# **Tribute to Roger Moore KBE**

Goodbye to Sir Roger Moore, Humanitarian, Saint and the most Suave James Bond, who died on the 23rd May aged 89.

Debonair with trademark humour, Moore was the 'fourth best Bond', self-proclaimed, but undoubtedly the most fun and irreverent version of lan Fleming's character ever portrayed to date and possibly for all time.

Born in Stockwell, London to a Police constable and a housewife from Calcutta, Moore's acting career started after his father, investigating a robbery at the home of a British film director, introduced him to Brian Desmond Hurst. He was given the part as a silent extra in Hurst's 1945 film Caesar and Cleopatra.



The role that first catapulted Roger Moore to international stardom was Simon Templar in the Elstree studio produced 'The Saint'. Playing a master thief stealing from the rich and corrupt to give to the very poor, and to himself, Templar travelled to locations around the world but the whole series was almost entirely shot at Elstree Studios. Early blue screen technology and painted backdrops were among the techniques utilised which meant that during the series run from 1962-1969 and - staggering for the time -118 episode broadcast Moore, whilst on set, rarely ever had reason to leave.

He came to the 2006 unveiling of the Elstree studio Plaque commemorating his contribution to the show and remarked 'Life has caught up with me [but] I had the best time here at Elstree'. It was Moore's defining role that became a template for his comedic style and solidified his status forever as the Patron Saint of smooth. It was this inherent suave persona, channelled through Simon Templar that attracted the attention of the Bond producers.

Moore was a philanthropist and prouder of his achievements with UNICEF and many other charities than over his acting. He lived with passion, compassion, and a whole lot of style. And proudly takes credit for perfecting the art of eyebrow acting.

Roger Moore's Hollywood walk of fame star is positioned quite aptly at 7007 Hollywood Boulevard and his Elstree studio plaque can be seen on Borehamwood's Shenley Road.

# Beekeeping with Andreas at Allum Lane Allotments



You may already know Andreas from The Golden Plaice (superb fish 'n' chips!) in Shenley Road, now run by his son, and if you're very lucky, you will have been a recipient of a jar of his golden honey which he draws from his six hives at Allum Lane.

Andreas has kept bees for over forty years, with as many as twenty-four hives in his own back garden. At the beginning of August, I found him collecting honey comb in his protective gear, surrounded by a cloud of bees, though he rarely gets stung even when he doesn't wear it. He tells me that his first hive produced 80kg of honey, yet he says the more hives you have the less honey is produced. In the UK, honey producing time takes place between April and the end of June and is dependent on things like weather, whereas in Cyprus, Andreas' native home, bees work for 10 months of the year.

He tells me that UK weather hasn't been very good for bees over the last few years, and they don't tend to travel out if it's wet or too windy. They do travel for up to three miles, but with conditions being what they are, it's meant they've been making less honey (you might have noticed the


hike in price of a jar), and have to be fed over the winter months to keep them alive. When Andreas harvests honey from his hives, he leaves a percentage that the bees will eat for themselves. Andreas is very firm in saying bees need to be checked at least once a week from April to the end of June, they are a long term commitment, and require autumnal treatments to prevent disease.

Andreas assures me bees are not aggressive by nature and will only sting if they feel under attack. The trick is to stand still and not wave your arms about (difficult I know!), and he advises we avoid wearing aftershave or perfume when working on our allotments, as this will draw their interest. Apparently, they think they are smelling nectar laden flowers and like to check this out.

Believe it or not - google it - bee venom is used in medical treatments for rheumatoid arthritis, nerve pain, multiple sclerosis and tendonitis amongst other conditions. Also, eating local honey which is rich in local pollen, is known to alleviate hay fever symptoms in sufferers.

Bees are vital for pollination, biodiversity and crop production. They tell us about the health of our wider environment too so we have a lot to be grateful to them for.


# Cowley Hill Primary School

#### Key Stage 2 provisional SATS results are up for the fifth consecutive year.



### **Keeping Children Safe at School**

My boss once said to me that although a good education is important, parents expect their children to come home with all the bits they went with. Today, keeping your children safe is the number one priority for staff and governors in all our schools.

Preparing children for extreme events is not new. Some people can remember the 1940's when children had to wear gas masks and carry them to and from school. This was scary at first but they got used to it because they knew it was important.

Today, children (and some parents), have got to get used to contingencies we have put into place and regularly practise. The Lookdown and Emergency response procedures are good examples. If we did not fulfil these responsibilities schools would be considered negligent. Governors have to ensure that schools practice fire drills on a regular basis. They do this by observing them and ask questions about their effectiveness. Jewish Schools have always placed a great emphasis on keeping their children safe and have been very effective at this.

From an early age, there is an emphasis on Road Safety and Stranger Danger. These can be pretty scary to children but would parents not want schools to deal with these issues? Asking questions about the cladding and asbestos in school buildings is something we do regularly. There is an expectation that governors have recent training on issues to do with children's safety. Recently, there has been an emphasis on us all having Prevent training. This is how to identify radicalisation and

extremism and how it is being combatted.



If you try to get into a school today, it is obvious how much is being done to keep children safe. Until recent times you could walk up to a school and go straight in. Today they are like fortresses and school inspectors will seek chinks in the barriers. We accept this as necessary but is it really how we want our schools to be?

### Hertsmere's Dragons Apprentice Challenge Winners, Yavneh College, raise £1,184.68 for local Charity!

Elegantly Enterprising team from Yavneh College has been proclaimed the overall winner of the Hertsmere's Dragons Apprentice Challenge 2016/17 which is organised by Community Herstmere.

On Tuesday 11 July, members of Elegantly Enterprising presented a cheque for £1,184.68 to their paired charity, Carers in Hertfordshire.

Students worked closely with their business mentor – the Dragon - Jonathan Lipitch from Jonathan Lipitch Consulting, to raise money for their paired charity.

The challenge was launched officially at the Metro Bank in Borehamwood in October last year, where each team of 'Apprentices' were paired with a 'Dragon' from a local company and a Community Hertsmere member charity. With guidance from their Dragons, teams used their entrepreneurial skills, creativity and enthusiasm to develop business ideas to turn the £100 they received as seed money into a profit for their paired charity. All the profit earned by the teams is given directly to their charity.

Stephen Craker, Chief Executive of Community Hertsmere said: "The Dragons' Apprentice Challenge is a great way of helping young people to develop their skills and use them to benefit the local community. The students gain confidence, learn about their strengths and limitations and what it takes to succeed under the expert and enthusiastic mentorship of their local business Dragons. This has been a particularly challenging year for the young Apprentices. Those who completed the Challenge are to be admired and congratulated for their tenacity, inspiration and hard work. All meetings, planning, events and marketing take place in their own time, on top of a heavy schedule of schoolwork and other activities."

The Challenge is organised by Community Hertsmere and is planned to run annually. This year, Community Hertsmere has also launched the Junior Dragons' Apprentice for primary schools.

Team Unity from North London Grammar also arranged a number of fundraising activities including a staff and student Christmas dinner and a 'Sweet and Savoury' shop. Through hard work and with the support of their Dragon Tanira Coats, Local Business Manager from Metro Bank, they raised over £500, with over £350 net profit being given to their charity partner, Goods for Good.

Team Cinematics from The Elstree UTC also delivered some good work for their charity partner, Borehamwood Foodbank. Students undertook bag-packing at a local supermarket and although they were not able to raise any money through selling sponsorship on an awareness raising

# "All Change!"

#### 150 Years of Rail, From the Past into the Future

What if? What if the Midland Railway Company had not built a station at Elstree & Borehamwood when it opened its new line from Bedford to St. Pancras in July

Without a passenger rail service, the small rural village would not have grown into a town, the film studios would not have started to settle here from 1914, and the world might never have known the film and television classics created here.

Today passengers use Elstree & Borehamwood Station to make an amazing four million journeys each year, making it one of the busiest 5% of main line stations in the country. The railway's impact on the town will continue to increase, with the second fastest projected growth in footfall of all stations on its line.

To celebrate this milestone, so critical to our town, the "First Impressions" initiative plans a year-long programme of activities. Over the past nine years, the Town Council, Hertsmere Borough Council, Hertfordshire County Council, train operator Thameslink and local volunteer group Elstree Screen Heritage have worked together to make the station and other public spaces more attractive and welcoming, using high impact visuals from our unique film and television heritage.

But the 150th anniversary is the most ambitious challenge "First Impressions" has yet faced. With the support of a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Elstree & Borehamwood Museum will stage a 6-month exhibition about the impact of our railway, drawing on its collection and the knowledge of its volunteers and local residents.



Sharing 96 Shenley Road with the Museum, the Library will create its own displays and run railway-themed reading programmes with local schools. Learning packs based on the exhibition will also be prepared. Other activities are being planned, with an event at the railway station and screenings of railway-themed films made in the Town's studios.

In 2018 the Town Council's Summer Civic Festival will have the 150th anniversary as its theme. Cllr. Sandra Parnell represents the Town  $Council \ on \hbox{\it ``First Impressions''} \ and \ says: \hbox{\it ``We the Town Council have}$ successfully worked as part of "First Impressions" for many years, helping achieve something remarkable in Borehamwood. To now be involved with celebrating 150 years of our railway station is something we are really excited about!"



"It was a fascinating insight into the world of the supporting artists and how one film changed their lives forever," Town Mayor, Clir Eric Silver said.


Spira added: "It was the perfect place for a little screening, and a nice intimate Q&A."

The East of England Ambulance Service is collating all the data on defibrillators in the town. In the event of an emergency they will

give directions to a 999 caller to the nearest available defibrillator. Emergency Services respond as soon as they can but someone on the scene using a defibrillator could save a life. Confidence is of the essence as the defibrillator is computerised and will talk the user through. The ambulance service will

### St Nicholas' Elstree, Church Clock

For more than 130 years Elstree Village has benefited from the clock at St Nicholas' Church striking the passing hours. The clock with a blue face and gold hands echoes the colours of St Nicholas Church and parts of the machinery date from the 18th century. For most of this time the clock has been carefully serviced by a firm almost as old as the clock itself, namely Smith of Derby, established in 1856. The church is very grateful to EBTC paying for the maintenance of the clock in recent years.

Over the past two years it has become increasingly difficult to find members of our congregation strong enough to wind the clock by hand once a week. Two large cogs had to be wound, at least 25 turns each using a huge item like a starting handle for an old fashioned car. Eventually we gave up and for the last 6 months our clock only told the correct time twice a day.

Pat Strack heard of our dilemma and recommended we apply for a grant from EBTC to pay for electrical automatic winding equipment. All went smoothly and Smith of Derby were employed to install the new equipment. Our clock sprang to life again on the 21st July, striking loudly each hour, an Elstree Village amenity restored. Many thanks to EBTC and especially Pat Strack and getting us back on real time.

# Remembrance Sunday Sunday 12th November 2017


The parade will form up in Clarendon Road, opposite the Village Hall (Number 96), Shenley Road, ready to move off at approx. 10:40am.



### **Woodcock Hill Village Green**



Woodcock Hill Village Green working parties continue to be led by Alex Melson: clearing litter and ensuring the newly planted trees will not choke.

The major work on the footpath going between the two oaks was completed in May at a cost of just over £2,000 from our Tesco Grant of £10,000. This will make the path passable in wet weather. In the autumn we have contractors booked to remove

large swathes of brambles to encourage a wider range of meadow flowers for 2018. Diversity of flowers will provide different habitats to promote a wider range of wildlife.

One of our biggest causes of concern is the amount of dog poo on the footpaths that is not bagged and taken away. Dog poo is a health hazard and while we would not expect dog owners to venture into the vegetation we do expect owners to clear it from the footpaths. Of course we know that most dog owners are responsible and do clear up. It is always a few who spoil it for everyone else.

The £1,000 tools grant from the One Stop Shop has enabled the purchase of a new brush cutter and safety equipment, new litter pickers, slashers, secateurs and rakes.

# Aldenham Country Park Trust Limited

Although the Secretary of State upheld our appeal that the whole footpath around the lake should be registered as a Public Right of Way. Herts County Council have issued an order to make the footpath a public right of way, the notices went up on the 25 August. Aldenham Country Park and the Trustees will have to ensure that all the evidence we produced for the appeal is strengthened with photos and diaries. The evidence we provided showed use of the footpath around the lake as early as 1924!

The registration of the footpath as a Right of Way is important to all residents as we wish to ensure free and open access in perpetuity.

Liberty Aldenham Ltd has submitted its site in Watford Road to be considered for development in Hertsmere's New Local plan.



#### **Reviva Composting Ltd**

Reviva located at the bottom of Elstree Hill South continues to operate and no enforcement has yet taken place either by Hertsmere Borough Council or Hertsmere County Council. Reviva have been advised to produce an air management scheme and an odour management plan (OMP).



# Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society held a very successful AGM at Allum Hall in May. Ann Goddard highlighted all the areas that EBGBS had responded to in the previous year. Our speaker was Howard Berry, Lecturer at Hertfordshire University. He kept us all entertained with his tales about interviews and capturing memories of people who had worked in the film industry. # The Elstree Village Preservation Society

The Elstree Village Preservation Society continues to monitor the situation with the Holly Bush, planning permission was given to the Grade 2 listed English Heritage building to be made into accommodation.

No progress has been made with parking issues that have been highlighted.



### **Scene Change at Studio Way**

Over the last 18 months Studio Way and Potterswood Park in Borehamwood have undergone a transformation.

The history of Studio Way has been brought back to life with this exciting project improving the access, restoring wildlife habitats and interpreting the area's long history of film making. Scene Change at Studio Way' project was made possible by a National Lottery grant of £62,600 awarded by the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) and £32,000 from Hertsmere Borough Council who own the site.

Project managers Countryside Management Service (CMS) have successfully delivered the project on the ground. Thanks to the National Lottery players, improvement works have included:

- Improving access by opening up and resurfacing footpaths and linking routes around the site
- Restoring wildlife habitats by carrying out: woodland management, restoration of old hedgerows, planting of native Oak trees and removal of invasive species
- Creating welcoming and accessible entrances to the park with welcome signs and a main entrance feature
- Installing interpretative information around the site highlighting its wildlife and heritage
- Engaging volunteers and local people on practical volunteering and guided walks.



# Have you discovered....? Teddy's Trail from Arkley



This is one of eighteen walking routes through the local countryside, promoted by Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council and named after the fox terrier who helped to devise them.

- An ancient drovers' road, once used to bring animals on the hoof to London's livestock markets
- A training centre for horse ball, an equestrian sport once played with live ducks instead of balls
- · A clay target shooting ground, originally used for testing sporting guns
- · An ancient field system dating back to pre-Roman times
- · A six-wheeled gypsy caravan
- A radio transmitting station
- A pub named after a fight between poachers and travellers using mops and brooms
- The site on which films such as Casino Royale, Where Eagles Dare and The Dirty Dozen were shot





- The set for Albert Square, home of EastEnders
- Borehamwood's original shops, oldest pub, first place of worship and first school.

Over the next few months the canisters will be taken to local clubs and faith groups and GP surgeries wherever they are needed or requested. Canisters have already been distributed to Monday Club DR96, U3A, Tuesday Drop in and DCUK. Help can be given to fill in the forms.


Sara Donnelly gave us a taste of the
