The celebrations continue...

In our first issue in May last year we announced First Impressions, a project which planned to celebrate the rich film and television history created right here on our doorstep.

One year later and the results of Stage One are here for all to see and enjoy.

The train station, a key gateway to Elstree and Borehamwood, has been transformed by First Capital Connect. Making the best use of this opportunity to create a new look at the station the First Impressions team has placed iconic images in the booking hall, and added stars to the pavements and banners to the lighting columns.

The station forecourt now marks the start of a film and TV heritage trail. The plaques which the Town Council has awarded since 1996 have been cleaned and put back with added words and photos, displayed where they can more easily be seen, from the station down Shenley Road to the gates of Elstree Studios.

And now the latest addition to the station forecourt is in place, a wall relief over 20 feet high, designed by local artists to celebrate all those local residents whose skills behind the camera have helped make the films and television for which Elstree and Borehamwood are known all over the world.

That was the Summer of 1986 and the Town Council was able to move in to its first permanent home since 1894! The Council has decided to mark the occasion of its quarter Century and to wish it many more years of providing a well used and much loved facility as through the years the hall has been used for parties, wedding receptions, lectures, meetings, lunches, exhibitions as well as hosting a number of local groups, drop in centres, dance classes and performances.

Transport Forum back on track

After a gap of 15 months there was a full committee room at the Borough Council Offices for the resurrected Transport & Road Safety Forum, chaired by Cllr Clive Butchins under the auspices of the Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council.

The main agenda items, the County and Local Area traffic plans and the Transport for London experiment at Stirling Corner (where the traffic lights will be reactivated again soon) were discussed, as well as other issues relating to traffic and road safety in the area and changes to bus services. The minutes will be available on the Town Council website. The forum is open to the public and the next one will be on 27th October.



88 Years of Jam, Jerusalem and much more in Borehamwood

When Mrs Wellington set up a meeting in a church hall in Theobald Street in October, 1923 she probably didn't imagine that the branch of the Women's Institute she created would still be going strong 88 years later.

But here we are, fewer in number than the original 63 ladies who gathered that November to watch a demonstration on how to make a Christmas Pudding, a friendly, sociable group of local ladies.

In August 1924 Mrs Wellington held a garden party at her home the profits from which bought 120 sets of cups and saucers! The current president Mrs Elsie Roberts continues this tradition by holding a garden party at her home each year.

Sadly there are none of the original members with us today but one current member Mrs Florrie Cowley can still remember how when she came to Borehamwood in 1949 knowing no one in the area, it was her introduction to the Women's Institute that she really settled into the area.

Although a non-political organisation, these days the WI annually submits a resolution at its AGM, these are brought to the attention of the Government of the day, the last major resolution regarding the labelling of food to ensure that the actual country of origin of produce was known, went as far as the EU, resulting in an agreement with major supermarkets that anything stating "Made in the UK" means just that, not just produce from other countries assembled in the UK. Even earlier, when in 1991 the then Minister for Food, David Maclean addressed 10,000 ladies at their AGM he told them that because of the influence they could bring he felt it was the most important address of his career. The WI, he said, has been at the heart of good food for longer than any other institution in the United Kingdom. Few will forget the slow handclap which embarrassed Prime Minister Tony Blair when he addressed the assembly in 2000.

The current group of 19 ladies meet on the second Monday of each month in Room 3, Manor House, Allum Lane at 2 pm. All ages are represented – at a recent meeting the youngest present was 12 day old Harriet – getting a taste of an organisation that hopefully will last for the rest of her life! Why not drop in – visitors are welcome, new members especially so.

Demolition of the old village shops

In July, the old, boarded up shops in Shenley Road opposite Furzehill Road were demolished after a number of years vying for the title of Shenley Road's worst eye-sore.

The shops - the white buildings, shown in the picture on right had stood on the site for at least a century. Some were cottages that were converted into shops as Borehamwood developed. Until the year 2000 two purpose built shops of similar age were immediately to their right, on the site where the coffee shop now stands. One of these was run by the Hanson family for over 65 years, and is remembered by many for its delicious home made ice cream.

The brown brick building to the left, also demolished in July, was built in 1926 by the 'Northmet' Electrical Power Company for use as a showroom and offices. In that same year it had installed a transformer in the area behind the premises to provide the town with electricity for the first time. Part of the site had previously been occupied by a house called 'The Firs'. Today on the same site a bigger sub station named 'The Firs' supplies a large part of the electrical power consumed in the area.

Do any of the old village shops still exist?

The answer is yes. The oldest is in Theobald


Street, which was the first part of the area to be developed after the railway came in 1868. It is the tall row of five shops on the east side of the street (see photo below).

The shops were built by Henry Robinson a local land owner. At the time they were nicknamed 'Robinson's Folly as the population in the area was very small. However for the next twenty five years Theobald Street was the village centre.

By 1900 the area of development had shifted to Shenley Road and a row of four shops were built opposite the new 'Crown' followed shortly after by those on either side of Glenhaven Ave. All of these are still operating today. Together with those recently demolished, they were the forerunners of all the shops that now line Shenley Road.

In the late 1800s the locals coined the phrase 'Going down the Village' when visiting the village centre, Theobald Street. It was then applied to Shenley Road when it became the village centre. The phrase is still in use even though Borehamwood has been a town for the best part

of a century.



k Hill Admiralty Optical Telegraph, 1807

Two hundred years ago, following the French Revolution, Napoleon Bonaparte the self-appointed Emperor of the French used his military skills in an attempt to rule all of Europe.

Britain stood firm against Napoleon's aggression and The Royal Navy and its heroes such as Horatio Nelson took control of the seas to thwart attempts to invade England. The Admiralty, being at the centre of technological innovation, led the way in navigation, ship design and communication.

Today we take instant communication over long distances for granted, with our telephones, mobiles, and Internet connecting people with ease, but in those days life was very different.

In the days before electricity the only way to send messages long distances on land was by rider on horseback. It was a day's ride from Portsmouth to London.

In 1797 Lord George Murray invented an Optical Telegraph that consisted of just six shutters that could be individually opened and closed to make 64 different patterns that enabled the entire alphabet to be coded. Spare patterns were used to represent whole words or common phrases. The shutters were large enough to be seen at a great distance with the aid of recently invented telescopes. The Admiralty quickly saw the potential of his design and constructed optical telegraphs a few miles apart on towers or buildings at high points in the landscape so that every telegraph was visible by telescope from the next one in line.

Invasion was expected to occur in Kent so a


line of telegraphs ran from Deal to London, shortly followed by lines to the Navy's bases in Portsmouth and Plymouth.

The Great Yarmouth line came about in 1807 to include the East Coast Fleet in communications and was completed in 1808. The first station to the north after the Admiralty in Whitehall was at Telegraph Hill, Hampstead. The summit of Woodcock Hill, the site of our Woodcock Hill Village Green, at a distance of seven miles from Hampstead and eight miles from St Albans had an unobstructed view in both directions and provided an ideal site for the construction of a telegraph, trees having been cleared where necessary.

A plaque, commemorating the Telegraph, is soon to be erected on the Village Green.


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Borehamwood **Seniors**

Penniwells is the only Riding for the Disabled Centre within 30 miles providing hugely beneficial and enjoyable therapy for children and adults of all ages and disabilities.

140 riders benefit each week. Sessions are geared towards individual needs, which leads to increased self esteem and success according to capability. We have 14 horses and a team of 5 staff, supported by a very dedicated army of volunteers. Starting over 25 years ago with just 2 ponies and a shed, we now have first class facilities, including a large indoor and outdoor riding arena. The running costs of the centre are approx £100,000 per annum which is covered by donations, riders' fees and fund raising.

Penniwells is increasingly successful within RDA. We have riders competing at Regional, National & International level. In July this year 10 riders competed at the National RDA Championships - between them they won an incredible 18 classes with 5 becoming National Champions. We really do have riders with realistic dreams and goals of competing at European, World & Paralympic level - 2016 could become a reality.

Penniwells is a unique, special place expanding year by year. Our disabled riders derive great enjoyment from their activities and their successes. We are continuously looking for new volunteers to help with all aspects of the Centre - this can be from helping with the ponies, to leading and side helping in lessons or helping with gardening & maintenance.

Our ponies are all different shapes and sizes. The movement of the


horse is unrivalled for improvement in muscle tone, balance, co-ordination, communication, building core strength and giving a great sense of achievement.

Rotary is non religious and non political which means the organisation does not encounter the barriers that can hinder some other organisations when it comes to getting aid to a disaster area.

This does not mean that there are no Rotarians who are followers of Christianity, Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, etc; nor does it mean that no Rotarians become involved in politics, far from it. Several members of

the Rotary Club of Elstree and Borehamwood have been local councillors and 2 members of the Town Council are currently members of the Rotary Club.

All Rotarians do share a common faith, in that they believe that from their business or professional lives they are given skills and expertise to do some good in the community. Following the teaching 'to love your neighbour' does not necessarily mean the person next door, in the next street or even in the same town, although that does apply, because it can mean showing love for people in another country.

All Rotarians throughout the world follow the universal motto 'Service above Self'. The motto is the basis of Rotary Awards. A Rotary Award is presented to a child/student who has been nominated by his/her school for exceptional service, either to the school community or to the wider community.

The Rotary Club introduced Rotary Awards in 1971 when its president was Cyril Beattie, remembered by many as the town's photographer who had his shop near where the NatWest Bank is now sited.

The Club has made contact with a few former winners; one is Julie Murray, nee Strack. Julie obviously was set a good example by her mother Pat who has served our community through Girl Guiding and politics. Julie received her Rotary Award in 1983 when she was in the upper sixth in Nicholas Hawksmoor School. One of her teachers was David Clout, now a member of the Rotary Club. David reports that a few years ago he went to present Rotary Awards at Summerswood School and one of the recipients was Katie Murray, Julie's daughter and Pat Strack's granddaughter.

In either 1971 or 1972, one of the first recipients was Keith Macknelly who studied physics at University and went on to be a professional scientist.

Another winner from the 1980s is Simon Mansell who continues to do good work in the community as a member of the Borehamwood Brass Band; the band frequently plays in support of local charities and organisations such as the NSPCC.

Rotary Club President, Paul Clark, who received Rotary's accolade for his own exceptional service, the Paul Harris Fellowship, said' The Club is delighted to be celebrating 40 years of recognising our young citizens and it has been good to hear how some previous awardees have continued to serve the community.
