

It's hard to believe that forty years have passed since town - twinning started in Elstree and Boreham Wood.

In that time, hundreds of local people have visited Offenburg, the gateway to Germany's lovely Black Forest and the attractive small town of Fontenay aux Roses, near Paris.

School children, sports teams and business people have all made valuable contacts and friendships that have lasted a lifetime.

Sometimes, even closer relationships have been formed. Take Thomas and Susan Deschler for example. Susan Bailey and her brother, David, both attended the former Boreham Wood Grammar School in the 'sixties. At that time, the school had a very active exchange arrangement with a school in Offenburg. David and his German friend Thomas Deschler stayed with each other's' families many times over the years.

After his schooldays, Thomas went to medical school and became a GP in one of Offenburg's neighbouring towns. He also started dating Susan, his friend's sister and eventually the couple married, settling in Germany, where Susan helped Thomas run his surgery. Susan became so fluent in German and so active in the community that she was elected Deputy Mayor of her new home town. She also acted as a guide for English-speakers visiting the famous Black Forest Museum near their home.

Thomas and Susan met with our local town twinning organisers and told them their romantic story.

Martine Eni, Chairman of the Boreham Wood and Elstree Twin Town Association (BETTA) said: "It just goes to show what twinning can lead to. This young couple's lives were totally transformed by it. Now, we have developed a programme of annual visits to both France and Germany. These are open to everybody. During 2018, we will be in Fontenay for their vibrant 'Fête de la Ville'. June and September will find us in Offenburg, for their celebrated 'Weinfest.'

Compost Corner

'Our Garden Away From Home'

It all started when the family were watching a programme about green waste and composting Adel tells me, and became a journey which to their great surprise resulted in a first prize for 'Best Effort' as newcomers to Melrose Allotments.

Adel, Andras and their two children Danuta and Nandor began growing strawberries in pots, and reminisced on how they grew veggies in the ground, growing up in Hungary. They felt it was timely to harness the interest being shown by their 4 and 6 yr olds, teach them about how compost was formed and integral to growing nutritional food in a healthy environment. Since they were not able to dig up the garden of their rented accommodation, Adel looked up 'how to rent a garden for vegetables' on the internet and came up with allotments in Herts.

She was surprised to get started so quickly, from an enquiry made in January '17, to digging the allotment in April. Despite it looking very green (with weeds), they hit the ground running and rented a rotovator for a weekend. It was a bit expensive, but within two days the whole plot was dug, saving time, and they could get things in the ground straight away.

The children loved spending every Sunday there, and had jobs to do helping with the planting, watering, and weeding, and learning to identify the weeds from the seedlings. All unwanted greenery was put onto the compost pile. They especially loved collecting worms for the pile having learned that it was worm activity (burrowing though, eating and excreting the greenery) that helped create rich compost – food for plants.

It has never been a problem to get the children involved, Adel explains, they love learning about growing vegetables and fruits, not to mention harvesting and eating them! They are very proud of what they have achieved, and notice the difference in taste between home grown and shop bought sweetcorn. Not one opportunity for learning is wasted, even the snow during January was explained as acting like a blanket to protect what was still in the ground including all the creatures. Of course, they already knew what snow was good for!

The next project is to make space on the window sills to begin growing the seedlings for this year like onion, garlic and tomatoes. Adel says they are still eating their stored potatoes and carrots from last year, and invites me to come see how they store their carrots in sand, which keeps them totally fresh.

Now they are getting requests from work colleagues and their families to look after the allotment when they go on holiday, or to just

Memories from the war

During the week of remembrance two residents at The Radley Care Home, Brenda Jones and Marjorie Hannock, shared their experience and contributions during World War II.

Marjorie visited St Teresa's Catholic Primary School and shared her story with the children. She was very moved by the response she received from the children and staff at the school.

Marjorie and Brenda recall their stories below.

Marjorie Hanbrook

I never wanted to talk to the children about the war. Even in their short lives you know it happens all too often worldwide.

I will tell you of one incident that happened to me. I joined the army in 1942 and we, as women, were known as the A.T.S. Auxiliary Territorial Services. I was stationed at various places in Britain and was in a mixed battery on gun sites.

The men manned the guns, the women manned the other instruments. I was on a height finder which measured the distance between us and the plane, usually a practice plane. There were also two ATS's spotting for the planes and the telephonists were below in a dugout.

We were then moved to another gun site which had search lights and that afternoon I was put on it. I had never seen one, let alone used one.

That night we heard an alarm and it was the real one and with the help of all the gun sites in the area we brought the enemy plane down. The thought of it now abhors me, that we could kill so easily, but we were fighting the Nazis and their evil leader Hitler and they had to be destroyed, which they were, so that we could all live in the free world that we know.

Ending on a lighter note I will tell you about the day I was demobbed. After going to Guildford, I was a civilian again I arrived in Borehamwood, and because it was after 5pm in those days shops were shut. I walked from the Borehamwood train station proud as a punch in my uniform along Shenley Road, up Furzehill and into Hillside Avenue and never saw a soul.





Brenda Jones

I am 94 years old. As a young girl I went to an ordinary junior school and later went to a trade school.

I joined the air force when I was eighteen and a half years old. I was very determined to join but my mum was not so enthusiastic and kept on at me saying, "What do you think you are doing?. You don't have to go", but I told her I am going.

I was a flight mechanic. I did a 26 week course. I dealt with spanners. I made spanners and learnt which end I had to use. We looked after the engine before the plane could fly. I did the 'DI' daily inspection; this was a recommended thing.

I enjoyed every minute of it because the pilots were very kind to us; we were a group of eight women.

We always had a good time with the pilots when they were not flying. The pilots were always changing because a lot of them got killed. They were very lovely men; we used to have parties at the pub. The pub belonged to the services and they all looked after us. We had food when we were not supposed to; and drinks. It was fun.

We formed a bond with the other women that did the same job as me.

I was in the air force for four and a half years and enjoyed myself, apart from the oil, which was dirty oil from draining out of the plane engine; this could take all day.

I wouldn't have missed it for all the tea in China.

Cowley Hill has been awarded the top award from the The Woodland Trust Green Tree Award Scheme.



Our build up to Christmas began with our Tesco collection at the beginning of December. Thanks to local people's generosity we collected 1.9 tonnes of food. 


"All Change!"

150 years of rail, from the past into the future

What if? What if the Midland Railway Company had not built a station at Elstree & Borehamwood when it opened its new line from Bedford to St. Pancras in July 1868?

Without a passenger rail service, the small rural village would not have grown into a town, the film studios would not have started to settle here from 1914, and the world might never have known the film and television classics created here.



Today passengers make an amazing 3.4 million journeys a year through Elstree & Borehamwood station, one of the busiest 5% of main line stations in the country. And with the second fastest projected growth in footfall of all the stations on its line, the railway's impact on the town will continue to increase.

To celebrate this milestone, so critical to our town, the "First Impressions" initiative plans an extensive programme of activities. Over the past nine years, the Town Council has worked with Hertsmere Borough Council, Hertfordshire County Council, train operator Thameslink and local volunteer group Elstree Screen Heritage to make the station and other public spaces more attractive and welcoming, using high impact visuals from our unique film and television heritage.

But the 150th anniversary is the most ambitious challenge "First Impressions" has yet faced. With the support of a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund as well as funding from all the members of "First Impressions", the Elstree & Borehamwood Museum is staging a



6-month exhibition about the impact of our railway, drawing on its collection and the knowledge of its volunteers and local residents.

Staff and students at the EUTC (Elstree University Technical College) have helped create a brief documentary film with highlights from interviews with railway veterans. During the exhibition further interviews will be filmed with other railway staff as well as with local residents.

The exhibition will even feature a mock railway waiting room and ticket office from the 1940s and a range of exhibits. Most of the railway items in the exhibition have been loaned by the St. Albans Signal Box Preservation Trust.



A brief guide to the exhibition

Started in the early 19th century, British railways revolutionised how people lived, just as the advent of the age of the internet has done.

Elstree and Boreham Wood were farming communities of fewer than 300 people, living in just 50 houses, when in 1863 the Derby-based Midland Railway was granted 'Royal Assent' to extend its line from Bedford to London. On 13 July 1868 passenger services started running on what later became known as the Bed-Pan line.

The new Elstree station looked out over farmland, a few large houses... and little else. New industries and hopeful workers soon settled along the route of the railway, and within 30 years the local population had trebled.



By 1914, houses and shops had been built on land north and south of Shenley Road, in Furzehill Road, Glenhaven Avenue and Malden Road. Along with shops, pubs, a post office, churches and emergency services came businessmen and industrial pioneers.

The pioneer town of Borehamwood was well away from London smog and offered cheap land with good transport connections, and in 1914 a new state-of-the-art industry arrived when Neptune Film Company opened Lits studio in Clarendon Road. The film industry was to become the key employer in Borehamwood for the next 100 years.





During the First World War, Hertfordshire became a vast training and transit camp, and trains carried troops to the ports. The railways were again pushed to the limit during the Second World War. Railway staff were 'essential workers', and many women were employed to fill the skills shortage.

But this was the beginning of the end for steam engines. To meet the needs of a nation returning to normality, the railways were nationalised in 1948, creating British Rail. As road transport became cheaper and more reliable for moving goods, by the mid-1960s a third of routes and stations had been closed (the Beeching Cuts) to reduce costs. By 1968, steam locomotives had gone, replaced by diesel engines. The Bed-Pan line was then electrified, although an industrial dispute over 'driver-only' operation delayed the new trains for nearly a year. Elstree & Borehamwood station also changed, replaced with temporary structures alongside Platform One and a ticket office in a small building on Allum Lane.



In 1993 it was decided to break up British Rail; by 1997 a private company, Railtrack, controlled the track, signalling, land and buildings while private franchisees ran rail services. GTR (Govia Thameslink Railway) took over the franchise in 2014 and the old forecourt was transformed into an integrated transport interchange.

Thameslink continues to invest in the rail system and the station, with new high-tech trains and lifts. The station building itself is being redeveloped.





It's about the people too!

The story of the railway is not just about the trains. It's about the people: the people who run the station, sweep the floors, sell you tickets, maintain the track, drive the trains and operate the signals.

Trains and technology come and go, stations are demolished and rebuilt, but the dedicated people who have run the Bed-Pan line,

generation to generation, are the real champions behind the story of 150 Years of Rail at Elstree & Borehamwood.

The exhibition includes filmed interviews with several railway staff; highlights are shown below.

Cliff Watts

Cliff joined the Midland Railway in 1940 (aged 17) as an engine cleaner. He became a fireman and then drove steam engines, diesels and electrics until he retired in 1968.

"The best time on the railways was the steam days. The driver's money was just under £2 an hour and we didn't get any raises throughout the War."

"Steam engines? There were no two the same, and you could get 100 miles per hour coming downhill. But electrics? It was like driving a tram."





Bill Davies

In 1964 Bill joined as an engine cleaner in Nottingham, later becoming a driver. The Bed–Pan line started to be electrified on the same day he moved to Bedford.

A union rep for ASLEF (train drivers' union), Bill drove the first D.O.O. (Driver Only Operation) train from Bedford to St. Pancras in 1983.

"I wanted to be an engine driver, but they don't let you start at the age of three so I had to wait a bit before I could start." "It's much better to drive the commuters to work because you're guaranteed a seat".

Don O'Brien

Don joined the railway at Cricklewood in 1989 before working in stations at Luton, St. Albans and Kings Cross. He moved to Elstree & Borehamwood station 25 years ago and retired in 2016.

"I was amazed to discover the railways had so many rules. Back in the 1980s it was like joining the army."

"Relations with customers are important, and I do like a bit of banter. I made some nice friends, and worked with a great team. I will miss them."



Siggy Cragwell

Siggy came to the UK from Barbados in 1962 to join British Rail, where he worked as a cleaner, a chargeman, a supervisor and in customer care, coming to Elstree in 2007.

Paul Green

Born in Sheffield, Paul Green joined in 2000 in revenue protection at Kings Cross Thameslink, and has worked in customer care at Elstree since 2008.

"Customers like to see a familiar face." "The biggest change is the amount of people who use the station; that's gone up every year. When I first came here we had three staff on duty; now we have platform staff, ticket office staff, and barrier staff."

"When things start going wrong you've just got to get in there and try to do the best you can."



But there's even more to our celebration

The exhibition will be held at the Elstree & Borehamwood Museum on the second floor of the Community Centre ("96 Shenley Road").

Admission is free and the exhibition will run from 23 January until 21 July. The Museum is open from noon to 6pm every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and from 10am to 3pm every Saturday.

In conjunction with the exhibition, student learning packs have been prepared for local primary schools.

The Library is also based at 96 Shenley Road and plans to create its own displays and possibly run railway-themed reading programmes.

There will be a free display of model railroad track layouts on Sunday 24 June in the hall at 96 Shenley Road, and possibly a second display in April when local model railway enthusiasts will be invited to display their track layouts at 96 Shenley Road.

The series of local walks known as "Teddy's Trails" have proved very popular and a new rail-themed trail will be added for the 150th anniversary. Guides to these trails can be found on the Town Council's web site and have been designed so that walkers can follow a trail without being part of a formal guided tour. The new trail will also have its own printed guide, but plans are being made to host a tour of the trail, starting with an orientation session at Allum Manor.


Other activities, including free screenings of railway-themed films made in the town's studios, are being planned and will be announced in "Town Crier".

The 150th anniversary will be a golden opportunity for Thameslink to share positive news with residents. As Stuart Cheshire, Passenger Services Director, says: "We're delighted to be involved in this very special anniversary. It's a fabulous coincidence and highly appropriate that 150 years after trains first started serving Elstree, the Thameslink Programme will be completed giving Elstree & Borehamwood a very real improvement in service with many additional services and new trains."

This year the Town Council's Summer Civic Festival will have the 150th anniversary as its theme (see page 34). Cllr. Sandra Parnell represents Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council on "First Impressions" and says: "The Town Council has successfully worked as part of "First Impressions" for many years, helping to achieve something remarkable in Borehamwood. To now be involved with celebrating 150 years of our railway station is something we are really excited about!"

Money for JAM

How well is it used?

This is another important role for school governors. The term JAM comes from Theresa May's phrase "just about managing," which referred to people just getting by.

But it was Sir Nick Clegg in the coalition government who really did the most for these children. While in coalition Nick Clegg, alongside David Laws, managed to allocate extra funding for children who were on free school meals.

The money allocated is known as Pupil Premium money and about half of Borehamwood primary schools receive more than £100,000 a year extra money for these children. Almost 40% of Hertswood school's pupils are Pupil Premium and Borehamwood has more of these children than the national average. School governors have the important role of challenging schools on how well these large amounts of money are spent. A governor will meet with teachers and ask questions about how the money has been spent and how the schools know that it is effective.

What we are trying to do is break these children out of a spiral of low achievement by providing them with extra support and opportunities that will enable them to do as well as or better than non-free school meals children. Support is provided for attending breakfast clubs and for going on school visits. Extra training is provided for teachers and

teaching assistants in working with these children. Governors, too, go on special training to ensure that they are knowledgeable about Pupil Premium and how it is best used.

The tour showcased the Dongjin Culture Company that makes traditional Chinese art, a reconstructed village used as a film set, a Data Center in Huainan, and a visit to a sauce manufacturer. The group also had the opportunity to sample local Chinese dishes and visit Huainan's 1300 year-old Buddhist Temple and the Shou County Museum.

Introductions were made to various businesses that were keen to make links in the U.K., and a number of opportunities are currently being explored, including links with universities and schools for language exchanges, a football summer camp in Borehamwood and partnerships with film productions.

The China Sister Town gained support from the Foreign & Commonwealth Office and local MP, Oliver Dowden. The Foreign & Commonwealth Office stated that: "Initiatives such as these have helped to lay the ground for the strong bilateral relationship that we have with China, and will continue to be central to our aspiration to support the growth of both nations."

Elstree & Borehamwood's China Sister Town project was driven by the commitment and vision of our councillors who self-funded the trip to



Huainan, as well as seeking local business sponsorship and personally contributing to gifts for the representatives of Huainan. We owe our thanks to our

councillors and those involved in the project for preserving and working tirelessly to provide opportunities to our people and our town.



Aldenham Renaissance




The evening was a great success raising £500 for the Dementia Club



Sullivans Buses continue to play a significant part in the town year.





Teddy's Trail from Dyrham Park





This is one of eighteen walking routes through the local countryside, promoted by Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council and named after the fox terrier who helped to devise them.

The trail starts and finishes at the station, beginning with a bus ride via Barnet, followed by a gentle 6-mile walk.

Among the points of interest along the way, you will see



- A classical arch reputedly built to welcome King Charles II back from exile
- A tubular bell rung to tell golfers when the course is clear
- A field pattern which may be 3500 years old
- A six-wheeled gypsy caravan
- A radio transmitting station
- A "hoofbridge" built to allow horses to cross an arterial road
- An equestrian centre where horses are trained for show jumping
- An activity centre used by Scouts for camping and outdoor recreations
- A park built on the site of a former sewage works, which appears in the sitcom Birds of a Feather
- The studios where EastEnders and Holby City are filmed
- Borehamwood's original shops, oldest pub, first place of worship and first school.

Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council: Grants Awards 2017/18

In 2017 the Town Council is proud to have assisted the following organisations with grant awards to contribute to the cost of local activities which are of benefit to the community (or a section of it).

The total sum granted in Budgeted, Community, Special and Fee Waiver grants was: £11,959 as follows:

- First Impressions £4,000 (£1,000 for admin costs and £3,000 towards the 150 Years of the Railways event);
- BETTA (Twin Town Association) £1,000 for admin costs;
- Boreham Wood Football Club £1,000 for advertising;
- · Herts Inclusive Theatre £425 for theatre performance costs;
- · Monday Club Senior Citizens at Organ Hall £400 coach trip;
- DR96 Senior Citizens Drop In at 96 Shenley Road £400 coach trip;
- TWF Short Film Awards £200 for awards ceremony costs;
- · Community Hertsmere £1,000 for IT equipment;
- · Aldenham Country Park £800 for play equipment (for children with disabilities);
- Elstree Productions £500 for hall hire and props;
- Elstree and Borehamwood Dementia Support Group £1,374 (£500 for admin costs and £874 in free use of Fairway Hall for 23 weeks);
- Borehamwood and Elstree Synagogue JLEX Project £500 costs towards transport and hosting exhibition; and
- EBRA (Residents' Association) £360 in free quarter page adverts in Town Crier magazine.

The Council has agreed to a 3rd tranche of Community Grant awards! These will be considered by the General Management Committee at its meeting on 8 February 2018 for approval by Full Council on 14 March 2018.

Precept and financial matters 2018/19

The Town Council will not be increasing the precept demand on Hertsmere Borough Council (its share of the Council Tax) in 2018/19.

As such, the Band D yearly charge will remain at £36.26 as it was in 2017/18, making a total precept of £461,662.32. Whilst the Town Council receives no direct funding from central government, it relies on the precept for providing the lion's share of its services to the community. Other income is received from leases, rents and fees, although these monies largely subsidise rather than pay for the services that are provided.

The Council's accounts and accounting practices are audited each year by three tiers of auditors. In 2017/18 the Council was found to be performing to a high standard with no significant issues arising from the external auditor's report.

Developer contributions to Hertsmere Borough Council (s.106 monies) have and continue to assist the Town Council in rejuvenating its sites and assets where there is a legal power to do so (e.g. the redevelopment of Stapleton Gardens allotments site in the past year, providing a core and much enjoyed service to residents of Elstree and Borehamwood).

In addition, the Town Council receives Community Infrastructure Levy monies (CIL) from Hertsmere Borough Council to be spent on schemes, often in partnership with other authorities, which improve the local infrastructure (with £60,000 being utilised from the Town Council's allocation to install a bowling green in Aberford Park before the end of 2018).

The Council is committed to providing value for money services and its payments, budget, detailed income and expenditure reports, audit reports and precept information are published in accordance with good practice and regulations on its website

The Council may invite local clubs, societies or other voluntary and statutory organisations to provide an exhibition and/or a representative to speak about the work of their group.

The Town Mayor chairs the meeting. If the Mayor or Deputy Mayor is not able to attend, then the meeting will elect a chairperson from amongst those electors present. Other Town Councillors usually attend and will speak if need be. But the purpose of the meeting is to enable the ordinary electors to have their say. Councillors will listen with interest and as electors themselves, also have the opportunity to raise questions and make comments if they wish.
