Compost Corner

Here comes the summer

It may sound odd talking about growing tomatoes in the middle of winter but now is the time gardeners start to think about preparing for the coming growing season.

Folk wisdom says that garlics planted before the winter solstice grow to twice the size of any planted after February.

Personally I start growing chillies from seed on a propagator above the radiator on the window sill in my lounge. It is delightful to see them coming through weeks later and then waiting until all risk of frost has passed before transplanting them to the greenhouse.



Tomato bread/ Pan con tomate

This is a popular starter or tapa in Catalonia.

- Toast a crusty slice of farmhouse bread
- Rub a clove of fresh garlic on one side.
- Halve a large flavoursome beef tomato and rub it onto the toast
- Drizzle with extra virgin olive oil.

If you like you can warm it gently in the oven or cover with cheese and melt before serving hot accompanied by a nice glass of red wine or sherry.



But let's stick to the tomato and thoughts of the succulent fruits ripening on the vine in the warm summer sunshine.

The tomato, which originated in Latin America, is one of the most versatile ingredients in the Mediterranean diet. To illustrate this point I have hand picked three really easy, tasty Spanish recipes. I hope you like them.

Gazpacho

Gazpacho is extremely popular in the hot south of Spain, especially in Andalucia. It is ideal for quenching your thirst and replacing lost fluid, minerals and vitamins after a morning working outdoors in the scorching sun. I find it is a really good hangover cure, and is a great method of losing weight too.

You need a food processor to make a decent Gazpacho.

- Add one cup of extra virgin olive oil and one cup of sherry vinegar to the food processor.
- Put your tomatoes in boiling water and remove the skins (optional)
- Add the tomatoes and mix them with the oil and vinegar.

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• Add half a cucumber diced

- Add a de-seeded red pepper
- Add several cloves of raw garlic

Mix all the ingredients together at top speed in the processor. Adjust according to taste by adding a small amount of sea salt and pepper or chilli, or whatever takes your fancy.

Serve as a cold soup with croutons or fresh bread

Beetroot salad / Ensalada de remolacha

This recipe was given to me by my good friend Stuart McDonald, who has lived in Madrid for the past 25 years but spent time in the Basque country, the culinary heartland of Spain:

- Put fresh sliced beetroot in a bowl
- Add extra virgin olive oil
- Add raw garlic
- Add quartered or halved small cherry tomatoes
- Add fresh parsley
- Allow to steep in the fridge

Enjoy ideally 6 to 12 hours afterwards with crusty bread, remembering to dip the bread in the juices in the bottom of the bowl

Hertsmere Mencap also operates 'Noah's Ark,' a play scheme for children with a disability, and their siblings, during school holidays to enable them to have a great time, while their parents receive much needed respite. Cllr Victor Eni said: "I have chosen Hertsmere Mencap as my Charity of the Year because of their hard work to support our friends with a learning disability in our community. Every day they help people reach their potential and encourage them away from isolation. Everyone should be valued equally and I am proud to be part of a charity that seeks to achieve that aim. I would also like to thank Chef Jean Luc Sainlo who cooked up the most wonderful meal for a fraction of what he should have charged us.

Achieving gold at Kenilworth Primary School

Kenilworth Primary School became the first school in Hertsmere to achieve gold accreditation from Modeshift Stars for their work on the school's travel plan.

Pupils were delighted to be joined by the Active and Safer Travel Team from Hertfordshire County Council for a celebratory assembly. The school have been working with the team to encourage active travel to school helping their pupils to be more active every day. The accreditation requires a 5% or greater reduction away from using the car for the school journey and lots of activities to promote walking, scooting and cycling to school.

The school has worked really hard and has also embraced Hertfordshire's Year of Physical Activity (YOPA) by setting up the Daily Mile. This involves pupils walking, skipping or running a mile during the school day to increase physical wellbeing. Walking to school really does make a difference as children are healthier and more prepared for the day ahead and especially for learning.

Learning at Summerswood

It's been a busy term in KS1! Year 2 had a visit from a mobile planetarium as part of their 'Let's Explore' topic. It was a great opportunity for the children to find out more information about Neil Armstrong's visit to the moon and to ask their questions about space!

20 Years of Holby City

The programme was created by Tony McHale and Mal Young as a spin-off from the BBC medical drama Casualty, which is set in the emergency department of the fictional Holby City Hospital. Young wanted to explore what happened to patients treated in Casualty once they were taken away to the hospital's surgical wards.

While Casualty's scope is limited to "accident of the week" storylines about patients entering hospital, Holby City allowed the possibility of storylines about long-term care, rather than immediate life and death decisions. The series was commissioned by BBC One controller Peter Salmon, and began airing on BBC One on 12 January 1999.

Holby City and Casualty are both set in Holby City Hospital, in the fictional county of Wyvern. The Casualty set in Bristol was not large enough to encompass the surgical ward and operating theatre, so Holby City was set up at the BBC Elstree Centre with the 1960s office building Neptune House being used for multiple exteriors and interiors in the series.

Former series producer Richard Stokes believes that the series' popularity stems from the fact the hospital setting presents numerous plotline opportunities, explaining: "You have licence to create life-and-death situations every week, something you cannot do in any other set piece. The interaction of the characters can be sexy and social issues

also permeate the writing. But, basically, hospital drama is successful because the viewers will forgive all the yukky bits for the wonder of a life saved." The focus of the series has developed since its conception, expanding to cover extra wards, including a gynaecology ward, an acute assessment unit and a maternity ward. When the maternity ward and a special care baby unit were introduced during series four, Young explained that new wards were necessary to allow the crew to rotate sets, maximising filming potential.

Holby City leads the industry in diversity and inclusion, on and off screen, winning two awards at the Movie, Video and Screen Awards (MVSAs) at the Black International Film Festival for Best Emerging Talent, Best Long Running Drama and the Creative Diversity Award for

Achievement in Production.


Since its conception in 1999 the show has produced some of the most dramatic and emotional moments on British television, such as the 2016 death of the popular character Arthur Digby.

Battle's Over

Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council in conjunction with Woodcock Hill Village Green played its part in Battle's Over, an international commemoration marking 100 years since the guns fell silent at the end of World War I.

Organised by pageant master Bruno Peek LVO OBE OPR, Battle's Over took place on 11 November 2018 with events throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, and at scores of locations overseas, including New Zealand, Ireland, Australia, Bermuda, France, Belgium, Canada, the United States and Germany.

The day began at 6am in All Saints Church with lone piper George McGregor playing Battle's Over, a traditional piece of Scottish music played after a battle.

In the evening Borehamwood Brass performed traditional music along with George McGregor in Fairway Hall.

At 6.55pm Andrew Grady performed the Last Post at Woodcock Hill which was one of more than 1,000 locations where at 7pm WW I Beacons of Light were lit in a tribute signifying the light of peace that emerged from the darkness of four years of war.

Dan Salter, Entertainments Officer for Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council said: "We are proud to be playing a part in this historic



international event to commemorate the centenary of the Great War and to recognise the contribution and sacrifice made by the men and women from Elstree and Borehamwood".







Woodcock Hill Village Green

Woodcock Hill Village Green committee joined forces with the Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society committee to hold a meeting on 3 December with Cllr Dr Harvey Cohen to discuss the Local Plan.

Members wanted to understand the implications of the call for sites and the next stage of the Local Plan. Cllr Dr Harvey Cohen stated that this first step was to present the options and allow residents to reply to the consultation and make their views known.

WHVG has made representations that land north of Barnet Lane should not be taken out of the Green Belt for development of 320 homes, and that land east of Woodcock Hill likewise should remain as Green Belt to prevent the coalescence of Elstree and Borehamwood. All the land between Furzehill Road and Deacons Hill Road is not only Green Belt but also has wild life conservation status. The hedgerows around the Horses' Field are registered as historic enclosure hedges with Herts Bio records. The historic dew ponds are also registered with Herts Bio Records. They were used in ancient times for livestock to drink and refresh themselves before going on to Barnet Market. The site is unsuitable, as the extra amount of traffic generated would exacerbate the present dire traffic movements in the area. The infrastructure does not support a deliverable estate.

The development of homes by Taylor Wimpey beside Woodcock Hill in Byron Avenue and the Fire Research Station will make a big difference to traffic movements around the area and will make unprecedented demands on the local creaking infrastructure.

The working parties in November and December were mainly concerned with litter clearance. More working parties are planned for 10 February, 10 March and 14 April.

Maggie has vascular dementia and David her husband was the main carer when Maggie was at home. She was then moved to the Radley Care Home and David was so dedicated to caring for his wife that he asked the home if he could be involved into helping Maggie to settle. David was allowed to sleep at the home and visit anytime.

Maggie settled and David has continued to spend as much time as possible and have lunch with his wife in the home nearly every day.

The couple recently had a celebration of their marriage and it was truly magical to see David's commitment to the wedding vows and his love for Maggie.

I was interested to know how David met Maggie, how their lives have been, how he feels now considering that Maggie's vascular dementia is so advanced that she is not able to communicate much about herself. This is what David said.

"Maggie and I first met in 1958. We felt comfortable with each other straight away, appearing to have a similar sense of humour.

"We got married in 1960 and then went on to have two children, a boy and a girl. They're now adults.

"Since all the time we been together we have always said if we had a disagreement, we would always make up before going to bed, which we kept to.

"Maggie was diagnosed with vascular dementia in 2015. First it was just forgetting names or events, but it gradually got worse over time until one day she did not recognise me as her husband. She thought I was a stranger in the house and wanted to call the police to evict me. Maggie was then put on medication. Thankfully Maggie responded well, could recognise me and looks forward to seeing me every day. I still love Maggie dearly and she loves me, as she has told me so.

"We recently celebrated our years together with family and friends, to which the Mayor of Borehamwood Victor Eni was invited, and it was a lovely gesture by the Care Home to arrange this.

"I see Maggie every day, take her out for a car ride anywhere, and she enjoys this very much. We recently went to Cornwall for a short break with a member of staff from the Care Home. Maggie enjoyed her time there, It is Maggie's favourite place. The Radley Care Home staff and management have been extremely good in all aspects to me and Maggie.

"I thank goodness that Maggie can still enjoy going out and seeing and recognising friends and family.

"I will do or try anything to make Maggie's life as normal as her illness permits and give my full support to her and the staff.

"I love Maggie now as much as I did when we first married all those years ago."

Teddy's Trail from Harperbury





This is one of eighteen walking routes through the local countryside, promoted by Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council and named after the fox terrier who helped to devise them.

The trail starts and finishes at the station, beginning with a 22 minute bus ride, followed by a gentle 5.5 mile walk.

Among the points of interest along the way, you will see and learn about

- A church dedicated to the patron saint of farmers and travellers, located on the medieval pilgrims' route from London to St Albans Abbey
- The site of one of Britain's oldest airfields, used during World War 1
- A farm in a location dating back 800 years which was once surrounded by a moat
- One of Britain's earliest golf courses
- The former home of a notorious spy and double agent
- The location from which the "beam benders" misdirected enemy aircraft during World War 2
- Radlett's oldest pub, originally named after a faithful cat
- The site of the watersplash through which traffic along Theobald Street once had to pass
- One of the very few survivors of the 156,623 prefabs built to reduce the housing shortage in the 1940s
- A house once used as a rehearsal studio by the rock band The Kinks

Sweet smell of sucess, Reviva defeated

Reviva application to change to a Waste Transfer Station Refused

Thursday 20 December will be remembered and celebrated for all residents of Elstree Village, Brockley Hill and the whole of the Town when the application was refused.

A Town Councillor represented STENCH and the Elstree Village Preservation Society and Dr Ann Goddard from Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society in speaking against the application by Reviva for change of use from a Green Compost Waste recycling Centre to a Waste Transfer Centre. Other objectors were Elsa Reyes and Cllr Jeremy Newmark. County Cllr Caroline Clapper summed up the objections from all speakers from the floor. Officers had recommended that the application be refused.

There was a pre hearing site visit by local elected councillors with members and officers of Herts County Council Committee. It enabled us to see the impact that the waste transfer station would have on the openness of the green belt the impact of an extra 200 lorry movements per day extra site offices and health facilities. The biggest shock, however, was the amount of land that had been covered in concrete without planning permission.

Precept and Financial Matters 2019/20

Town Council agrees no rise in Council Tax share

For the third consecutive year, the Town Council has decided not to increase the precept demand on Hertsmere Borough Council (its share of the council tax in 2019/20) which will remain at \pounds 36.26 per year for the Band D yearly charge - or just £3.02 per month.

The Council intends to meet increased costs through efficiency savings and by drawing on some of its reserve funds. It is also anticipated that the use of the Council's share of Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) monies for infrastructure improvements will increase in the year.

The Council may invite local clubs, societies or other voluntary and statutory organisations to provide an exhibition and/or a representative to speak about the work of their group.

But the purpose of the meeting is to enable the ordinary electors to have their say. Councillors will listen with interest and, as electors themselves, also have the opportunity to raise questions and make comments if they wish.

Minutes of the meeting are taken and approved at the following year's Annual Parish Meeting.

Town Council CIL allocations: putting developer contributions to the best community use

One of the current challenges facing local councils is deciding on the best way to spend developer contribution monies on infrastructure improvements.

In the autumn edition of the Town Crier magazine, residents were provided with the opportunity to complete a questionnaire on ideas for how they would like to see the Town Council spend its share of Community Infrastructure Levy monies.
