# A new look for an old friend

Conveniently located in the heart of Elstree & Borehamwood, Allum Manor has been serving our community for many years.

The Centre is run by the Elstree, Borehamwood and District Community Association (EBDCA) and has recently undergone a re-branding, plus an ongoing active marketing and refurbishment programme.

Now trading under the new name of Allum Manor – House and Hall, the centre hosts a very wide range of community events and is the ideal venue for all kinds of occasions, from exercise classes, activities for toddlers and babies, yoga, religious gatherings and business meetings in the Manor House, to wedding receptions, bar & bat mitzvahs, birthday and engagement parties, tea dancing, concerts and craft fairs in the Large Hall.

Originally constructed in the 17th century, the Manor House was extended in the 18th century and later remodelled around 1880.

In 1830 it was the birthplace of Euphrasia Haworth, author, artist and friend of the poet Robert Browning. Together with the great English actor William Macready, they formed an active local artistic and theatrical group.

Thirty years later the Manor House was the residence of Charles Gordon, a gin distiller (yes, THAT Gordon!). It is also believed that Baroness Orczy was living in the Manor House in the early 20th century when she wrote "The Scarlet Pimpernel".

In 1951, through fundraising led by Dame Anna Neagle, EBDCA acquired the Manor House for the benefit of the community. An All-Star Midnight Matinee was held at the Ritz Cinema, Edgware, featuring Richard Attenborough, Norman Wisdom and 21-year-old Audrey Hepburn.

In the 1990s refurbishment began and a new large hall was built. The Manor House and Allum Hall were officially re-opened in 1998.

Local stalwart and Chair of Trustees since 1998, Jim Mckean is confident the new look Allum Manor will increase awareness of the unique features of the centre and so increase the service it has been delivering to the community for over 60 years.

# 40 years of service to the visually impaired

On 4 January the 2000th edition of the Talking Newspaper was recorded. This meant the Radlett, Elstree, Borehamwood and Shenley Talking Newspaper has been letting some light into the dark world of blind and partially sighted people of the area for 40 years.

The organisation was started by Julian Bishopp with the support of fellow Round Tablers. For 32 years the weekly recordings were sent to listeners on audio cassettes but in 2010 the organisation started to use USB memory sticks and provided each listener with a playback box/boom box.

For many years the recordings were made in the vestry of the chapel of Shenley Hospital but today we have a dedicated studio in the Village Institute. Each recording has about 30 minutes of local news and about 30 minutes of magazine articles.

There is no cost to a listener and that includes free postage for the return of the memory sticks. We run with the help of 50-plus volunteers, readers, editors, controllers and copiers.

We thank councillors on the borough council for their support in providing grants to the organisation, and the local sorting office and its postal staff for looking after us.

# New entertainment arena for Meadow Park

Following a presentation made to Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council by Andrew Grady, secretary of Borehamwood Brass on 22 November 2017. The Borehamwood Band Stand Committee was set up. The committee comprises members from the town council, the Rotary and Satellite Clubs and the borough council. The current Hertsmere Borough Council refurbishment plan for Meadow Park has been updated to include a band stand.

The committee has arranged a series of brass band concerts. Over the summer there will be four Sunday afternoon brass band concerts starting at 3pm on each date, in a temporary performance arena. The aim is to allow residents to see how this facility will benefit the wider community in Elstree and Borehamwood.

The Committee is planning that the permanent structure will be fit for purpose, having all the necessary facilities required to make this an arena to be used by a wide variety of community groups.

Working with the London & Home Counties Brass Band Association, brass bands from Hertfordshire will be performing on four separate dates during June and July. The details are:

What is a defibrillator (AED)?

Here in Elstree and Borehamwood, the "Defibrillator Team" took the initiative to make sure everybody ,young or old, who might be in need of a lifesaving defibrillator has one available nearby. We are proud that we enabled 50 defibrillators to be available for the people of Elstree and Borehamwood.






# **Gratitude for bird feeders**



The topics that school governors have to deal with increase by the minute and increase the amount of time that we, as volunteers, have to spend.

The most pressing decisions that we have to take are to do directly with the children, although we may also get involved in more mundane decisions like carpeting, curtains and parking.

A most interesting topic today is the spending on sport and its effectiveness. Since 2015, the Government has provided money specifically for sport in schools and this is known as the Sports Premium. For a small primary school, it is around £16k, and £20k for a larger one and it must be spent on sport-related activities. We have to ensure that it is used effectively and contributes to the good health and lifestyle of the children.

For Key Stage 1 the expectation is that they undertake at least 30 minutes of physical activity every day in school. For all older children, it is intended that the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement. One way that schools can show how they are doing is through the Sainsbury Sports Kite Mark. This can be achieved at three levels; Bronze, Silver and Gold.

Today, as we would expect, girls benefit just as much as boys, and girls' football in particular has flourished in our community. I remember when my granddaughter was at Kenilworth School; she not only

played football but also mixed netball and rounders. Some girls are so good that they also play in the boys' football teams.

Schools have to account for how effectively they have used their Sports Premium

money and from last year National Curriculum swimming performances had to be included. The number of Year 6 children who can swim 25 metres and use a range of strokes effectively has to be counted.

We are fortunate that transport to The Venue swimming pool is free for all our primary schools, as it is funded by our Town Council.

Borehamwood and Elstree schools are always pleased to consider anyone who wants to join them as governors. It is an interesting and worthwhile way in which you can contribute to our community. Governors do make a difference, and having been involved in three Ofsted inspections in the last six months, I can vouch for this.

# 150 years of rail... and it's "All Change!"

150 years ago in the summer of 1868, a railway station was built. At a stroke, Elstree (the name given to the new station) was connected to a new rail line straight into London.

New businesses swarmed to the small village of Boreham Wood, eager to transport their goods to London. Adding a passenger rail service also created... the commuter. And in 1914 it was the rail service, offering rapid access to Elstree & Borehamwood, which attracted the first of the many film studios who made their home here.

Old railway engines and carriages have been replaced by new rolling stock fit for the 21st century. And from May, new timetables will increase the frequency of the rail service.

The rate of growth of passenger traffic, already in the top 5% in the UK, is expected to continue, and so our station is now being redeveloped. Our local rail service changed Elstree & Borehamwood forever and will continue to be a key to the town's growth. Almost 3.5 million passenger journeys are made to and from our local station each year.

How to celebrate this 150th anniversary? We've started with "All Change!", an exhibition in the museum located in the Community Centre at 96 Shenley Road.

This is an exhibition with a real difference; inside the museum, volunteers have built a railway station! Visitors pass through rooms decorated in the style of the 1940s, discovering surprises around each corner. Relics of the days of steam engines and hand-operated signals mingle with personal mementos loaned by local residents, plus interviews filmed with railway staff happy to share their memories.

Funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and members of the "First Impressions" initiative, the exhibition is free to all and open four days a week at 96 Shenley Road until October.

But there's more! Local primary school classes are visiting the exhibition, with lots of activities to keep young visitors engaged. The Town Council has adopted the 150th anniversary as the theme of its Summer Festival, starting with the parade on 16 June.

There will also be a free display of model railroad

track layouts by the South West Herts Model Railway Society on 24 June.

An addition to "Teddy's Trails" will be launched in May, "National Walking Month". You'll find details about this new "rail trail" at Herts. County Council's "Walks and More" website.

And now the forecourt of the railway station has been decorated with new banners as reminders of the 150th anniversary, "From the past... into the future".

2018 will be a memorable

year for Elstree & Borehamwood, the home of UK film and television. See you at the station, where it's "All Change!"

# Volunteering for the Home Library Service at Borehamwood Library

We run a wonderful and much appreciated Home Library Service enabling housebound customers to receive a selection of library books every four weeks once they are no longer able to get into the library, if they become less mobile or are a carer for a relative.

We would really like to be able to offer this to even more customers but we need your help! We manage the customers and provide the books but we need more of oue lovely volunteers to help us choose and deliver them.

Here are a few words from one of our existing volunteers:

"I always found reading for pleasure was a lovely way to switch off and one day I looked up from choosing a book for myself and saw a poster enquiring 'Would you like to take books to housebound readers?'

"I would be utterly lost without a book to escape into, so I applied for the role."

What does the job involve and how often? Once every four weeks, I choose the books and then deliver them. I also have the

support of library staff to choose the right books and contact the customers.

# How long does it take? It usually takes me around an hour to choose books. Delivery

times vary as some days my customers don't want to take time to chat with me, and some days they do. All are interesting to talk to on any number of subjects and many have a full lifetimes of experience to call on.

**Would I recommend the job to anyone?** That's a very easy question to answer, with a resounding YES. Each person is different and so interesting to meet up with. Moreover, all are extremely grateful that they can get a regular supply of books to enjoy".

**Fuel** - Many return food to us because they do not have fuel to cook it



# **Goods For Good**

In December 2017, Borehamwood-based charity, Goods For Good, hit a milestone after just over three years in operation.

The charity, which sends overstocked goods donated by UK businesses and individuals to vulnerable communities around the world, provided over a million refugees overseas with £12 million-worth of donated goods.

"Thanks to generous support, including the support of our new Ambassador, Cllr Gary Silver, aid has reached refugee camps in Kurdistan as well as those in need in Ukraine, Israel, Syria and Zimbabwe," said Goods For Good founder and CEO Rosalind Bluestone. "We reached a milestone, but there are many more people that urgently need our help. To think of mothers without blankets or nappies for their babies is unimaginable."

The charity has coordinated donations from 65 UK companies, sending over 200 consignments, helping people in 12 countries globally. This has been accomplished with industry donors such as Harrods, Regatta, Nike, Next, Dune and the Dutch-registered charity, HRIF. A network of volunteers of all ages, faiths and backgrounds works together in Borehamwood for those in need.

For businesses, donating overstocked goods, such as nappies, shoes and bedding, the charity provides a way of helping vulnerable communities, as well as the environment. "Instead of sending these goods to landfill, they go to those in desperate need," said Rosalind.

Recently, Goods For Good began to donate second hand goods donated by the local community to provide local charities with goods needed to support their clients. Rosalind said, "There are so many people in need locally, as well as internationally. The generosity of the local community means we are able to provide exactly what is required for local charities that support the homeless, victims of domestic abuse, asylum seekers and refugees."

Rosalind and the charity's trustees have ambitions to hit a milestone of £25million-worth of donated overstocked goods by 2020.





**Planning and Consultations:** The council considered a total of 364 planning applications referred to it by Hertsmere Borough Council as a statutory consultee. Comments were made on 93 of these with concerns including issues of tower block developments, problems with smaller unit developments failing to meet local needs for family sized homes, highways infrastructure and potential basement developments negatively impacting the water table. Members also raised concerns over the high levels of retrospective applications locally. Consultation responses were made on the Hertsmere Local Plan (Planning for Growth), Local Council Tax Support Scheme and the Electoral Review of Hertsmere.

Site and Street Maintenance: In partnership with local businesses, the Council maintains the film plaques in Borehamwood, 47 benches and 10 notice boards. Both War Memorials, St Nicholas and All Saints Churchyard (and Church Clocks) are maintained by the grounds team and the High Street planter cost is shared with Hertsmere Borough Council.

**Grants:** In 2017/18 the Town Council was proud to have assisted the following organisations with grant awards to contribute to the cost of local activities which are of benefit to the Community (or a section of it).

The total sum granted in Budgeted, Community, Special and Fee Waiver grants was £14,959 as follows:

- Elstree and Borehamwood Dementia Support Group £1,374 (£500 for admin costs and £874 in free use of Fairway Hall for 23 weeks);
- Borehamwood and Elstree Synagogue JLEX Project £500 costs towards transport and hosting Exhibition; and
- EBRA (Residents' Association) £360 in free quarter page adverts in Town Crier magazine.
- Borehamwood Bandstand Project £3,000.

**Transport Forum:** Four well attended meetings of the forum took place with lively discussions on topics including potholes at Elstree and Borehamwood Railway Station bridge, train timetables and services, bus service changes, police updates and traffic flow in Borehamwood and Elstree.

**Business Forum:** Five meetings of the group took place in the year, providing networking and sponsorship opportunities for local businesses of varying sizes. The Forum also provided a platform for guest speakers to offer advice on relevant issues (e.g. Business working in China, Recyclable Plastic Carrier Bags and Prosthetics for film and medical use).

**China Sister Town:** The council signed a memorandum of understanding with Huainan in China in order to promote business links and for cultural and friendship contacts to be formed.

## **Leisure and Entertainment**

**Coach Trips:** the 12 subsidised Summer coach trips for the over 60s included two trips to both Eastbourne and Broadstairs with new destinations planned for Brighton and Oxford. In addition, due to popular demand resulting from the success of 2016/17, two Christmas Market Winter trips visited Winchester and Canterbury. Luxury 53 seater coaches were provided by local company, Hearns.

Civic Festival: The Festival fortnight began with a civic parade dedicated to the 40th Anniversary of Star Wars being filmed at Elstree Studios. Highlights included a free outdoor screening of Rogue One: A Star Wars Story at Maxwell Park Community Centre, a screening of Elstree 1976 at Fairway Hall with Q&A from director Jon Spira, Star Wars table-top role playing evening, John Williams BBC Band concert at Allum Hall, Borehamwood's Got Talent! (with thanks to Elstree Productions for helping on the evening), Teddy's Trail community walk (led by walk creator John Cartledge), Festival 5k Run at Aldenham Country Park (in conjunction with Park Run), allotment open day, the Annual Festival Flower show, Primary School Performing Arts and Royal British Legion Festival Quiz. Families Day included 44 community stalls with the addition of a traditional seaside Punch and Judy show (suitable for audiences of all ages). Arena events were Joseph Pearce Fire Show and Above and Beyond Acrobatics. Throughout the Festival, characters in Star Wars costume helped to bring a sense of occasion and celebration to the activities.
