

Town Defibrillator Project

During February the team unveiled nine plaques and installed nine defibrillators at Aberford Hall, Allum Hall, the BECC, The Community Shop, Leeming Rd, Hertswood Centre, Fairway Hall as well as Morrisons and Tesco.

Over 200 people have been trained in CPR and the use of defibrillators, free of charge. More free courses will be available in spring and summer.

Thank you for donations of defibrillators from AAH Pharmaceuticals,

Sigma Pharmaceuticals, Taylor Wimpey, Bio Products Laboratories, the Health & Well Being Fund, The British Heart Foundation and the Borehamwood Spiritual Centre. Grants and fundraising by the Team paid for the rest.

 $Town\ schools, sports\ clubs\ and\ gyms\ are\ our\ next\ targets. The\ government\ has\ negotiated\ a\ deal$

with the NHS where defibrillators for schools are half price, about £500. St Nicholas School has benefited from a county grant from County Cllr. Caroline Clapper to part fund a defibrillator for the school.

Borehamwood and Elstree Twin Town Association (BETTA) is a lively lady, born in 1982, who has managed to stay fashionable and entertaining ever since.


This year, continuing to enhance international relations between the UK, France and Germany, the association is organising visits to both our partner towns.

Compost Corner Mackerel, Potatoes, and Greens!

Regina, Ana and Sofia share their allotment stories with Anne.

It was like a big light bulb going on in Regina's head when her eldest daughter Ana (now 13), came home from primary school saying that one of the children in her class thought chips came from the freezer. Whilst of course that may be true in a way, and children are often literal, she went and got hold of a potato and planted it in the back garden, and from this grew eight more potatoes. Then together they decided how they were going to cook them. Regina and her husband are from Portugal, and whilst she grew up a city girl, Antonio was brought up by his grandparents in the rural north of Portugal where there was no need to buy their fruit, vegetables or even meat. It was all home produced.

After receiving lovely extra produce from their neighbour who had a veg patch in the back garden, and some from the friend of the neighbour who has an allotment at Allum Lane, Regina and Antonio knew it was the right thing for them and their two daughters Ana and Sofia to build on the time they spend together, with their busy lives and usual distractions of ipads, and TV. They both believed very strongly that getting out of their usual routines, and learning to respect nature and animals, would help the children appreciate and value the things in life.

They got their allotment at Melrose two years ago. Ana picks up the story, "I planted cucumbers, watermelon, melon, strawberries, blackberries, gooseberries, and raspberries on my patch, but the raspberries and strawberries were the only things that survived." "My patch is now a parking lot for the trailer" she says with a wry smile. Regina conscientiously provides the rationale, "We got the trailer so that we could collect manure from the local farm because it made the van we rented too smelly!" Regina explains, "the ground hasn't been worked properly for a long time, so it needs a lot of hard work getting it ready, and we are still not sure what grows well on our allotment".

Her freezer is full of the beans which she prepared and froze in portions saying that this makes life so much easier after a hard day working as a nurse. They also freeze leeks, carrots and tomatoes....and that's just the start! Antonio has a special patch for his herbs. As he is the chef in a busy upmarket restaurant, he likes to try out recipes at home (lucky them!).

They grow what they like to eat, and when they go on their camping holidays they always take their allotment grown vegetables with them. They tell me that there is nothing better than enjoying whatever you are having on the barbecue with some of your own potatoes and greens to go with it. Regina joins in with the throng of voices who declare knowingly that home grown produce has much more flavour than shop bought. Sofia who is going to be seven years old very soon says that she loves to grow sweetcorn best and that this year she also wants to grow tomatoes, courgettes, cucumbers and carrots. She even has her own fork, spade and gloves and shows me with pride a delightful picture of herself, standing on the newly dug earth of their allotment.

Aside from being a great family activity to enjoy, the children love to eat all the vegetables, and for Regina and Antonia it is a good way to wind down and relieve the stresses of work. They enjoy having conversations with the others in the allotment community, and swapping stories, like the time when they came upon a shoal of

mackerel being chased by bigger fish and they were literally leaping out of the sea in Blackpool. As well as being a fine tale, they had some fresh fish on the BBQ that evening, along with some of those delicious potatoes and greens. Oooo looo-verly!

Making a Good "First Impression"

Since May 2008 "First Impressions", a multi-agency group (Town, Borough and County Council, local group Elstree Screen Heritage and rail operator Thameslink), has been using film and TV images in public places to create a more welcoming first impression for visitors to Elstree & Borehamwood.

The Centenary Banners, the 25-plus panels in the Film and TV Heritage Trail, the iconic wall sculpture at Elstree & Borehamwood rail station and the new public planting are only some of the results which the combined efforts of this group have achieved.

At the start of 2016 the Project Board identified several new opportunities to make a big and lasting difference to very central places in the Town.

Late in December Thameslink's Passenger Service Director accepted our invitation to visit the station to see for himself the work done by the "First Impressions" project team and, in particular, the new planters put in place last summer by local volunteers, station staff, Town Council staff and members of the Town's Youth Council.



Since that visit an unsightly wall has been cleared and permission given by Thameslink to add new signage to this space which they have generously donated for the sole use of "First Impressions". The BBC is keen to welcome people who will be joining their audiences and have match-funded the Town Council's investment in this new signage.







But there's more to do! We now have funding to add another heritage panel to celebrate the contributions of film or TV stars who worked at the various local studios of Elstree & Borehamwood.

ELSTREE AND BOREHAMWOOD TOWN COUNCIL HONORARY FREEMAN SCROLLS

At the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 9 March the Town Council was proud to recognise two prominent residents who have gone beyond the call of duty in serving the community. For the first time in the Town Council's history it bestowed the very highest award that it can give to Bill Davies (the D Day veteran and chevalier de la Legion d'honneur) and Bob Redman (of First Impressions and Elstree Screen Heritage).

The award is Honorary Freemen of Elstree and Borehamwood.

Bill Davies: Bill passed away peacefully in January aged 96 and his wife Rene collected his freedom scrolls on his behalf. Bill, a veteran who helped to liberate France during the Second World War, had an incredibly full life. As a soldier of the First Battalion of the Coldstream Guards he served in France and Belgium and for his contribution was recognised by the French Government with the chevalier de la Legion d'honneur award. Bill and Rene were responsible for sending many food parcels to soldiers in Afghanistan, all at their own expense. Bill also spent much time visiting schools to help children learn about the history and sometimes the tragedy of war. A long serving member of the British Legion, Bill won the hearts and minds of the local community.

Bob Redman: After retiring in the mid 90's Bob met Paul Welsh and Elstree Screen Heritage came into being, a lifelong project for Bob involving some great names like Brian Blessed, Simon Pegg and Steven Spielberg. He spearheaded the relationship with the University of Hertfordshire resulting in 70 high quality filmed interviews with those with a film connection (from actors and set designers to those who really knew what was going on such as the tea ladies at MGM). As part of an initiative to win a grant, First Impressions was born to try to revive the town centre. As Chairman of that group Bob is instrumental, in partnership with other organisations like the BBC, Thameslink and the Town Council, in delivering the new look to the town with banners, planters, posters, commemorative film plaques and the tremendous improvements to the railway station concourse. A Town Councillor said "You just need to look anywhere in Borehamwood and you will see Bob's positive influence".









60 Years of the

The Festival began in 1956 to bring together the new and old communities of Elstree and Borehamwood, recognising the rapid expansion of the town in the immediate post-war years.

1956

It all started in 1956 with a Festival of Youth at the Borehamwood Football Ground, Eldon Avenue (now built on) commencing with a procession from Hillside School. The displays included Country Dancing, RAF Fighter Command Band and a United States Army Ceremonial Drill performed by a squad from Mildenhall, Suffolk.





1957

The Week was opened by the Festival Queen. Activities included a Fire Station Open Day and a parade led by the Uganda Band of the King's African Rifles. In those days, the parade started at Eldon Avenue and went along Shenley Road, Theobald Street, Aycliffe Road,

1958



Started with Arthur Askey Crowning the Festival Queen followed by a Festival

Buffet Supper at the Red Lion (now McDonalds). The following day there was a rededication of the War Memorial by the Shenley Road roundabout (having been moved from its original 1920s site outside what is now 'Sainsbury's' at the junction of Shenley Road and Theobald Street. Other events included Primary Schools Sports Day, Old Time Dance, Baby Show and a skiffle dance.

1959

Kicked off with an Old Time Ball at Shenley Hospital with tickets priced at four shillings each (20p). The Parade and Council procession took place on Saturday 27 June, with an evening Civic Reception and Ball at the APBC Studios with tickets priced at seven shillings and sixpence (37.5p). There was a Festival of Jazz in the Church Hall, Shenley Road and an Archery Contest. Highlights of the week included a grand whist drive, pushball competition, a Handel Bi-Centenary Concert at Furzehill School (now closed), athletics meeting at the Finsbury Sports Ground, Stirling Corner (now disused). Darts competition, camp fire sing song at the Allum Hall

Community Centre and a torchlight procession along Shenley Road at 10pm.



Civic Festival

1962

Housing development on the Borehamwood Football Ground, Eldon Avenue, meant a shift of activities to Ripon Park. The Festival Church Service and Flower Show made their debuts as regular Festival events. The Rock and Roll Youth Dance to the 'Flintstone' Band at the Three Ways Centre did not survive the test of time! 1963

The Swinging Blue Jeans performed at the Grand Festival Youth Dance at the Three Ways.

1965

An interesting selection of events included a combined Flower Show, Brains Trust and Fashion Show at Campions School and a highlight of Family Day was a display by Jerry Allen and his organ.

1974

The recently opened Civic Hall was used for a concert, film show and the Baby Show. Other events included a football match between Borehamwood Saints FC and Capital Radio.

1976

Civic Week was financed by Elstree Town Council but only included a Festival Queen Dance and competition, with the Parade and Families Day on the same day.



1977

Elstree Town Council decided to appoint a part time Festival Co-ordinator (Paul Welsh) and organise the Week with a volunteer committee. Many old and new events were introduced with a strong element of community involvement such as a darts competition, donkey derby, art competition, ramble, open days and football competitions.


From mid July a new exhibition will look at 'Down the Shops' and examines the way our shopping experience and the shops in Elstree and Borehamwood have changed through the years.





David Bowie

A challenger, a conquistador of normality, and creator of an ever changing exciting audacious culture, Bowie meant so much to anyone anywhere who ever felt they lived on the sidelines and he died, this January, two days after the release of his latest and-last ever -album. He always had to be one step ahead.

Before you throw away that blusher, spandex, and disconcertingly tight pair of trousers stop! There is something to consider: The world still needs a David Bowie. Among the millions of words and myriad of outfit homages that have emerged since his death few touch upon the actual Bowie legacy.

Born David Jones in Brixton, to a family with no musical ties, Bowie didn't like his singing voice and hated dancing. He explained once, during an interview with Parkinson, that his artistic creativity and otherworldliness stemmed from his mother's renditions of choirboy Ernest Lough and the unexpected high D note in the 1947 film Tubby the Tuba. True or not, what is clear is that Bowie transformed himself, through a talent born of longing and from one entirely self-made.

He demonstrated, just within his two visits to Borehamwood, that nothing was outside the realms of possibility. Bowie came here in 1977 to record the unlikely duet with Bing Crosby Little Drummer Boy/Peace on Earth, and in 1986 to perform in Jim Henson's now iconic film - Labyrinth. Lycra clad and crystal ball swirling he came to us to work onscreen with puppets as Jareth the singing king of the Goblins. Always proving that he was open to an array of experiences and inspirations that very few would ever consider credible.

Bowie's true legacy was his ability to be inspired by and inspire others. For him everything was possible and there was no right path to follow. True talent is bold. It doesn't obey contract laws struts its stuff and challenges identity norms. So will the next David Bowie please stand up. Be daring, quit that arduous day job, don't always make sense, put your red heels on and dance.



Tapestries of Faith

The Town Council supports the freedom of residents to chose a faith or to have none and it is proud of the rich tapestry of religious groups within the local community, including those that meet at Fairway Hall such as the Radlett Reform Synagogue and the Borehamwood Islamic Centre.

A Message From Rev Dr Didzis Stilve

Increasingly, we all become theologians. We are sort of forced to.

More and more we are introduced to various interpretations of religious texts - and the difference between them. We are so intensely aware where various religious ideas can lead – to spread terror or to reconciliation and peace. Let us remember, this interpretation used to be what professional theologians were preoccupied with.

But what is this academically sounding thing - theology - anyway?

One rarely comes across an idea that preoccupies one's mind for a long time. I had this 'aha' moment recently when I came across Martin Luther's – a 16th century theologian's - view of what theology is all about. It is basically dealing with two major things – (1) humans, who sin and (2) God who justifies the sinner. Before we object that this sounds way too narrow and shallow, we need to ask: what is the main problem of humankind? What is most visible and most often denied thing in the world? Is it not the sin? What is the greatest cure to this problem – God who justifies the sinner? Agreed, theology has often been preoccupied with all kinds of things but, in this time of confusion, it needs to be with basic problems - what matters the most.

Thus, humans sin, and God justifies sinners. But not only humans should be justified. In the face of tragedies that are happening around us all the time it seems that God also has some explaning to do. When we, in the face of all these meaningless tragedies and nonsense, ask God what He has done – His answer is – "I died for you." That, indeed, takes accusations of God being passive out of humans' mouths.

Truly, we all are shaped more and more into theologians. Not just by knowledge, but by the very life we live in this fallen and confused world. Therefore it is important to be clear about this simple truth of humans who sin and God who justifies.

George Harrison's Gift to Hare Krishna and Western Culture

You know, once you get chanting, then things start to happen transcendentally.' George Harrison. (1985)

An oasis of spiritual inspiration, the Bhaktivedanta Manor estate in Aldenham Hertfordshire was donated by George Harrison in 1973 and is now the largest UK centre of the International Society for Krishna Consciousness (ISKCON)

The first overt sign of George Harrison's quest for spirituality materialised on the 1965 Beatles track 'Norwegian Wood'. Already inspired by Indian classical musician Ravi Shankar, and supposedly spurred on by Lennon to play the 'De dee dee bit' on the Sitar, George conceded and played it admittedly semi-shoddily, and in doing so the single became the first ever Western pop record released to feature the sitar.

It may have started with the incorporation of an Indian instrument in aid of servicing a Western song but after the Beatles' 1966 visit to India it developed into a genuine interest in exploring Hinduism and Indian culture. Intended as a trip for relaxation and exploration the Beatles were initially greeted by 600 screaming fans at the airport and unrelentingly later at their hotel. It's not hard to see why the teachings of simplicity and peaceful spiritual revolution by the founder of the Hare Krishna movement, Bhaktivedanta Swami Srila Prabhupada,

would have appealed to them, and particularly George, as a chance for peace of mind away from spotlights, sycophants, and media speculation.

Determined to hold on to the experiences of Indian spirituality, the Beatles returned donning Indian style bright clothing, advocating meditation and devotion, and quoting religious proverbs.

For most of his band mates, and the west, this immersion and alternative way of thinking was temporary, a fad, short lived and superficial, but for George this trip to India permanently changed his life and he became, and remained, deeply involved in the Hare Krishna consciousness movement right up until his death in 2001. He was the driving force of the Beatles' spiritual guest of the 1960s and because he was part of the most popular, powerful, and influential pop cultural force the world has ever known, his thoughts and actions have influenced millions of people around the world. Shaping the way we look at God, gurus, and life for decades to come.

The Holly Bush

This has changed ownership. The new owners have installed caretakers on site and renovations are about to begin.

Reviva Waste Station, Elstree Hill

An HBC Environmental Health Officer has been in touch with those who have given statements to check on their availability to appear in court as witnesses. There was a case review meeting between the parties on the 14th April. The compost heaps have been reduced in size and the amount of waste received at REVIVA has decreased.

Aldenham Reservoir

The new owners are Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd., a company owned by the Gosrani Brothers. Signs have been erected around the Lake. Liberty Aldenham is in the process of making a new application to HBC for planning permission on their site at Watford Road. If they are successful they will work with stakeholders to set up a Trust with a remit to preserve the Reservoir and manage the environs.

Footpath round the Lake

The decision whether the footpath around the lake should be a public Right of Way is still with Herts County Council.

The Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society

The Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society continues to campaign for the preservation of our countryside and the protection of our twin settlements during a time of rapid growth and change.

We are particularly concerned over the preservation of Aldenham Reservoir which we believe constitutes the 'Very Special Circumstances' which would justify building houses in the Watford Road site opposite.

We work with Elstree Village Preservation Society, Radlett Village Society and Shenley Village Society on common interests.

Woodcock Hill Village Green

The WHVG committee has been working hard on the field preparing for the Beacon lighting event 21/4/16.

Mindfulness

What is Mindfulness? Well put simply, it is a mental state achieved by focusing awareness on the present moment, while acknowledging and accepting our feelings, thoughts, and bodily sensations. Mindfulness encourages a 'moment-to-moment' psychological awareness of one's experience without judgment.

Mindfulness skills can be taught and used therapeutically. Via guided meditation, people can learn to incorporate the strategies into their day-to-day life. Mindfulness meditation focuses on training one's attention and awareness, in order to bring mental processes under greater voluntary control and thereby enhance mental well-being. It encourages 'being' rather than 'doing' and this in turn can promote calmness, clarity and concentration (Walsh & Shapiro, 2006).

Some of the reported benefits of mindfulness meditation include increased focus, and enhanced enjoyment of everyday activities. It can also reduce stress, help people to cope with daily challenges, help to manage anxiety and physical pain, and increase positive engagement with family and work life.




Family Holiday Lunches





Annual Report 2015/2016



Mayor's Summary

Summing up at the Council meeting on 16 March 2016, the Town Mayor Cllr R Butler said "I have had a fantastic year as Mayor and am proud that my chosen charity (the Visually Impaired Club based at Maxwell Park Community Centre) managed to raise nearly £3,000. It was wonderful to present the Honorary Freemen awards this year to Bob Redman and Bill Davies and I hope you enjoyed the video of my year in office which highlighted some of the key moments [The Audience at the Annual Parish Meeting had watched a four minute long video compilation of the Mayoral Engagements and Council Events]. Good Luck to the new Mayor and thank you to all my colleagues and especially to Rebecca who accompanied me in my role!"

Community Services

Hall Bookings: Fairway Hall is available for regular and casual hire and provides a service much in demand by the community including dance, yoga, mindfulness classes, soccer practice for toddlers, children's workshops, private birthday parties, theatrical shows, wedding receptions, faith groups and public forums. Over 2,000 hours were booked in 2015/16. Wednesday evenings have been agreed as solely for Council use for public forums and Council meetings thus reducing the hire cost of other venues for the Council.



Planning and Consultations: The Council considered a total of 370 planning applications referred to it by Hertsmere Borough Council as a statutory consultee. Comments were made on 111 of these with concerns including issues of overdevelopment, adequacy of parking provision and the need for family sized dwellings in the area. Consultation responses were made on Site Allocations (SADM) and public rights of Way in the Aldenham area. The Environment and Planning Committee is responsible for considering Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) projects and bids to Hertsmere Borough Council. The Council agreed to initiate a Neighbourhood Plan for the Elstree and Borehamwood areas and to appoint an Officer for this purpose. Once agreed, the policies within such a document would form part of the Local Plan.



Allotments (Allum Road, Melrose Avenue and Stapleton Gardens):

Plot occupancy was at 97% (144 tenants and 148 plots) with 50 new plots being opened in the North of Borehamwood (Stapleton Gardens) in the future. Potential applicants for the Stapleton Gardens site waiting list are encouraged to contact the Council (currently 21 names are on the list). Work to improve access to and security on the sites is ongoing.

Site and Street Maintenance: In partnership with local businesses, the Council maintains the film plaques in Borehamwood (with additional plaque opened to Jim Henson in 2015), 47 benches and 9 notice boards (with a new board at Elstree and Borehamwood train station). Both War Memorials, St Nicholas and All Saints Churchyard (and Church Clock) are maintained by the grounds team and the High Street planter cost is shared with Hertsmere Borough Council.



Grants: A total award of £3,250 was made in 2015/16: Elstree and Borehamwood Light Operatic Society (£250) for advertising the production of Oliver!, First Impressions (£1,000) for street scene improvements, Boreham Wood Football Club (£1,000) for advertising billboards and Twin Town Association (£1,000) towards running costs. The Council encourages local organisations to apply for Community Grants in 2016/17. The deadlines are 1st round 4 May 2016, 2nd round 20 October 2016 and 3rd round 4 January 2017. Application forms and procedures are available on the Council website (www.elstreeborehamwood-

tc.gov.uk/index.php/yourcouncil/community-grants).

Transport Forum: The Forum meeting frequency has increased from 3 to 4 per year (with option of a 5th) with meetings taking place on a Wednesday evening at Fairway Hall. In 2015/16 the Forum received a report from J Cartledge on urban footpaths (highlighting the need to protect these), responded to a consultation on strategic priorities for rail in Hertfordshire and held a themed meeting on considerate parking (with the aim of raising awareness with road users). Bus and train updates were provided at meetings with relevant information recorded in the minutes and Council website.

Events Forum: This group met three times in 2015/16 and was successful in providing suggestions for future event planning including the type of artistes at Families' Day and the Queen's Birthday celebrations. The proposals are submitted to the Entertainments Committee for consideration and approval.

Business Forum: This group, chaired by the Town Mayor, was initiated to strengthen community engagement, lobby on behalf of the local business community and to represent to the Town Council the views of businesses on matters of Government policy (e.g. grants, transport infrastructure and business support).



Teddy's Trails: The Council launched a collection of 18 documented walks (including information on local history) surrounding Borehamwood (published on the website). These are dedicated to a Fox Terrier owned by resident, Mr J Cartledge, who prepared and led the initial organised trails and who was responsible for compiling the contents.

Defibrillator Project: Local resident Mr L. Stack, with the support of Town Councillors, initiated a programme to install defibrillators at strategic locations throughout Elstree and Borehamwood. The project included training for users and fundraising activities (with many items being donated by businesses and the British Heart Foundation).





Honorary Freemen: At the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday 9 March 2016 the Town Council was proud to recognise two prominent residents who had gone beyond the call of duty in serving the community. For the first time in the Town Council's history it bestowed the very highest award that it could give to Bill Davies (the D Day veteran and chevalier de la Legion d'honneur) and Bob Redman (of First Impressions and Elstree Screen Heritage). The award is Honorary Freeman of Elstree and Borehamwood.

Leisure and Entertainment

Coach Trips: The 12 subsidised coach trips for the over 60s were sold out. New destinations for 2016 were agreed as Margate, Greenwich and Stratford Upon Avon. The Council agreed to support two trips to Christmas markets in December 2016.

Civic Festival: The Festival fortnight was hugely successful with a Bugsy Malone themed Town Council lorry in the 22 float parade. The Classic Car show displayed over 20 vehicles with outdoor films of The Italian Job and Who Framed Roger Rabbit? (despite inclement weather). Families Day included over 50 community stalls with the addition of a Kinovan (showing historic footage of Borehamwood) organised by Elstree Screen Heritage. The headline artistes were Britain's Got Talent star John Evans (balancing act), falconry, high wire stunts, mountain bike displays, balloon models, table top circus and a showcase of local talent. Other events in the fortnight included an Allotment open day at Melrose Avenue, the Annual Festival Flower show, Primary School Performing Arts and the Royal Legion Festival Quiz. 'Elstree and Borehamwood's Got Talent' was held at the Ark Theatre for the final time (with the competition being relocated to Fairway Hall in 2016). The Pre-Festival event held in May each year continues to help with ticket sales and to highlight many of the attractions to come.





Fireworks Display: This was the 25th free entry fireworks display, choreographed this year to themes from the Musicals. Over 5,000 spectators enjoyed a safe and well organised show. The pyrotechnics were sponsored by Signia Homes with Taylor Wimpey sponsoring the 'Penny for the Guy' competition and music.



Musical Concerts: The BBC Band returned to Allum Hall for a Christmas concert in December recognising the 30 Years of East Enders landmark with a special rendition of the theme music. Borehamwood Brass held a concert as part of the Festival.



Christmas Switch On Display: The lights were switched on by celebrity Shona McGarty ('Whitney' from East Enders). New additions included a Christmas Tree at the train station with carol singing by the 5th Borehamwood Brownies and Girl Guides.

The Switch On event was embellished by the ever popular Santa's Grotto stall, ice rink, merry-go-round and Rolling Base activity bus. Cowley Hill, Kenilworth, Meryfield and Monksmead primary schools performed carols to a packed All Saints Church.

Children and Young People

School Swimming: The Council supported local schools in meeting the cost of travel to The Venue swimming pool for lessons (£33,000). This much appreciated service is applauded by Head teachers and students alike.

Youth Council: Achievements included environmental improvements (especially at Elstree and Borehamwood train station), raising funds for the Visually Impaired Group and bramble clearance at Woodcock Hill. The Youth Council is keen to welcome new members who want to make a difference and be a local voice for young people in the area (contact T Malton - Youth Council Secretary tel: 020 8207 1382).

Work Placements: The Council provided placements for local schools in the role of Grounds Maintenance Assistants in the Summer months.
