrating the achievements of famed Director Alfred Hitchcock, will be unveiled. The Film & TV Heritage Trail is a unique and large investment; The Town Council will continue to inspect and clean the panels as required.

But we can do more to build on this investment, and in 2015 Elstree Screen Heritage will add Quick Recognition (QR) codes to each panel so that anyone with a smartphone or tablet computer can readily connect to the internet and find more information about the person or studio featured on each panel.

Finally, a key element of the legacy of the Centenary programme was the creation of a 90-minute-long documentary called From Borehamwood To Hollywood. Narrated by Barbara Windsor and local film historian Paul Welsh, this feature-length film charts the extraordinary story of 100 years of film-making, with extracts from interviews with men and women who worked in the studios. Over 700 people saw the film last year and in 2015 Elstree Screen Heritage will host regular screenings at the local Community Centre, 96 Shenley Road.

Compost Corner

A Melrose Allotment Holders View John and Dorina Pop



John and Dorina Pop are a remarkable Romanian couple who deservedly won the Melrose Allotments cup for 'Best Plot' in 2014. They were surprised to win it, but John was keen to point out that it was down to both their efforts. John built their very sturdy poly tunnel (more like a poly 'room'), and also rigged up a watering system to make life easier, while Dorina carefully grew and potted out the seeds & seedlings. Together they dig, plant out, nurture and harvest their organically grown fruit and vegetables despite them both working long hours in full time jobs. During the summer months they like to come down to work on the allotment after work because it is so relaxing and sometimes they don't get home until 10 or 11 p.m.

Even in winter there are still cabbages, onions, and potatoes to enjoy, and the stored potatoes will keep them going until next month. Having the poly tunnel makes it possible to make an early start with seedlings so they get the most out of their allotment and growing time. Being vegetarian, Dorina noticed the difference in the taste of the fruit and veg sold in shops, and as they are used to eating quality produce from their farm and orchards in Romania, John set about finding somewhere they could grow their own. Yellow beans in particular were a missed and longed for legume.

Just the other day, John ate the last of their tomatoes grown in 2014. Some of their crop was picked whist still green and put up onto a high cupboard to slowly ripen in the rising warm air. Last year John grew a 750g tomato (that's nearly a bag of sugar in weight!). I encouraged them to enter the Produce & Craft Show held in Allum Lane Community Centre later in the year. With their cabbage, they make sauerkraut which I'm told is very healthy for the body and good for the digestion. With the quantity of sauerkraut they make, John devised and made a 'cabbage plane' so that large quantities of cabbage could be shredded in one sitting. A different speciality cabbage dish served over Christmas

is a mixture of rice and mushrooms (or meat) wrapped in cabbage leaves like little parcels, and flavoured with lots of home grown herbs.

They are advocates for healthy eating, and caring for the soil and environment, and have generously shared what they grow with family, friends, and allotment neighbours. They explain that this is quite usual in Romania, and when I mention (unfairly) that perhaps we can be somewhat lazier, Dorina responds by saying that people don't realise what they can do. If they could just see what can be done, and learn how, then everything is possible. There is a genuine warmth and abundance that John and Dorina generate and share. Along side this, they are always willing to spend time encouraging others and teaching them what they know how to do so well. Their allotment is already dug and waiting for planting....so they must have some time on their hands...NOT!:)

Gardening and Allotment Tips: February

With luck, we will get a glimpse of the early signs of spring this month. The soil begins to warm up around the middle of February and we can see the buds beginning to swell.

- After the middle of the month think about sowing the seeds of early vegetables.
- February is the best month to plant garlic and shallots.
- Top dress all of the fruit trees and soft fruit bushes with a general fertiliser.
- Prune late fruiting raspberries down as low as possible and mulch around them.

EastEnders Celebrated 30 years Last Week 3 Decades of History and a Future Indefinitely at Elstree.

30 years ago EastEnders was nothing more than a plot of land behind the old ATV studios in Borehamwood. Now Hertsmere Borough Council have granted planning permission for the BBC to develop the studio and with it EastEnders has the potential for a limitless long term future. In celebration we take a look back at the enduring show that surpassed all possible expectation and outgrew its own studio.

'It stinks' were the first ever words EastEnders broadcast to the nation upon its debut on the 19th of February 1985. Not the usual endearing greeting one associates with infancy but so reflective of the humble and subversive roots EastEnders was built on. Created in part to steal the coveted viewers tuning in en masse to ITV's Coronation Street, and to present working class issues more representative of the audiences watching, EastEnders quickly became a ratings hit. The television legacy that has resulted from this gamble was a surprise to the cast and crew just as it was to the production team at Elstree. They never did get the time to improve the set.

The EastEnders set, or as it is known to us locally, Clarendon Road Borehamwood, was never designed with any kind of permanency. Especially not with the production capability to film 120 hrs a year of broadcast material sustainably. Not until now. With Hertsmere Council's backing, scheduled for a 2018 completion, this epic set expansion will see a new Albert Square re-built 20% larger with new locations to emphasize and reflect what executive producer Dominic Treadwell-Collins says is London's creeping gentrification. 'You'll see the edges of Shoreditch creeping into EastEnders'. A refurbished Queen Vic and new high street are among the expected modifications.

This is a three phase re-homing and will involve building a temporary filming space, external to the production studio in the car park, whilst the show's permanent dwelling will be re-built over the current set.

from Granada studios to Media City in Salford Quays, the new EastEnders set will stay in Borehamwood for the foreseeable future.

The existing buildings will be replicated, made roomier and younger, and with its new facelift the show will provide a greater sense of scale, and be able to meet the future demand of technology and the big current one –to Film in HD. High Definition has fast become synonymous for a show's guaranteed lifespan of longevity. With this upgrade EastEnders has cemented its indefinite creative future and perhaps most resonant of all- a future set potentially to be forever linked to our Hertfordshire. A future of 'Viability and Vitality' –to quote the BBCs planning application.

To proudly celebrate the past 30 years, and mark the beginning of another 30, the BBC screened a week of live material. Even soap opera naysayers daren't resist seeing the show's longest running character lan –romantically doomed Beale- actually find love in re-marriage to Jane. Iconic screen legend Barbara Windsor returned with the usual restraint and timidness one expects from a Mitchell and we can finally stop playing detective as that epic who murdered Lucy murder mystery was finally solved. And no it doesn't even matter that no one in the country could even stand Lucy.

The commitment involved in making these live episodes prevailed with emotional truths and artistic intention that signal the attempt at a creation of, if anything, a new television legacy. Strong enough to last another 30 years and one soon to be created from an even better home.

No one knows what EastEnders last words of transmission will be but, as shown by the hugely ambitious live elements of last week and with Hertsmere Council supporting its continued development, they certainly are set to be miles apart from its very first.

Happy Anniversary EastEnders. Here's looking forward to another 30 years at your Borehamwood home.



Fr. Dominic McKenna celebrates 20 years since his ordination

I was born in Dublin in 1950 and having partially completed my University studies came to England, to the University of Hull and Endsleigh College of Education in 1971. Having gained my Bachelor of Education I came to Hackney in London, to teach in Cardinal Pole Catholic Comprehensive School.

I spent a wonderful fifteen years there enjoying the pupils, the staff and the whole atmosphere of educating young people. It was a real privilege seeing them grow into responsible, caring adults able to take their place in society.

After fifteen years I felt a draw, or a calling to try my vocation as a priest, which was something that had been strong in my childhood. I applied to the Diocese of Westminster and to my surprise was accepted at the ripe old age of thirty nine. I studied at Allen Hall for five years and gained my degree in Sacred Theology. For three years of my formation I worked in Our Lady of Hal in Camden Town. I was ordained a Priest in November 1994 and was Assistant Priest in Dollis Hill for three years and was then moved to Camden Town as Parish Priest and remained there for thirteen years. It was a great parish to work in with lots of challenges and excitement. My desire to build a caring compassionate community really drove me and the outreach to the homeless, the drug addicts and the poor was supported by the whole community.

In May 2010 I was asked to go to Borehamwood as there was an urgent need for a priest. I must admit that I had to look up Borehamwood on a map as I had no clue where it was. I was very pleasantly surprised and very quickly was made to feel at home. Two very beautiful churches and a growing congregation made it a place with many opportunities to build community and bring people together.

A wonderful parish school, St. Teresa's, and a very active parish with lots of volunteers was a real blessing. The Parish Centre, as a venue to gather people, has been a real godsend. With Quiz nights, International Lunches, Auction nights, Family Parties, Family Sunday Lunches, and much more it has given us a real identity as Catholics in Borehamwood. The efforts of a group of parents to establish a Youth Club at the Crypt in the Church in Rossington Avenue has been a real highlight in the last year and I pray hard for it to be successful.

The celebration of the Sacraments is, of course, the life blood of any parish and we are very lucky here to have four Masses every weekend with an attendance of just under a thousand people. At the moment we are baptising about ninety children and there are always a handful of adults received in to the church each Easter. We are preparing sixty six children for First Holy Communion and forty for Confirmation this year which is a real blessing. This is on top of all the courses and programmes to increase knowledge of the faith. It is a very busy parish with many committed people.

But, without caring for the poor and disadvantaged we are not fulfilling our Christian Mission of bringing the 'Good News to the Poor'. We are very pleased to be able to host the Borehamwood Foodbank warehouse on our land, and to support its volunteers along with financial help through Caritas. We also support, through a 'Rich Man Poor Man' meal, a group of Missionary Sisters working on unofficial locations in Add South Africa. There are also many other charities we support which helps us to fulfil our mission.

I am so lucky to have had two major jobs in my life which have given

me such satisfaction. To be able to walk with people in their happy times and in their saddest and most difficult times is a real privilege and a very humbling experience. To sit with a family as a loved one dies and to be with them in their grief and pain is awe inspiring. I am so surprised that I have completed twenty years as a priest, even though in my head I am only nineteen. I hope to be in Borehamwood for many years but it is never my decision. However, I am enjoying myself and hope that the parish will continue to thrive.

NCS with Youth Connexions Hertfordshire



During the autumn half term, 12 young people from Borehamwood took part in the National Citizen Service (NCS) programme delivered by Hertfordshire County Council Youth Connexions, where they learnt new skills and enjoyed a positive, 'life changing' experience.

The participants went to the Danbury Centre in Essex (part of Essex Outdoors) for the residential element of the programme where they took part in a range of activities designed to build their confidence and to develop new skills. Activities included low ropes courses, mountain biking, rock climbing, treehouse building, canoeing and enjoying evenings round a campfire.

Returning to Borehamwood the group spent 3 days working together and writing up diaries, reflecting on their experiences and engaging in other team building activities.

The young people then began work on the Social Action project, a key element in the NCS programme. The group divided into two teams and researched what charities/good causes there were in the locality which

Inclusion Project

Partnership working with Cllr Pat Strack, Cllr Sandra Parnell, The Park EU School, Hertswood Academy, the Police and Connexions has seen this pilot project start in October. KS4 pupils excluded from school attend the Park EU in Potters Bar for 5 hours a day. Changes to bus timetables have increased the difficulty for the young people attending.

Phase 1: Each Monday and Tuesday mornings the young people are taken by taxi to the Park. This is funded by County.

At lunchtime the students are collected by minibus, by Connexions youth workers, from Potters Bar and brought to 96. A range of activities are provided: some skills building, some practical, some team building, some leading to qualifications. The young people are involved in choosing these activities. Targets are set by the Park for behaviour, attendance, engagement at school and homework. This project was funded by a £3k grant from the Police County Commissioner.

Phase 2: will see the number increase to 14 including KS3 pupils. Extra funding of £7k comes from the PCC grant scheme.

Easter holiday activities will be provided with a grant from County Cllr Alan Plancey of £1k and WIIS money from Cllrs Farida Turner, Susan Maughan and Clive Butchins.

could benefit from their help. Each team selected a good cause they believed needed assistance and in a 'dragons den' style exercise put forward their project proposal to the other group, youth leaders and managers. After deciding which project would benefit most, both teams came together to establish individual goals and targets as well as group ones.

Over the next few weekends the young people started raising money by asking companies in Borehamwood for raffle prizes, such as cinema tickets, Nandos vouchers and haircuts. The highlight of the raffle was a Youth Connexions shirt signed by Frankie of the Saturdays. One of the young people, Alexandra, is a very talented face painter and had a queue of people for the whole duration of the event. The Mayor of Borehamwood came down and got involved in the fair.

The culmination of their experience was a day spent at the New Court Place Care Home to talk with residents and proudly present their cheque for the handsome sum of £531.37

One participant, Jade, said of the NCS experience "You find out more about yourself and your capabilities, you find new friendships and companionships and people you can trust - it is great fun." Her team mate Camilla added "It gives teenagers the opportunity to meet new people and push themselves out of their comfort zones by doing different fun activities. It allows people the chance to discover new things about themselves and is a positive life changing event."



Where Does My Money Go...?

Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council: Finances for the Year Ahead

In January, the Town Council set its budget for the forthcoming Council Year 2015/2016. To keep down costs to an acceptable level, residents will only have to pay an annual increase of 49p for band D households.

The Council voted unanimously for this minor increase in order to maintain the same quality of service. Unlike other Councils, the Town Council receives no direct funding from central government and so is reliant on its share of the Council Tax (or "Precept") for service delivery. The other main source of Council income comes from its fees and charges, such as hiring Fairway Hall, selling tickets or collecting Allotment rents. Most Council events are free of charge for the public at the point of use - such as Fireworks Night and the rides and entertainments at Families Day. This is quite uncommon nationally and reflects the Town Council's commitment to provide high quality entertainment and events for all residents. But even where fees are charged these are at highly competitive rates and are some of the lowest in the County; coach tickets for seniors for day outings at just £6 each, concert tickets for big



acts like the BBC Band or American Bands at just £5 each and allotment rents that have not risen in over four years are subsidised by the Council to just £17.50 per year for the most popular sized plots (with a 50% discount for more senior plot holders).

The Council's Precept for 2015/2016 was set at £302,912 with a supplementary grant sought from Hertsmere Borough Council of £50,822. In effect, it represents a 2% increase for the Band D taxpayer from £24.60 in 2014/15 to £25.09 in 2015/16.

Town and Parish Councils continue to claim just 2% of the total Council Tax in Hertfordshire.
