Brilliant ten year- old singer Riley Levene thrilled his audience and won several standing ovations.

A drumming workshop was a great success and was enjoyed by all the participants, including one elderly gentleman, who kept playing even while he was falling asleep!

A Leaders' Brunch brought together civic and business leaders in a dynamic networking session.

The Mayor spoke of the importance of media engagement with the festival. "We gave interviews to Barnet TV, BBC Three Counties Radio and Radio Verulam. The Town Crier published an extensive spread

about this new initiative. We have made an important start in recognising that we are now a multi- cultural community.

In our diversity lies our strength. Let us go forward together".

At the Visually Impaired Club, we had a lovely time celebrating Edith Oakley's 99th birthday.



She has raised more than £250,000 and was awarded the Civic Award in 2018, by Hertsmere Borough Council.

He told me he didn't water his courgettes either and had never had such a bountiful crop... bottom of a slope... underground spring... pipe leak... fairies???? Take your pick.





Here are this year's 2018 cup winners for Melrose Avenue and Allum Lane allotments

Melrose – Alf Warman Cup for "Best Plot" went to Mark Young who is a hard act to beat. His plot is always organised and immaculate, leaving no stone unturned (usefully chucked under the shed). He is a good example to us all, as he also cares for the area surrounding his plot, planting up neglected borders and generally caring for the site.

John Clarke Cup for "Best Effort" went to Kevin Hempstead who recently moved onto his plot which is now planted up to bursting. He installed several raised beds, a pond, and a rockery with interesting and attractive plants to encourage insects. Ponds are also known to attract frogs which help keep pests at bay....not so for Kevin's pond where 'Jaws' skulks in its murky depths.

Neil Mapp Cup for "Most Produce" went to Harry Murphy who was the allotment site's undoubted all-rounder, trying new varieties, planting in every available space, and all year round. He puts in Herculean efforts from early morning to the last sun ray, and still finds time to give the odd hand to neighbours, and offer up his extra seedlings or veg.

Tom Cunningham "Good Neighbour" Cup is a new cup which is awarded to the person who shows the most neighbourly attributes – named after our own beloved Tom Cunningham who never held back on giving good advice, help, a cup of tea, a chat, and all with passion cup winner in the form of Jim Mullen who in his calm, assured and steady way, goes out of his way to help allotment plot holders far and near, and he makes a perfect cup of tea which he can now drink from his Tom Cunningham Cup mug.

Allum – "Most Produce" Cup went to D Worley aka Louis, whose plot is crammed to bursting with top quality specimens, varieties that you just have to ask about, traditional ones that warm your heart, and he is a great example, giving encouragement to all. He has the magic touch.

"Best Plot" Cup went to A Leith who had a very tidy plot, crisp managed borders, and with different beds of produce....a lot of work went into it, with deserved acknowledgement for a great effort to excellent effect.

I'm a little teapot!

Some of us can remember going to nursery all day, having lunch there and everyone having a sleep there in the afternoons on truckle beds.

There were mostly play activities but at the time these were not as educationally based as they are today. As a governor, showing a recent interest in early years education, there seems to be just as much work and planning going on as for much older children.

I do not recall there being as much emphasis on keeping children safe as there is now. One of the things you will see as you go into a nursery will be notices banning mobile phones. Staff have to hand them into the office and only retrieve them at the end of the day or by prior arrangement.



All this came about because a nursery worker at Little Ted's child care centre in Plymouth pleaded guilty to taking pictures of herself abusing children, and sharing them with other paedophiles on the internet. As a result of this type of incident, lessons have

been learnt that ensure children are safer today than they have ever been.

Children in the nursery are encouraged to explore, moving from things that they are familiar with to having a go at something new. It is important for them to keep trying activities and enjoy achieving something new. The adults help children to develop their own ideas and to see links to



other things Children certainly have fun in the nursery. On one occasion children had been provided with a large bowl of soapy water that they were using with brushes to sweep down the playground. Another time children were adding glitter to figures they had made using play dough. As the children progress they are made responsible for clearing up and putting things away. This is directing them onto the path of independence that is so important for them.

"All Change!"

150 years of railway, from the past into the future

A day to remember

When it was completed in 1868, the new terminal building for St. Pancras Station was the largest manmade structure in the world! Extensively rebuilt at a cost of £800 million, it was reopened in 2007 as St. Pancras International. Now home to Eurostar, the station remains an impressive London landmark.

The station was built as part of the construction of a rail link from Bedford to London 150 years ago. Elstree & Borehamwood station was also built as part of that link, and all year we've been celebrating our shared anniversary.

The Town Council's Youth Council has been active in those celebrations, helping publicise model railway displays and the "All Change!" exhibition at the museum.

In return we were able to arrange for them a tour of St. Pancras International Station. The Marketing Manager of High Speed 1 kindly organised a tour guide, while GTR Thameslink enabled Youth Councillors to travel free of charge.

On the morning of 28 October, the group of Youth Councillors (Raisa, Rahma, Adam, Alex, Noah, Leo and Natan) accompanied by Cllr. Sandra Parnell and "First Impression's"

Bob Redman set off from Elstree & Borehamwood Station to meet their guide, Mike Moran.

After an hour and a half there wasn't a corner of the station which the group had not visited. So much has happened over the past 150 years in this remarkable building, full of fascinating facts which Mike shared with the group.







Returning to our own station, the group spotted new posters describing plans to redevelop our own station, though not on the scale of St. Pancras! Here's to those changes and the next 150 years of rail in Elstree & Borehamwood.

Youth council trip to St Pancras

On Sunday 28 September I went on the St. Pancras walking tour with the Elstree and Borehamwood Youth Council, kindly arranged by Mr. Bob Redman and this is what I have to report back.

The 90-minute tour was fascinating despite the fact that it was absolutely freezing. The tour guide was very charismatic and had loads of information to share.

He spoke about both Kings Cross and St Pancras International. The tour guide stunned us with facts and statistics regarding all of the station buildings. I never knew that the arches in Kings Cross are 110 FT wide- as the builders in the nineteenth century were scared to build an arch any wider so they built two arches instead of one. Yet, the one arch in St Pancras is 240 ft. wide – this is because St Pancras was built slightly later by which point the builders believed that they could safely build an arch over double the size of the arches in Kings Cross. Overall, I would give the tour top marks and I would recommend it to a friend.

Ken Custance continues as the bookkeeper.







On Tuesday 23 October we started a brand new exhibition which tells the story of the campaign thirty years ago to save Elstree Studios from closure.

Turkey and tinsel


A first for the club this year will be a trip to Pontin's Pakefield Camp for turkey and tinsel.

Dr Peter Wong-Morrow


Dr Peter Wong-Morrow is a role model who works closely with the Chinese-British community, promoting integration and social cohesion through business and charity work.

Remembering Rangers

A booklet has recently been printed locally for the centenary of Ranger Guides last year, in which some Hertfordshire ladies have contributed their memories and photographs of their youthful exploits as Land or Sea Rangers.

Among these was our own nonagenarian, Florrie Cowley, then living in Whetstone. When war was declared in 1939, her group was amalgamated into a district company in Friern Barnet, and they volunteered at once to help at Friern Barnet Hospital, where part was set aside for bomb casualties. They worked in pairs with one trained nurse, one evening a week, on a 3-4-hour shift, on a men's ward of 30-40 patients. Their duties included distributing dinners, washing the patients, helping with medication and dealing with bedpans.

Another local lady featured in the booklet, who was a member of 1st Radlett Rangers in the 1930s, was Gladys Harrison, who later became the Captain of 1st Elstree Guides for many years, and led them to earn innumerable awards.



Borehamwood Band Stand Project Meadow Park

The idea originated to provide a tribute to John Page, a former Rotarian, and his work for residents at Allum Manor and Maxwell Park community centres.

The committee from the Rotary Clubs of Elstree and Borehamwood and the Studios, (Pat Strack chair, Norman Shuker treasurer, Andrew Grady, secretary and Nick Male and Dan Salter, Town entertainments officer) continued to meet with partners, the Town Council, Hertsmere Borough Council and other stakeholders to move the temporary band stand project towards a permanent band stand for Meadow Park. Now that five concerts have been held at Meadow Park, the steering committee will use lessons learnt to inform the final design about size, acoustics and technical details.

In the five concerts we had four brass bands a funky band Soul Jump with a screen and animation. Writers in the Wood read their poems and other works. The U3A ukulele band 'Strummers in the Wood' performed as well. Comments from future users will be considered so that their ideas are used in the final design.

We learnt that shelter is needed from the sun and in future years other weather effects. This year three gazebos were erected for the audience.





Pillboxes, prefabs and pylons: the origin of Teddy's Trails

How much do you know about the history of pillboxes, prefabs or pylons? Readers who have walked Teddy's Trails, published on the Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council's website, will be better informed about all three, and many other landscape features besides.

As anyone who shares their home with a lively dog can attest, canine housemates are no respecters of prior claims on one's time. This was borne in on me very forcefully when I took partial retirement. Retreating to my room and closing the door was no deterrent. Frantic scratching from the other side accompanied by plaintive mewing signified that Teddy, the resident fox terrier, was up for a walk - and that all other activities would have to be put on hold until his demands had been satisfied.

So he and I came to explore the local rights of way around Boreham Wood more thoroughly in a matter of weeks than I had done in the previous five decades. And what struck me at once was how underused many of them appeared to be. Although we are only twelve miles from Trafalgar Square, Green Belt planning controls mean that we are surrounded by open countryside, which plays host to a dense network of paths offering all sorts of different route options. The paths are generally well signed, and very few are obstructed, yet we could walk for miles without meeting anyone.

Conversations with acquaintances led me to conclude that part of the reason for this is simply that many people have limited map-reading skills, and only travel by car. Although they may be aware of footpath signs at the roadside, they have no idea where these lead to, or what may lie on the other side of the hedge. And they cannot conceive of going for any walk which does not start at a car park. They don't get out and about on foot because they simply don't know how to – and they are the losers as a result. So the idea of Teddy's Trails was born.

The Trails are a network of 18 different routes radiating from our local station. Each one starts with a bus ride to a stop near the end of a path, and leads back to the town along public paths and country lanes. They range in length from three to eight miles, and most pass a pub or a café along the way. For each Trail there is an on-line guide describing the route, including details of the outward bus journey.

But these are not simply walk instructions. Each guide contains copious notes about points of interest en route, and personalities connected

with the area. An eclectic cast appears... including Queen Adelaide, Amy Winehouse, Boudicca, Charles II,

Dick Turpin, Douglas Jardine, Edward Elgar, Graham and Damon Hill, Julius Caesar, Karren Brady, The Kinks, The Muppets, Napoleon Bonaparte, two Richard Burtons, Sacha Baron Cohen, Simon Cowell, Stamford Raffles and Wham!... not forgetting three ghosts. And because the town plays host to film and TV studios, locations used in soap operas, detective series and horror movies abound. Some people who cannot walk the Trails have nevertheless used the guides as an introduction to local history.

To find the Trails, just enter "Teddy's Trails" in a search engine or go to www.elstreeborehamwood-tc.gov.uk/index.php/yourtown/teddy-strails. Printed copies of individual trail guides are available from the council on request.

Oh ... and if you want to know why the town's name is spelled in this article as both one word and two, study of the Trails will give you the answer to that, too.



Have you discovered....? Teddy's Trail from Edgware





This is one of eighteen walking routes through the local countryside, promoted by Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council and named after the fox terrier who helped to devise them.

The trail starts and finishes at the station, beginning with a 13 minute bus ride, followed by a gentle 3.2 mile walk.

Among the points of interest along the way, you will see and learn about

- A beautiful park containing a rose garden and specimens of the rare wild service tree
- Part of a "community forest" planted to revitalise the countryside around the edge of London
- The cemetery where the ashes of singer Amy Winehouse are interred
- A farmhouse which was attacked by the notorious highwayman Dick Turpin and members of his gang
- · A stretch of motorway used by 24 million vehicles every year
- A farm which is home to the charity Riding for the Disabled
- A hotel patronised by celebrated film stars working at Elstree Studios
- Probably the only giraffe in Hertfordshire
- The site of a house once occupied by an explorer who was the first non-Muslim European visitor to Mecca and who translated The Arabian Nights into English
- Streets whose names commemorate leading film and TV industry personalities Blattner, Tauber, Nash, Grade.

Woodcock Hill Village Green

Woodcock Hill Village Green AGM Tuesday 23 October 2018

After the chairman had given the annual report members discussed the recent newsletter from Hertsmere Borough Council 'Planning for Growth.'

Huge concerns were expressed about the amount of building that had



already taken place in the town and the lack of infrastructure to support this. Specifically to Woodcock Hill area residents, Taylor Wimpey will be building an extra 240 homes between the railway and the Fire Research Station Estate. The site has been cleared and building will start soon.

Housing and Economic Availability Assessment

The Housing and Economic Availability Assessment (HELAA) call for sites shows that most that have been put forward by landowners and developers for homes or employment are in the green belt.

The green belt land from Furzehill Road, including Woodcock Hill and across the railway to the north of Barnet Lane, has been registered as a Wildlife Conservation Area since 2002. The ancient hedgerows planted at the times of the enclosures in the 17th century are registered with Herts Bio records. The line of historic ancient dew ponds alongside Barnet Lane, built to allow water to be available for cattle and sheep being brought to Barnet market along the drovers road, have also been registered with Herts Bio Records.



Land under threat

- 1. The fenced field (Horses' Field) between Barnet Lane and Carrington Avenue/Carrington Close/Linster Grove site has been put forward for building 320 homes by Barratt Homes on behalf of the owner Jacques Onona. The trees on this site have tree preservation orders.
- Sean McNicholas is proposing that his land behind Little Orchard in Barnet Lane and abutting Woodcock should come forward for housing.
- 3. The Clynyck Family land beyond the railway alongside Barnet Lane up to Hartfield Avenue has been proposed for housing.

Although the land has been proposed for housing it does not mean that permission will be granted or those sites used.





The WHVG committee have arranged a joint meeting with the Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society for members of both organisations in early December. Residents will have had an opportunity to attend the Q&A session with Cllr Dr Harvey Cohen at the EBRA meeting at St Teresa's Hall on Tuesday 13 November 7.45pm for 8pm and the exhibition and opportunity to meet the planners at St Teresa's Hall on Wednesday 14 November from 4pm - 8pm or one of the other exhibitions planned around the borough.

The committee discussed options put forward for consultation and will support the idea of a garden village where the infrastructure will be put in place to support residents. Elstree and Borehamwood has taken the brunt of development over the past years as brownfield sites came forward and employment was lost to the town. Office blocks have been and continue to be changed for accommodatio. These do not need planning permission and neither do the developers pay any money to the community as do other builders through the Community Infrastructure Levy CIL.
