Women's Institute commemorative bench

On Monday 14 November 2016, Borehamwood WI commemorated its continued presence in the town by rededicating the WI Golden Jubilee seat outside Peacock's store on Shenley Road.

The seat was unveiled by Town Mayor, Cllr Clive Butchins, who said: "The original bench was funded by the WI and erected in 1973 by the junction of Shenley Road and Furzehill Road. It was removed when the area was rejuvenated as a town centre amenity space. Borehamwood WI has played an active role in the community since 1923 and it is wonderful that we can reintroduce this bench to the very heart of the town.WI - which has about 30 members - will be meeting on the second Monday of every month (1pm - 3pm) at Fairway Hall."

The mystery of Woodcock Hill

In June 2016, ahead of the Queen's official birthday celebrations, a working party from Woodcock Hill Village Green volunteers and committee installed a bench near to the Beacon. The intention was to provide a place for those people who struggle to walk to the bench on Two Oaks Field to have a place to recharge their batteries and enjoy the view north to Radlett and beyond.

It was dug up and stolen within a fortnight. Even the concrete foundations were taken. WHVG Committee were dismayed that anyone could do such a thing. It was a simple structure made of railway sleepers but nonetheless was a welcome sight for older and frailer walkers on the hill.

Recently, Town Cllr Clive Butchins, a committee member, was on his regular jaunt on Woodcock Hill when he spotted that the bench had been returned. Alex Melson, WHVG conservation manager, took the bench for safe keeping and a working party re-erect it in January

WHVG chair, Town Cllr Pat Strack, said 'It is a mystery who stole it and who returned it. We are very glad to get it back. Several years ago in 2010 a bench was made by the youth working party HOPE 2010. That was made from logs from the Hill. That was stolen. Cardiff Pinnacle replaced it with a proper park bench. The stolen bench was recovered when a hideout for a rough sleeper was discovered on the Hill. It had been taken apart to make a table and chair deep in Bluebell Woods. Once recovered it was reinstalled back on the hill as a bench.

Woodcock Hill Village Green committee successfully applied for a Tesco Green Bag Grant and were awarded $\pm 10,000$. The projects



proposed included new ponds and restoration of old ponds, footpath management and upgrading to make the boggy parts easier to traverse. £7,500 will be released into the bank account in late



January. The other $\pm 2,500$ will only be released on completion. We have to get a loan to cover this $\pm 2,500$. Outside agencies have already been employed to carry out the work and we await planning permission for the work on the paths.

Fontenay-aux-Roses November 2016

A visit to represent Elstree & Borehamwood at the Ceremonie de 11 Novembre

On Thursday evening in the hotel Elaine and I met our counterparts from the German twin town of Wiesloch, Oberbürgermeister Dirk Elkemann and Klaus Rothenhöfer. We walked with them to the Café de la Gare, the venue for dinner as guests of Fontenay Council, which Deputy Mayor Dominique Lafon hosted. We were treated to an excellent meal.

After a sound night's sleep and breakfast we strolled with our German friends along to the Place du Général de Gaulle and the Mairie to greet various local dignitaries and await the formal proceedings.

The ceremony went off with the usual speeches and laying of wreaths and floral tributes, and a rendition of the Marseillaise by a school choir. This was followed by the second part of the ceremony in the town cemetery which honours those who have served France in some capacity, with a procession to visit the appropriate graves, led by numerous flag-bearers. Later that day, we arrived at the Champs Élysées in Paris to find there was an enormous Christmas market where we enjoyed sharing some delicious tartiflette from one of the stalls. We then joined the queue for the Hergé (creator of Tintin) exhibition at the Grand Palais.

We wandered past the memorial to Princess Diana, crossed the Seine at the Pont de l'Alma and thence to our restaurant, with a great view of the Eiffel Tower. This is lit up at night with a laser beam projecting from the top, but every hour for a few minutes it becomes a giant sparkler with a myriad of twinkling lights.

Saturday morning dawned and we headed into town for some shopping. Scouting out somewhere for lunch we bumped into several of our acquaintances.

Finally it was time to return. We both really enjoyed the trip. The hospitality was first class, our hosts were really friendly and I commend anyone else who has the opportunity to visit an event in one of our twin towns.

Reviva

The green waste company Reviva moved from Woodcock Hill Farm to Elstree Hill South when planning consent was granted by Herts County Council in 2011.

Complaints about obnoxious smells from residents as far away as Harrow and Stirling Corner have dogged the company on both sites.

As the result of group and individual protests Hertsmere Borough Council environmental health department took Reviva to court in June 2016, this resulted in a planning application from Reviva being sent to Herts County Council in October. Reviva wanted to increase the size of their building by 150% and introduce extractors to reduce the effect of the smell.

Elstree Village Preservation Society (sub committee of the Elstree & Borehamwood Green Belt Society), Brockley Hill Residents Association and a representative of Elstree Composers Estate joined forces to challenge the application. On December 12 Herts County Council arranged a site visit for the Planning Committee members, officers and a representative from Elstree & Borehamwood Green Belt Society, cllr Pat Strack.

The application was due to come to Herts County Council planning committee 21/1/16 but officers recommended refusal. Reviva directors, Gary & Owen Lewis, asked for time to submit fresh evidence and were granted leave to provide that by mid January.

The working group, EVPS and BHRA met on 3 January. Main objections are the toxic nature of the fumes, pollution of groundwater, no evidence that any other site has used this method, Herts County Council does not use this site, waste is brought in from Harrow and Brent, mixing treated wood with the green waste andmixing paper pellets with the green waste (chemicals are used both in the manufacture of paper and the print).

It is expected that Herts County Council will consider the fresh evidence and report at the beginning to mid February. In the meantime we urge all to log the stench with the Environment Agency. Get a reference number log time and date. Contact EA 03708 506 506.

Compost Corner



Good housekeeping for your gardens and allotments

Top tips from Tomto make life easier for the spring planting season:

- Don't rush in while the ground is hard or wet...let nature take its course!
- Now's the time to do winter digging if you get a dry day it breaks up the soil and helps prepare it for your seed beds
- Clearing up the plot get out any produce that has gone over for composting
- If you have a spare room or heated greenhouse, in the next few weeks sow leeks and spring onion seeds in trays (and check out what else you might like to sow) for transplanting out March-April
- Get pots and trays clean; also, if you have one, get your greenhouse cleaned with Jeyes fluid to kill off any wintering bugs
- Keep your eyes out for seeds in shops to give yourself more choice before they sell out
- You can visit your local garden centre or order organic fertiliser online, to be ready to go!





This was followed by a picnic style tea which had cupcakes that were decorated with the official "Cubs 100" logo. These had been made by Danielle Dorsett, one of the Cub leaders. Record-breaking numbers of volunteers support Mitzvah Day in Borehamwood and Elstree community

27 November 2016 – A record-breaking 400 members from Elstree & Borehamwood United Synagogue and the wider community were among around 40,000 volunteers in more than 21 countries helping hundreds of local charities in meaningful ways as part of Mitzvah Day 2016.

Mitzvah Day is a Jewish-led day of social action that brings thousands of people together worldwide, of all faiths and none, to give their time, not their money, to make a difference to the community around them.

The 20 local projects involved charities and communities such as The Joely Bear Appeal, Borehamwood Foodbank, Gift, Townsend House, Stonham House, and Gratitude!

Before and after Mitzvah Day, local volunteers participated in two different food rotas, including a two-week food rota of cakes and desserts for the residents of Townsend House (a hostel in Borehamwood caring for 16-25 year-old homeless young women with support needs) and Hepburn Court (a hostel for families with support needs). Plans are also in place to continue these food donations throughout the year. The second food rota was for Stonham House, an ex-offenders unit.

Working with The Joely Bear Appeal and NHS Blood Donation, there was an extra special Mitzvah Day blood donor session at Edgware and Borehamwood and Elstree Synagogue. Over 240 donations of blood were taken over both sessions and there were over 50 first time donors, which is an amazing achievement! Volunteers made sandwiches for those who donated, and did face painting and entertainment for the children of those who were donating.

In conjunction with PJ library, a child and adult book swap was run, where volunteers donated three or more books and swapped them for one new book. The donated books are for local shelters in Borehamwood (Stonham House, Shenwood Court and Townsend House) and Hepburn Court in South Mimms.

Volunteers also took part in a knitathon both before and on Mitzvah Day, knitting and crocheting squares to be sewn together into warm blankets, which are being distributed to those in need and local care homes.

Those looking for some outdoor activities put on their wellies and gardening gloves and braved the cold, to work with the Woodcock Hill

Village Green Committee as part of an interfaith project to help clear Woodcock Hill in Borehamwood of brambles and litter, and make bug houses.

Another team also braved the cold at Shenwood Court with Gratitude to clear the allotments and build an outdoor library – the first outdoor library in Borehamwood. Many of the books donated for the book swap will go to the new outdoor library.

Building upon the local success of Mitzvah Day, volunteers helped with the Foodbank in their Christmas collectathon at Tesco, and helped unload/sort the donations. Gift boxes were also created for a group of youngsters from a care house who visited the UK for the first time in December.

Mitzvah Day founder and chair Laura Marks applauded the Borehamwood and Elstree community, saying:"Once again, the team has come out in force to support the variety of projects that have been identified. Following previous years' successes, we have seen how the various projects have positively impacted the lives of many local people on Mitzvah Day itself and on an ongoing basis throughout the year. I congratulate the team and hope a similar impact is achieved in the year ahead."

Lauren Schogger added: "This is our biggest and most successful Mitzvah Day to date. We've put on a fantastic range of projects that have made and will continue to make a real difference to those less fortunate than ourselves in our local and wider community. Social action is a success due to the many volunteers that come forward to support our projects.

In 2016 these improvements, part-funded by Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council and its Youth Council, included providing fixed seating on the forecourt, adding new planters, taming an overgrown area behind Bus Shelter C and putting in place new signage to help guide visitors at the station.

But now it's time for James to move on, to take up the post of Area Manager for Thameslink's London core - covering West Hampstead to Blackfriars station.

Recognising James' contribution to improvements at the station during the past 18 months Bob Redman, Chair of "First Impressions" said: "Over the past six years the local train operator has been a key member of "First Impressions" but in his time here as Station Manager James has added an extra level of energy and enthusiasm in all that he has done. We'll greatly miss his "can do" attitude and his hands-on approach."

Councillor Pat Strack, Leader of the Town Council, picked up on that theme: "Whether by helping train the community to use the new defibrillators or in organising Christmas events at the station James has brought our community and GTR closer together than at any time in the past. His understanding of our needs and his willingness to work with us has been very special and we owe him a great deal."

Mayor Clive Butchins echoed those sentiments: "It's been a pleasure to have worked with James, who has been really helpful in a number of



areas, but most notably in making Elstree & Borehamwood station such a welcoming environment for visitors and residents. He will be missed. I wish him every success in his new role. He will always be most welcome to visit us at any time."

Under the new arrangements Elstree & Borehamwood station will be the responsibility of Sam Bowler, Area Manager for Thameslink's outer stations. She says "I'm looking forward to our new Station Manager, soon to be appointed, continuing the close working relationship James has established with the local community and doing everything possible to improve the station further for our passengers."

The final words belong to James Gillett:"From the first day I managed the station I knew that this was a special place and it has been a total pleasure in being able to work with our many community partners. The station really is now firmly part of the community it serves and I feel proud to have been a part of it. I look forward to coming back next year to be part of the 150th birthday celebration of the arrival of rail to Elstree & Borehamwood."

traditional telephones. Each telephone represents and conveys the voices of the era.




Along with the filmed interviews, these are available to all on our museum website www.elstree-museum.org.uk.

Where have all the teachers gone?

Department of Education figures show that last year 50,000 teachers left the profession and more are now leaving than joining. Around 25% leave within their first three years. As governors we are too well aware of the difficulty our schools are having in attracting a good field of teachers to fill vacancies.

Teaching vacancies come about for many reasons, but mainly it is because teachers gain useful experiences of working in our good Borehamwood schools and decide to move on. Quite a few younger teachers do this because they want to be able to buy somewhere to live and settle down. Some, though, get promotions to other schools outside our area, and we often have to appoint short-term cover for maternities. An increasing problem for our teachers, and everyone else, is how bad the local traffic has become.

Our schools have to compete with teachers being paid £2,500 more a year if they work nearby in Barnet or Harrow. What we have to offer though is good schools and much nicer environments. Currently, 90% of Hertfordshire schools are good or better and one of the major estate agencies says that Hertfordshire is the best place in the country to raise children.

The most important job that a school governor does is appointing a headteacher, but governors are also involved in the process of appointing other teachers and bring an "outside school" perspective to the questions and discussions. We still have people applying for teaching posts but whereas five years ago there were many applicants, now there are often only one or two.



Hertfordshire County Council is very active in trying to attract people to teach here. Recruitment fairs are organised and in 2016 Herts For Learning won the National School Recruitment award. Thinking of starting yoga?

You may be familiar with the physical benefits of yoga, improved flexibility, strength, stability and balance - but how can that help your mind?


We live in an over stimulated society; think mobile phones, the internet, 24 hour TV, the new normal is an underlying feeling of dis-ease and anxiety. Our nervous systems are overwrought and we spend a lot of our lives operating on our 'fight or flight' response.

This is the part of us that fires up when we need to protect ourselves from imminent danger by either fighting or running, but sadly is the same system that is activated, during road rage, or while trying to meet a deadline at work. Sound familiar?

Our bodies, however, are finely balanced instruments and we have a 'rest and digest' response too. This system activates more tranquil functions of the body, in a nutshell it encourages us to relax. And this is where Yoga steps in, a well rounded practice can teach us how to move and breathe more effectively, an emphasis on long exhalations will encourage our 'rest and digest' response to activate and this teamed with guided relaxation means we can start to make an impact on our minds as well as our bodies.

Try this simple yogic breathing exercise: sitting or standing upright, breathe in through your nose for a count of 4 and exhale through your mouth for a count of 6 or more, making a gentle sighing sound, you can imagine you are trying to steam up a mirror held in front of your mouth. Repeat several times and then sit for a minute or two, eyes closed and simply notice how you feel.
