I was also delighted to raise nearly $\pounds3,000$ in aid of my mayoral charity, Peace Hospice Care at a Chanukah Party held at Fairway Hall. My thanks go to the sponsors and the volunteers that enabled this event to happen.

There is so much going on in our town nearly every day of the week, with something to interest everyone. We are really lucky to have an army of volunteers involved in so many organisations and activities. Without them our town would cease to tick.

We are now in the second half of the municipal year and I look forward to meeting residents at our public forums and of course the annual Parish Meeting on 4 March.

Before I sign off, I would like publicly to thank the town council staff for everything they do for our town. Council officers work diligently outside in all weathers and give up their evenings and weekends to ensure the smooth running of Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council services.

Compost Corner

'Let them eat worms'

We've well and truly arrived in 2020. A belated Happy New Year to you!

You might think there isn't much to do in the garden. However, now is a great time to stock up your bird feeders ready for the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch later this month.

This year the Birdwatch takes place on 25 - 27 January. Spend just one hour watching and recording the birds in your garden or local green space, then send your results to the RSPB and you can help track bird numbers. Visit www.rspb.org.uk to sign up online for a pack.

Allotment holders are cracking on, and there are several newcomers to welcome to the fold including Kelly! When I spoke to her, she described herself as 'old-school' having been brought up in a family who cultivated four allotments in Radlett. Now a young woman with her own family, Kelly knows what to expect and has inherited the grafting gene from her dad.

Even though she's already sacrificed a strip in the garden for growing veg, it wasn't nearly enough space to grow all the fresh fruit and veg they like to eat... like kale and spinach for smoothies, yellow cucumbers – her 4 year old's favourite – and fruit bushes, and she's looking forward to preserving produce and discovering ways of storing root crops next winter.

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Allotment growing offers a whole-body workout in the fresh air, Kelly explains, and not only that, but she's found a lot of research advocating a more plant-based diet for health. Microwave readymeals might be convenient but don't necessarily optimise health and well-being. Her 4 year old is chomping at the bit to get up to the allotment whenever possible, and is looking forward to helping make a special tepee which will have beans growing up it, and perhaps a mud kitchen...

Kelly wistfully reflects on last year's photo, of her child happily sitting in the mud and chomping on a worm. Life is for living, being in the moment, and fully experiencing!, she exclaims. I agree 100% and I'm sure so does the robin!


Green smoothie

And what do you do?

This is the question that I get from people when I ask them if they are interested in becoming a school governor. The answer is to support the headteacher and the school, but also to hold it to account.

Schools welcome people from a range of backgrounds and the only real qualification is to be willing to give up some time and contribute to discussions in meetings. The time that being a governor contributes is around 20 hours a year. Individual governors might do much more than this if they visit assemblies and productions.

The most important thing that governors do is appoint a good headteacher. If they don't get this right it can be catastrophic. Today this is even more difficult because of the shortage of applicants. At one



time, we would have a short list of up to 20 people who wanted to be headteachers, but today you are lucky to get three candidates.

The reasons for this are the heavy workload and the high expectation there is of them. For parents and governors there is nothing wrong with this. We want our children to do well at school, which means good teaching



and children applying themselves. One of the things that governors always ask questions about is the progress of all children, not just the more able. Governors compare the progress of many different groups of children. How are children on free school meals doing compared to other children, how are summer born children doing, or children with special needs and children with English as an additional language?

After enjoying a unique dance and choir performance from talented Hertswood students, the attendees were free to explore the school independently. Visitors were able to take in its doubleheight atrium, central courtyard, restaurant, enormous sports hall, gym, squash courts and the extensive suite of classrooms and open learning spaces, each complete with a state-of-the-art interactive teaching screen.

Hertswood Academy hustings

On Thursday 28 November, local candidates from the Labour, Conservative, Liberal Democrat and Green parties came to the Academy to answer student questions in the run up to the general election. Some topics discussed included Brexit and the EU, environmental policies within Hertsmere and school funding under recent governments.

The defending Conservative MP, Oliver Dowden, made clear his party's views on getting on with the process of leaving the EU and his commitment to protecting the environment of his constituency through support of legislation ensuring net zero carbon emissions.



His Labour opponent (Holly Kal-Weiss) chose to appeal to the needs of young people in the room by highlighting Labour's manifesto policies concerning tuition fees and the aim for a 'green industrial revolution'. In addition, Holly acknowledged the antisemitism previously uncovered within her party and apologised on behalf of them, whilst also expressing her wish to see change within the party over the matter.

Stephen Barrett, the Lib Dem candidate, opened with a statement claiming that in this election 'normal voting loyalties were thrown out of the window' and made his case for why the Lib Dems were a strong choice. Some of his points included the manifesto pledges of training 20,000 new teachers and their aim to hold a second EU referendum.

Overall, it was a very lively session that helped the Sixth Form students who attended to understand the stance of each party heading into the election, while also raising greater awareness of national politics and the importance of voting for those who were able, so that every eligible person can have a say in our country's future. We're grateful to the candidates for participating and to the visiting students from Haberdashers' Aske's School for Girls and Nicholas Breakspear Catholic School.

It is hoped that this design will be ratified by all the regulatory authorities, so that a permanent structure can be built during the early part of the year to be ready for the summer of 2020.

YOU can help design a flag for Elstree and Borehamwood

Everyone likes flags. We know from pictures in ancient Chinese documents that they have been in use for thousands of years. And today, although no law requires it, every country in the world has a national flag, with patterns, images and colours which make it unique and tell the viewer something about its history or its geography or its people.

But flags don't just represent whole countries. Provinces and counties have flags, and so too do companies, international organisations, government departments, sports clubs, political parties, regiments, ships, schools and colleges, local authorities, religious groups, trade unions, individual families ... the variety is endless.

And in many parts of the world, there are town flags, flown by anyone to identify with and express pride in the communities in which they live or work.

But, strangely, until now that has not been true in Britain. The Flag Institute, a charity which promotes the study and use of flags, is keen to remedy this situation, and is encouraging cities, towns and villages throughout the country to hold open competitions in which everyone can put forward their ideas for flags to symbolise them. Such flags often refer to the name of the community, the landscape in which it is set, or to prominent architectural features.

Here are two examples. The black and white stripes on the flag of Nenthead refer to the seams of lead and silver once mined in the village. The green right-pointing triangle represents nearby Knowbury Hill, the easternmost point in Cumbria, while the eight-pointed white star alludes to the local tradition of Quakerism. Cromford's flag shows a mill, wheel and millstream to symbolise its status as the birthplace of



the (water-powered) industrial revolution, and is in the same colours as the flag of Derbyshire in which it is located.

Both flags are distinctive, bold, simple and informative, and are popular with people in the localities they represent.

There are many flagpoles in Elstree and Borehamwood, but most of these are often empty, or used only to fly commercial logos outside building sites, car showrooms or supermarkets. There is no flag which announces the unique identity of our town and allows us to express the pride we feel in it – whether flying proudly in Shenley Road or stitched in miniature to our backpacks as we explore far-flung corners of the world.

We know that our community loves flags. During the football world cup two years ago flags suddenly sprouted from lampposts, garden sheds, chimneys, mail vans and even supermarket ceilings. What a shame that when the competition was over, they (nearly) all disappeared.

The town council is keen to reawaken this enthusiasm, and – as part of its contribution to the Hertfordshire Year of Culture in 2020 – it has decided to host a competition to design a town flag for Elstree and Borehamwood.

The competition will be open to anyone who wishes to take part. In particular, students in schools and colleges will be encouraged to do so, and there will be special awards for the best entries from under-12s and those aged 12 to 16. There is no limit to the number of designs anyone can submit, provided that they are made on the official form.

Entry packs, with notes on the principles of good flag design and detailed rules for the competition, will be available from the town council's office at Fairway Hall in Brook Close from 1 March. Details will be shown on its website, and the closing date for entries will be 31 March.

It is intended that all entries will be included in a public exhibition, and that they will be preserved in the archives as historical records. The entries will be judged "blind" (i.e. anonymously) by a panel formed of invited representatives of local organisations, which will draw up a short-list of four designs to go forward to the next stage. These will be publicised in the next issue of Town Crier in May, and flown full-size in the town centre, as well as at Families Day during the Town Festival in June.

There will then be a secret ballot, in which everyone who lives and works in the town can take part, to choose the design which will proudly represent us all. The winning entry will be revealed at an unveiling ceremony in September.

The town council will promote the flag in the form of bumper and window stickers, paper flags, etc, and will encourage its use on flagpoles in streets and parks and by residents, shops, schools, companies and organisations in the town.

Somewhere, someone reading this article is the designer of our future town flag. Is that person you?

To win a place in the history of our town, don't miss your chance to enter the competition. What flag design would best express the unique character and spirit of Elstree and Borehamwood? This is your opportunity to have your say.

Rights of Way report

Question: What do the places in these two pictures have in common?

Answer: Both are "Rights of Way" (RoWs) in Elstree and Borehamwood parish, the area served by the town council. The difference between them helps to illustrate how elastic the reality behind this phrase can sometimes be. But what all RoWs have in common is that they are routes (not roads) which members of the public have a legal right to use – always when on foot, and sometimes by other means as well.

The most common type of RoW is a public footpath, which is open to pedestrians and to accompanying dogs "under close control." There are also bridleways, which can also be used by cyclists and by people on horseback, and byways, which can additionally be used by people in wheeled vehicles. On "restricted" byways these must be non-motorised, e.g. horse drawn carriages, while in the case of byways "open to all traffic" the clue is in the title. The status of an RoW can be recognised



by the colour of the arrows used on signposts or waymarks (small numbered discs attached to parts) On factorthe

to posts). On footpaths these are yellow, on bridleways blue, on restricted byways plum and on byways open to all traffic red.

The RoW network is an immensely valuable public amenity, allowing everyone to make journeys and take exercise away from busy roads, and to access places and views which cannot otherwise be seen. All RoWs appear (with their official numbers) on the "definitive map" maintained by the county council (http://webmaps.hertfordshire.gov. uk/row/row.htm?layers= [1:0,1,2,3,4]). They can also be seen on maps in the Landranger and Explorer series published by the Ordnance Survey.

In Elstree and Borehamwood alone there are 68 registered RoWs, plus three more for which applications for this status have been made. About half are cross-country routes, linking us with neighbouring towns and villages, and are usually unsurfaced. The rest are tarmac alleyways providing short cuts between buildings and gardens within the builtup areas. Some of these, like Ayot Path and Sutton Path, are named because they lead to the fronts of residential properties.

County councils are responsible for the RoW network. They provide signposts and waymarks, look after gates and footbridges, and deal with major obstructions. In Hertfordshire the county council values the contribution residents can also make to the delivery of certain services through volunteering. So following a positive public response to a call for people willing to conduct periodic "ease of use" surveys, its

countryside and RoW team has harnessed their enthusiasm and local knowledge by recruiting a regular RoW volunteer for each of its 145 parishes.

Their task is to monitor the condition of the paths, deal with minor problems such as encroaching branches or missing waymarks, and





that action can be taken. In order to perform this function they have been provided with some necessary tools and – equally important in the litigious era in which we live – they are covered by public liability insurance.

to report anything more serious (such as

a damaged gate or deliberate obstruction) so

At least once a year, these volunteers carry out an audit of the state of each of the RoWs in their respective areas. Any defects found are placed in one of four categories, to determine the urgency with which they need to be addressed: obstructive/dangerous, high priority, medium priority, or not urgent. A path condition report is prepared, complete with maps and photographs, showing the nature and location of any problems, so that these can be listed for remedial action.

The most recent audit of RoWs in Elstree and Borehamwood was conducted in the autumn of 2019. After any necessary running repairs had been completed, just over half of the 68 paths (35) had no further issues requiring action. On the remainder, there were 77 problems reported, but fortunately none of these were in the obstructive/dangerous category, as the only potential candidate for this classification (a collapsing stile) was repaired by the landowner concerned as soon as it was reported and before the survey was finalised. Of the ten items in the high priority category, most were defective pedestrian ("kissing") gates. Of the 31 moderate priority problems, the largest group was issues with signs, followed by encroaching vegetation, and the same was true of the 36 non urgent items reported.



The detailed findings of this survey will be considered at the next meeting of the town council's transport and road safety forum, which will be held on 19 February and is open to everyone. In the meantime, copies are available on request from Tracey Malton at the council's office. As you - and your dog - enjoy your country walks in 2020, or hurry to work or school along an urban pathway, please spare an appreciative thought for the hard-working county council officers and RoW volunteers without whose vigilance and commitment this facility could fall into disrepair and become unavailable to us all.

BMX is coming to the Wood!

In September, Hertsmere Borough Council approved plans for a BMX track, a project initiated by Leecliffe Big Local.

Over the past two years, hundreds of children between the ages of four and sixteen have been taught how to ride bikes, or improve their cycling, in Aberford and Meadow Parks as part of the BMX project. We have also been working with British Cycling to discover how a BMX facility can best impact its local community. Interestingly, one of the findings from our discussions was that anti-social behaviour has reduced in areas where this type of facility has been introduced.

The result of all this work will soon become a tangible asset in our community. The vision, as in other areas that have implemented these facilities, is that Borehamwood will become a proud source of national and international sporting contestants.

The BMX track will cater for fun riders from all sections of the community, across all age groups and ability levels. We will be setting up a club which will purchase BMX bikes and equipment to ensure that access to these activities can be open to all and to take advantage of them.

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society meets monthly to monitor the health and safety of our local Green Belt areas and conservation issues.

2020 will be a particularly critical year because this spring the new Local Plan will be put forward for discussion and decision. Among the issues is the amount of Green Belt land possibly to be sacrificed for development. We will be urging Hertsmere planners to make it minimal as we are still adjusting to the building load imposed on the community already and Green Belt is precious. Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd have withdrawn their application for a Nature Retreat. Opening the sluice on 2 January led to a metre drop. This will affect both the sailors and anglers. Draining the reservoir means a wetland would develop, providing different habitats. Unmanaged wetlands dry out, succession takes place and vegetation takes over.

Blocked drains are causing flooding elsewhere. Best Parties was responsible for a diesel pillage. The matter is being dealt with by insurers. The reservoir was not contaminated.

No news on the footpath. Swan numbers are increasing. Lambing has started on the farm.

If you care about these changes to our environment please strengthen our voice by joining the Elstree & Borehamwood Green Belt Society.



Guideposts supporting carers in Borehamwood

I have worked as a mental health support worker based at Guideposts' Henry Smith House in Watford for over 10 years and in the last 18 months, I started a new role as "Guideposts Carers Co-ordinator." This has given me time to develop new groups and one to one support for local carers.





My remit is to work primarily with those who are unpaid carers for a loved one with a mental ill health diagnosis or autism. Carers can be your husband/wife/partner, mother/father, brother/sister or neighbour and you don't even have to live at the same address. Being a relative of the ill person is a difficult situation for both the person who is ill and the family

member who is caring for them. Emotions can run high and it is tough to get through episodes when your loved one has poor health. I'm sure you know that caring for someone with a mental ill health condition is very different from caring for someone physically ill. It can impact on the carer's physical and emotional wellbeing. The stress and frustration can be overpowering, especially if you don't understand personally the experience of being mentally ill. Therefore, to help our carers cope, Guideposts plans to set up groups where they can off-load, be given advice, receive helpful information and have fun evenings too. I shall offer one-to-one meetings with carers to discuss individual needs, which will be in-between meetings. It is often said carers are "important

and save the country money." Well, you really are important and your wellbeing is important to us, so we hope to do our best to keep carers in good health.

I have run Guideposts' successful Watford Carers Group for many years now and I am planning to run a new group in the Borehamwood area. Having worked as a mental health support worker working with mental health service users, I believe I have empathy for both the carer and the cared for.

Precept and Financial Matters 2020/21

Money matters

The Town Council is keen to receive Community Grant applications from local organisations which benefit the local community or a section of it, and $\pm 10,000$ is set aside each year for this purpose.

Grant application forms and rules on how to make an application can be found on the Council's website at

www.elstreeborehamwood-tc.gov.uk/index.php/yourcouncil/ community-grants.

In addition, by completing the CIL Questionnaire (see right) you can help the Town Council decide on what infrastructure projects it can support. CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) is the developer contribution money the Town Council receives from Hertsmere Borough Council to be spent on projects that demonstrate infrastructure improvements to meet the increased demands that development places on an area.



Precept 2020/21

At its meeting on 15 January 2020, the Council set the precept demand (the Town Council's share of the council tax for the year) at \pounds 493,879.38.

Town and Parish Councils take just 2% of the full council tax allocation. For a typical Band D Elstree and Borehamwood household this equates to a 2% increase from the previous year. The Band D household will pay ± 36.99 per year or ± 3 per month for Town Council services (or just 73p per year more in 2020/21 than in 2019/20).

Whilst the Town Council can use CIL monies on certain projects, and generates some income from certain activities e.g. hiring Fairway Hall, the precept represents the lion's share of council income required to deliver its services. In 2020/21 the Town Council is looking to make much needed improvements to All Saints cemetery and increase its programme of entertainments and events (especially the Christmas lights). There will also be new commemorative events taking place e.g. to celebrate VE Day.
