

Precept 2012/13: The Town Council's commitment to value for money

The Town Council has no income from Central Government. All income is obtained from the share of the Council Tax (the Precept) or from rents and fees of Council owned land or property (e.g. allotment rents or Fairway Hall fees). The Council faces a wide range of financial challenges this year; chiefly in continuing to provide high quality services that residents expect and deserve, but also in ensuring that adequate provision is made for asset maintenance and in improving community based initiatives and events.

Nevertheless, recognising the effects of the current economic climate and in a commitment to providing value for money to residents, at its January meeting, the Town Council once again decided to freeze the Precept Demand for 2012/13. As such, the cost to the Band D Council Tax payer will remain at £24.12 per year (in other words just 50p per week) to fund all of the Town Council's wide range of services and terrific events.



Christmas review

Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council continued the yearly tradition of Christmas lights for the festive season, with stunning new designs placed around the Town for 2011.

The official ceremony for the Lights switch on took place on Sunday 4th December where a large supportive turnout of around 600 people enduring the cold weather outside All Saints church to see the high street lit up by the Town Mayor Sandra Parnell.

The gathered crowd enjoyed the switch on celebrations in a great friendly community atmosphere whilst enjoying Borehamwood Brass

Band, who of course, played to their usual level of excellence.

The rather impressive temporary Ice Skating Rink, aimed at children, proved very popular for the whole five hours it was there, and the vintage carousel was just as exciting for the young ones.

Six year old Katie described the entertainment as

"Fantastic fun".

The lights remained in place for the festive season and were safely removed in January so everything went brilliantly




Diamond Jubilee Beacon

WHVG committee in conjunction with the Town council is inviting all residents to join in the Diamond Jubilee celebrations at Woodcock Hill. The event will take place on Monday 4 June 7.30 for 8pm start.

Local organisations have been invited and a wide range of entertainment is planned to be on offer. The Beacon will form part of the National Chain that will be lit across the country. The first Beacon will be lit at Buckingham Palace at 10pm. Our Beacon will be lit at about 10.05pm

Borough Councillors representing Town Wards have provided funding for the replica beacon, which will cost nearly £2,000. Thanks to Morris Bright, Harvey Cohen, Hannah David, Sam Dobin, Derrick Guneskera, Sandra Parnell, Pat Strack and Andrew Zucker. A permanent site for the Beacon will be found in the Town at a later stage.

The Beacon site at Woodcock Hill is a very special place, steeped in history; it was a beacon site in 1588 to celebrate the defeat





In 1988 the Town organised a Beacon lighting in celebration of the tri-centenary of the Armada defeat. The District Venture Scouts were stewards at the event where school children processed from Vale Avenue to the Beacon arena at the top of the hill, dressed in period costume, they carried lanterns and were led by Queen Elizabeth I.

We look forward to continuing the Borehamwood Beacon History in June 2012.

Borehamwood library: Keeping the service open for longer!

The Town Council has paid for Borehamwood library to open for three additional hours on a Thursday between 11am and 2pm - the busiest of the days when the library is not currently open for the full day. This funding commenced in December 2011 and is committed in the Council's 2012/13 budget for the Council year ahead.

Also, since January, the library has been open for an extra three hours on a Tuesday between 11am and 2pm following Hertsmere Borough Council's decision to match the Town Council's funding.

The Town Council recognises that libraries play an important role in developing children's literacy skills, helping parents to read with their children and supporting schools with projects that promote reading.

You can use the library to:

- Borrow books, maps, videos, DVDs, music recordings, audio books, language courses, music scores and playsets
- Find information
- Use computer facilities, including internet access
- Read a newspaper or magazine
- Attend a storytime, a baby rhyme time, a homework club or a reading group
- Photocopy or send a fax.

You will need to show one form of identification that shows your name and current address, such as a bank statement, rent book, driving licence, utility bill.





In the last edition of the Town Crier we reported on the Council's commitment to create more allotment plots at the Allum Lane site.

Listening to the very best advice (which included the commissioning of an environmental and ecological survey), we are delighted to announce that by the time that you are reading this article, the work will have been completed.

As such, if you are already on the waiting list for a plot at this location, you can expect a telephone call in the early Spring inviting you to take up a fresh plot or half a plot depending on your needs and the availability.

The Council was mindful that there are many plants and animals protected by legislation which must be considered before any works were undertaken. Some examples as below:

- hedges which may have nesting birds
- woodlands or scrub which may support nesting birds and mammals such as badgers, hedgehogs and dormice
- ponds or watercourses which may support otters or amphibians.

As well as providing a space for humans to grow fruit and vegetables, the Council wants the site to be a green space and haven for wildlife.

The Council's Environment and Planning Committee has worked hard to bring about this improvement which should increase the number of plot holders leasing allotments from the Council from 124 to 145 or thereabouts.

Big local update

The Big Local Project will be funded by the Lottery for up to £1 million to get people more actively involved in improving their community and be the decision makers of this project over a 10 year period.

A group of local residents from the Leeming/Aycliffe Road area of Borehamwood, have been producing a Community Profile that reflects key issues affecting their community and potential strategies for dealing with them. These issues have emerged from the comprehensive consultation work that Community Action Hertsmere has completed over the last 9 months.

Under our stewardship, the park will remain an oasis for quiet countryside enjoyment, outdoor recreation, farming, education and a great value day out.

Our emblem is a bee (you can see it in the top right corner of this page). Whatever we do, we always bear in mind the bees. We will run the park in the same manner as we do Church Farm (see www.churchfarmardeley.co.uk), for food, people and wildlife, with free range outdoor activities for people of all ages.

We aim to introduce Red Poll cattle, Black Welsh Mountain sheep, British Lop and Berkshire pigs, as well as Norfolk Black turkeys, Embden geese, Aylesbury ducks, and laying hens. Grow-Your-Own vegetable plots will be made available to local groups. Over the coming months, we will be providing outdoor fitness opportunities, woodland adventures, events, food and craft markets and more, all in partnership with local people.

We would like to extend an invitation to you to visit the park during the first week, when we'll be holding special events.

We look forward to welcoming familiar and new visitors to Aldenham Country Park.








Pooh Bear's 100 Aker Wood





Hire Fairway Hall



8 March Projected Image of the Year; 15 March Print of the Year


These are followed by our AGM and Presentation Evening – we then have our Easter recess and return on 19 April 2012 when we start the beginning of our 50th Anniversary Year.

It was not all doom and gloom in 1942.

After 3 years of war, life was pretty tough in 1942 but a group of local business people looked to the future by founding the Rotary Club of Elstree and Borehamwood. In 2012 the Club celebrates 70 years of service to the community and starts its celebrations with a screening of the 1942 film Casablanca, the top grossing film of that year. The Club's President Paul Clark, said 'The Club's greatest fund raising event involved a film evening; in 1951 the Club organised a midnight matinee involving a large number of film stars of the time, including local resident Anna Neagle. So it seemed appropriate in this film orientated town to celebrate with a film evening.' Many people will know of the many ways in which Rotarians have enriched this community, as a group in the club and through individual service; so we hope many of our friends will come and join us on the evening.

An all star mid night matinee was held at the Ritz Cinema in Edgware on June 1 1951 to raise funds for the purchase of Allum Hall and four and a half acres of land. It was organised by Leslie Henson and the Rotary Club. Among the artistes were Frances Day, Robertson Hare, Ronald Shiner, Richard Attenborough, Leslie Henson, Norman Wisdom, Anona Winn, Audrey Hepburn, Richard Murdock and Kenneth Horne. Local resident, Anna Neagle, was the president of the District Public Hall Association. Audrey Hepburn, then only 21 years old, had just made her film debut but was prepared to sell programmes to help the people of Boreham Wood and Elstree.

In 1942 Rotary was a male only organisation but from about 1990 membership has been opened up to ladies. One of the first lady members was Barbara Kennedy, manager of Cross Roads Carers South. She was the Club's first lady president in 2003/4.

The universal motto of Rotary is 'Service above Self'; all Rotarians give freely of their time to put something back into the community. However, some give exceptional service and Rotary has its own honours system, the Paul Harris Fellowship, which is only awarded to Rotarians whose service has been exceptional. Over the years several members of the Club have been presented with this prestigious award. Recently this award was presented to John Page and David Rose who have given dedicated service over many years.
