Marjorie Hambrook turns 100

Marjorie was putting her laundry away neatly in her wardrobe when I came to interview her. I asked how she was feeling at 100 years old. She smiled and said, "I feel good".

I asked what's the secret. She said, "I had a very happy childhood; I was brought up by my grandmother and went to live with my mother when she had my brother. I didn't really like him at first because I thought he would take my place, but we're very close now."

I asked if she ever thought she would live to this age. She replied, "I never thought about it really. I could remember when I was first called up. My mother didn't want me to go. During the war, I was convinced that I wouldn't survive, but I did."

I asked what her happiest moments were. Marjorie smiled and said, "when I got married. I met my husband after the war. He was an officer and died in 1990. We never had any children. It never bothered me then, but bothers me now, more than ever."

Marjorie was born in Muswell Hill, north London, moved to Borehamwood with her parents and attended school in Elstree. She was called up in 1942 and served in the army for four years. Marjorie remembers returning through Borehamwood and Elstree station after the war and couldn't believe how quiet and empty the streets were.

She came to live at Radley because she couldn't stand living alone, after her husband died. Marjorie is easy-going, enjoys quizzes, loves exercise sessions, and will do anything to keep motivated.

Marjorie has always dreamed of flying a helicopter. The people at Wishing Tree granted her wish, buying her a helicopter flying experience with Flying Pigs Elstree. At 97, she was considered their eldest and most fearless student; an inspiration to all.

We celebrated Marjorie's 100th birthday with m ayor Alan Plancey on his last day in office and are grateful for all of his support.

Here at Radley, we're blessed to have had the opportunity to celebrate with Marjorie during this difficult period and would like to wish her many more years to come.

Compost Corner

How to get a good tan – naturally!

"I grew up in a very small town in Poland. When I was young, I was exposed to nature a lot, spending most of my time in the forests, farms and lakes.

I arrived in London 19 years ago. Living in the concrete jungle, I got alienated from nature. Three years ago I asked a colleague of mine whether he was on holiday, as he was really tanned. He replied, "no, I've got an allotment." And it all started from there.

I called the council and requested the plot. That time I had no idea what I was doing, but every journey starts from somewhere. I didn't know anything about gardening, so I started reading. One book after another and got really inspired by so many different principles, techniques and ideas. I learned many valuable lessons, but the best lesson I've learned is to feed the soil first and the soil will feed you. I use permaculture principles where the main practice is to never till your soil, but feed it with compost, mulch, compost teas and to have a small pond. Let the microbes do the work for you, so you can work less, water less, weed less and produce more and more healthy vegetables, fruits and herbs. It's organic, it's environmentally friendly, it supports the wildlife, and the most important, it's self-sufficient. You grow seasonal and eat the highest quality produce that no supermarket can substitute.





I grow everything that I would normally buy from the supermarket and can grow in UK climate. I built a polytunnel which allows me to start off the plants earlier and grow vegetables that need heat, like tomatoes, cucumbers and peppers.

Hippocrates said "led food be the medicine, let medicine be the food". I would like to encourage everyone to get a plot. You will not only feed yourself and your family, but you will also reconnect to your childhood nature. Observe and interact. "

Steve Simmonds

7 February 1957 - 28 January 2021

Its with great sadness we report that Steve Simmonds from Sullivans Buses passed away aged 63 on Thursday 28 January 2021. His death was not Covid-19 related and appears to be natural causes.

At the time Steve had been caring for his elderly mother who had been frail during the pandemic. As a result we had agreed to pause Steve's employment. The intention was of course he would have returned when he was ready.

Most of his adult life, he had worked for central government in a number of senior roles and by 2010 he was working as head of government internal audit. But as a keen transport enthusiast when he retired he really wanted to get involved in bus operations.

As a result Steve joined Sullivans Buses part time in July 2002 and quickly established a Days Out program using buses made spare at weekends.

Steve joined Sullivans full time in 2011 when he retired from the government.

Days Out Trips

Steve is possibly best known locally for his Days Out program. He spent many hours both at work and in his own time working out his Days Out program. Originally started for customers in Borehamwood, this was soon extended to Potters Bar, Barnet, Finchley and for short time St Albans and Hatfield.

His program included destinations which were all over the south of England. From coastal resorts to stately homes, market towns and a Christmas lights tour, these all featured on Steve's itinerary.

From an early stage Steve decided not to operate the usual booking system, preferring to allow customers to just turn up on the day. This led to a certain amount of anxiety as in certain cases large numbers of customers would turn up to cram on the bus.

Steve's most popular tour was London's Christmas lights. He asked for a bus to be on standby to pick up any stragglers. Steve had bought several boxes of mince pies as an incentive to join us. After about six stops in south Borehamwood his bus was full, so we deployed bus number two. Unfortunately this bus also filled up after the next few stops. Neither bus was half way around the route, leaving us to scramble for more buses and drivers.

School services

In 2012 Hertfordshire county council announced that it was unable to continue funding school bus services. At the time we had a number of county council contracts for several schools in the south of the county.

Steve quickly established good relations with the schools and set about agreeing with head teachers the level of service needed for each school. Although school bus services have never been that viable, Steve set about designing routes and fares which at least covered the costs of operation.

Community events

Steve was a great supporter of community events including the Borehamwood Carnival, the annual 'On The Buses Reunion' event, Teddy's Trail (pictured) as well as attendance at numerous council meetings.

Steve leaves a wife, daughter, brother and of course his mother.

We are looking to achieve more accreditation awards next term with the main ones including; the Science Mark, International Eco-Schools Green Flag, Communication Friendly School status and the Herts For Learning – Early Years Quality Standards award. Wellbeing mindfulness minutes eco-project

This half-term, our Wellbeing ambassadors launched a mindfulness minutes eco-project, which encourages the school community to take part with different mindfulness actions across the whole school or at home. The children recorded mindfulness practice in their class bubbles, assemblies, during lunch time and even whilst travelling to and from school. The Wellbeing ambassadors were in charge of totalling up the mindfulness minutes for their classes each week.

We have now reached the end of the four-week period and our total number of mindfulness minutes is 28 hours and 50 minutes! We will now submit to Eco-Schools England as part of a national goal to achieve one million minutes! This will also help our school to work towards an International Eco-Schools Green Flaa!



Feeling Good week

The last week of this half term, was "Feeling Good" week. The aim for "Feeling Good" week was to promote physical activity and healthy eating whilst supporting pupils to take responsibility for their own wellbeing. All classes have enjoyed this week engaging with wellbeing activities linked to the "5 Ways to Wellbeing". Pupils have also enjoyed engaging with healthy eating activities which have included making fruit smoothies, fruit ice cream, fruit kebabs and fruit cocktails! During the week, we also supported Schools Football Week, as on Wednesday, pupils took part with football themed PE activities!



We are pleased to have achieved a certification to mark the achievement of the HFL Wellbeing Quality Mark with a specialist focus on physical activity and healthy eating. A half day validation visit was completed this week by the designated Wellbeing adviser, in which we highlighted progress made, evaluated and shared impact evidence and demonstrated sustainability.

For over a year, we have been working with the rigorous self-evaluation and review tool to examine, track and evidence commitment to wellbeing across the curriculum and the whole school culture and environment. This provided us with the opportunity to build on existing good practice of our priority area of focus of physical activity and healthy eating whilst implementing a number of new initiatives focused at promoting the "5 Ways to Wellbeing".

Kate from HFL said: 'A huge thank you to, the staff, parents, governors and pupils in the school for the wonderful developments that I have been privileged to hear about over the course of the year and during the validation visit. A real team effort in driving and committing to this initiative was evident. Thank you especially to the amazing, articulate pupils that I was very pleased and privileged to meet on my visit. They helped make my morning incredibly enjoyable and well informed. I could have listened to them all day!'

Parkside Primary School

This term has been jam packed with learning, fun and relationship building.

During the first part of summer term, we have tried to create a welcoming and nurturing environment for the children to flourish and regain their confidence. We have invested in areas of our school which we feel will have the biggest impact on our children's wellbeing. Our first target was to invest in new play equipment and PE resources for the children to experiment with and develop new skills - such resources we were able to acquire were: limbo sticks, target mats, tennis rebounders, football rebounders, rugby posts, new football posts for both KS1 and KS2, Three additional pieces of gym equipment to go with the five which are already installed and a new set of basketballs and footballs for KS1/KS2. The purpose for all of this is to maintain a healthy body and mind, whilst providing our children with the best possible equipment to develop with.

Our partnership with Watford FC continues to grow stronger as their coaches have been supporting Year 3 and Year 4 as well as offering our Year 6 children a free ten week programme called Positive Minds, which has been a tremendous success and will hopefully aid to a successful transition to Year 7. Through the partnership, our Year 5 children also participated in a 'Show racism the red card' workshop which focused on race, religion, nationality and culture. Special guests on the live Zoom call were Kristian Kabasele, John Barnes, Luther Blissett and Molly Wheeler.

Through the support of Mr Soyka and Mrs Taylor, our Head and Deputy Head respectively and the senior leadership team, we have been able to ensure this half term was filled with lots of creative learning which engaged the children's interests. Workshops such as Olympic Dance, a fitness workout day and a day of Quidditch have allowed our children to experience a variety of activities and in the last week of term, solely focused on an off- curriculum week, we were able to really enjoy our children's curiosity and learning. The off-curriculum week was focused around farms and farming and during this week, we were visited by Ark Farm and lots of their wonderful animals. We had webinars from farmers both in the UK and abroad, and a whole

day of learning how to line dance. Garden patches and scarecrows were created, butter and bread were made, farms were designed, farm pop art was taught. By the end of the week there was still time to meet our new reading dog Oreo as well as a visit to St Albans cathedral for our Year 2 children, who set the bar with their exemplary behaviour on our first post-Covid trip away from Parkside.

The first half term also saw six of our Year 5 children enter the Hertfordshire Maths Challenge and although they did not progress to the next stage, they scored above the average out of 250 schools. So huge congratulations must go to them.









Finally, we are preparing for our new partnership with the WD6 Food Support, who are going to be moving into our school from Wednesday 9 June and will be in the school every Wednesday and Friday offering support to our local community.

We have had such an amazing half term, which also included a letter of praise from the Secretary of State for Education, Gavin Williamson. 
Mamas and papas?

Not all our children have an equal start.

This is a difficult fact that governors have to get to grips with. It is not just to do with having enough money. Love and care are not exclusive to any income group. Circumstances dictate the environment in which our children develop and a few are less fortunate than others.

At the end of September last year there were 886 children in care in Hertfordshire and more are spending longer in care because of Covid-19. I anticipate that all our local schools have children in care and young carers. Personally, I find their situations heartbreaking. Our teachers do a wonderful job trying compensate for their difficult situations.

The number of children needing foster care has risen by $44\,\%$ during Covid creating a "state of emergency", a children's charity said.



Meanwhile, the number of people looking to become foster carers has fallen by almost half over the same period, reports Barnardos. What message does this give?

Every school should have a governor who has to watch out for



Every child deserves a family

children in care, and other disadvantaged children. Government make extra money available for these children and we have to check-up on the difference this is making to them. This money can only be spent on these children.

I was surprised to discover out how many of our children are designated as young carers. These too have a hard time. Together with our schools, Herts county council helps them and their families to find support locally to reduce the amount of caring they have to do

Elstree Screen Arts

Elstree Screen Arts have landed and they are unstoppable.

This spring they have officially joined Danes Educational Trust, started a new partnership with Sky Studios Elstree and developed a new traineeship programme for 18 year olds with Screenskills and the National Film and Television School.

Sky Studios Elstree

Last April they marked the start of a partnership with the new Sky Studios Elstree which will provide 40 students with the opportunity to create a series of documentaries to celebrate Elstree and Borehamwood's rich film and TV heritage and will be part of the launch of the studios in February 2022.



To mark the start of the partnership, teachers and students from Elstree Screen Arts academy met with Sky Studios chief operating officer Caroline Cooper on site off Rowley Lane to sign a piece of steel that will become part of the structure of the first studio erected on site, marking a key milestone in the construction of the studios.

ScreenSkills

Elstree Screen Arts has officially joined forces with Screen Skills, Elstree Film Studios and the National Film and Television School to create the next UK Centre of Screen Excellence. Elstree Screen Arts will offer free creative and technical traineeships for 18-19 year olds from September



2021 in six key areas, including art direction, production assistant, grip, lighting, costume, hair and make-up.

Royal Opera House Bridge: 'Our Time During Lockdown'

In July 2020 ROH Bridge approached Elstree Screen Arts academy about the idea of creating a provocative time capsule piece that captured the thoughts and views of being a young adult in 2020. It needed to feature students' experience of lockdown, emerging from lockdown, and their thoughts about the future. Each episode shares evidence from a range of contexts designed to inspire and give practical tools to support your work with amplifying children and young people's voice. Other highlights this term have included:


Youth Council


I wrote this book during lockdown and it's due to be launched at the end of May in paperback. The story highlights domestic violence awareness.

Rights of Way report 2021

Public rights of way (footpaths, bridleways and byways) are a valuable amenity, providing short cuts for pedestrians within the town and access for walkers - and sometimes cyclists and horse riders - to the countryside beyond. During the coronavirus pandemic, when other recreational outlets have been closed or restricted, there has been a noticeable and welcome increase in their usage.

A condition audit of the 70 public rights of way in Elstree and Borehamwood parish was completed at the start of this year. The wet autumn and winter weather, combined with the clay soil of the locality and the greater footfall, had made the going very muddy underfoot in certain stretches and suitable waterproof footwear was essential.

But all of the routes were found to be usable, with no major obstructions or severe hazards. After minor tasks of pruning, lopping, waymark numbering, etc, had been completed, 50 of them required no further works to be carried out.

On the 20 routes on which desirable remedial or improvement works were identified, there were eleven issues with signage, six with encroaching vegetation, four with gates, four with fences, three with bridges and one instance of severe surface rutting.

Some of this work has already been undertaken by contractors and/or volunteers working for Herts county council. For example, brambles have been removed from paths 33 and 34 (between Gateshead Road and Crown Road) and paths 53 and 54 (leading from Haggerston Road to Woodhall and Green Street). A particularly squelchy section of path

54 has been surfaced, and an antiquated and awkward gate has been replaced.

Waymarks have been erected or re-erected on paths 13 and 14 (in Parkfields, Elstree) and 51 (near Organ Hall). New signs have been provided on paths 50 and 52 (leading from Theobald Street) and 23 (leading from Park Crescent). Potentially hazardous rabbit holes have been stopped up alongside path 56 (through the spinney at Radlett Park golf course). A new gate has been installed on path 7 (leading from Allum Lane).

Where responsibility lies with the owners of adjoining properties, e.g. for falling fences on paths 27 (Ayot Path) and 31 (between Stanborough Avenue and Cowley Hill), or an overgrown hedge on path 37 (between Elmwood Avenue and Lemsford Court), the relevant householders are advised. In some cases, other agencies are involved – e.g. missing rails from bridges owned by Hertsmere council on paths 13 and 59 (Parkfields) and 46 (Haggerston Park), and broken fencing alongside path 22 (between Corfe Close and Kenilworth Park) for which Clarion housing association is responsible.

Rights of way are shown on the Ordnance Survey's series of Explorer maps, obtainable from bookshops or by mail order. Their official numbers appear on Hertfordshire county council's on-line map (https://www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/services/recycling-waste-and-environment/countryside-access/rights-of-way/current-rights-of-way/the-definitive-map.aspx#close), and there is a form on this site for reporting any problems you may encounter while using them. Brilliant effort from Communities 1st volunteers

Just over a year ago and in the wake of new restrictions, Communities 1st was faced with an array of unprecedented challenges that shook both the inner workings of the charity and the services we had to offer.

As we amassed the support of nearly three thousand volunteer applications in the first few weeks we had to adapt and develop our CRM system dramatically just to cope with the heavy load on our recruitment team. Whereas before we were managing just sixty people at a time, we now had to ask many of our volunteers to assist in signing up others and before long we had the support of six thousand.

With the support of local councils and the formation of 'Community Help Hertfordshire' we expanded to provide both essential and non-essential services including personal shopping and prescription services for vulnerable people as well as our telephone befriending and leaflet programmes.

Alongside a few other organisations, we were approached by the NHS to support their vaccination programme and by the time of the roll-out we had garnered the support and publicity of figures such as the Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire as well as a wave of donations that we persisted in distributing to those who needed them most. From pallets full of flowers from garden centres through to hundreds of mince pies over the Christmas period we were overcome with the warmth and kindness of our community.

We feel incredibly honored to have now completed over 100,000 hours of vaccination volunteering and are struck by the resilience and bravery of our thousands of volunteers who stood to fight the virus as the communities went to receive their first and second doses. As the next chapter grows near we look forward to seeing how the community will stand together in the many years to come.

Prams For Good campaign announced

Prams for Good, a collaborative initiative from industry specialists, launched on 1 March, with the aim of matching families in need with pre-loved prams and pushchairs, to enable them to get out and about with their babies and children.

How does the scheme work?

The Prams for Good campaign will work with a number of industry partners to take back pushchairs that are in good condition from families, influencers, brands and celebrities, and re-distribute them via a network of independent nursery retailers, logistics companies and local charities to families in need across the UK and overseas. In addition to direct collections, the campaign partners are in discussion with pram brands and independent retailers across the UK, with the aim of creating a nationwide hub of drop off and collection points for the pushchairs, for ultimate redistribution to local charities.

How will it help?

Approximately 14 million people currently live in poverty in the UK, including 4.2 million children - that's one in every four children who do not have the essentials available to them to live. Worrying statistics, made worse by job losses in the past year due to the Covid-19 pandemic as well increasing numbers of refugees seeking asylum.

The campaign will bring together brands, nursery retailers, trade and consumer media, parents, celebrities and influencers to 'each do their bit' to help alleviate three main issues:

To help poverty-stricken families both in the UK and across
the globe. The average spend on a new pushchair is £340.32 –
unfortunately, a cost well beyond the reach of many UK families,
living in poverty, who can't even afford food and clothing,
especially now.

- 2. To improve physical, mental and emotional health, and aid bonding with baby, by giving parents a pram they can use to get outdoors with their child every day. The campaign will help address the current burgeoning mental health crisis, by giving families the opportunity to get outside and into the fresh air, known to be essential for our health and mental wellbeing.
- 3. To work towards a greener planet so many prams are dumped, and we aim to reduce landfill by recycling the prams that have life in them yet and can be given to a good home.

Campaign partners

The Prams for Good campaign is a collaboration between a number of UK based companies and charities. UK registered charity, Goods for Good, delivers overstocked goods donated by British industry and second-hand, pre-loved goods donated by the local community to vulnerable people and communities around the world. Pushchair brand, Didofy, has spearheaded the campaign from the start, but the company has high hopes that many pram and pushchair brands will join the campaign.

Media partners are MadeForMums and the Dadsnet while Nursery Online are leading the nursery trade communication.

Allum Hall vaccination centre

The spring edition of the Town Crier brought great news that the largest Covid vaccination centre in Hertsmere was up and running in Elstree and Borehamwood at Allum Hall.

Since they started in early January the clinics, which run several times each week, have gone from strength to strength in helping protect our community and save lives.

After just two months, on 6 March Dr Alex Byrne, GP at Schopwick Surgery and the Herts Health GP Federation welcomed the 20,000th patient to receive a jab. A fortnight later, Dr Ann Goddard, the chair of Allum Manor received her second jab, an event she described as 'liberating'.

By early May over 50,000 doses were given to 30,000 patients; many of these patients were from high priority groups and received both their jabs. Since then, increasingly younger groups have been making appointments for their jabs. Dr Byrne states that by the end of May over 90% of all Hertsmere patients above the age of 50 had received at least one dose of vaccine.

Through the combined efforts of about 60 healthcare professionals and 35 NHS care coordinators from across Hertsmere, each week has seen three clinics on average. Sixteen clinics were run in April. The clinics continue to offer both vaccines for appointments made through GP practices.

Working in shifts of eight clinicians supported by twice as many Care Coordinators, the clinics have run smoothly and efficiently for up to 12 hours at a time, to the delight of patients.

Typical of their comments is this quote: 'I attended the vaccine clinic last night for my first Covid vaccination and would like to praise all those involved for their efficient, kindly and well organised operation. From the parking as we arrived, through every step of the procedure, the volunteers and vaccinating staff were reassuring, friendly and cheerful under such a massive workload and with such huge hopes and expectations on their shoulders. My very grateful thanks to you all.'

Meanwhile district nurses have used Allum Hall as their base, making over 1,000 visits to care homes across Hertsmere, as well as home visits to other patients who were unable to travel to clinics.



Supporting the NHS, over 300 volunteers organised by Communities 1st have taken turns to greet and guide patients, ensuring that at all times the clinics remain 'Covid-secure'. In all types of weather, parking marshals, supplemented by the caretakers of Allum Hall, have guided drivers safely into and out of the parking areas. Thanks to



the generosity of GTR Thameslink, hundreds of staff and volunteers have parked for free at the nearby station car park, making more space available for patients visiting Allum Hall.

Older patients have, almost without exception, been eager to receive their jabs and the prospect of freedom which a second jab brings.

And now younger patients are doing their part, booking appointments with their GP, turning up on time and following all the hands, face and space recommendations to ensure that every patient feels safe.

Says Dr Byrne, 'It may be tempting to think that the vaccination programme has done its job, but we still have

many more patients to reach over the summer and into the autumn.

Achieving this week after week will continue to place heavy demands on everyone involved. However we're confident that with the support of all our patients we'll be able to continue at this remarkable pace. Please, when you receive your invitation do attend for your first and then your second dose.'

Meanwhile the NHS 'respiratory hot hub'

or patient assessment centre which has been hosted at Allum Manor since late 2020 continues to serve, along with hubs based at Hemel Hempstead and Garston. It is operating at almost 80% of capacity and will remain at Allum Manor over the summer.

Dr Kate Page, senior partner at Fairbrook Medical Centre in Borehamwood and Hertsmere locality chair for Herts Valleys CCG said, 'Patient assessment centres are led by GPs and are an important part of our response to Covid-19. They provide dedicated support for Covid-19 patients in the community, allowing GP practices to focus on helping other patients with health issues that aren't related to Covid-19.

Recognising the remarkable achievements of everyone involved with the vaccination clinics, Dr Nicolas Small, head of the Schopwick Surgery and chair of the Herts Valleys CCG (Clinical Commissioning Group) recently went on record as saying that 'This vaccination centre has been so important for this community and the positive spirit it has engendered. It's been difficult sometimes, but an absolute joy and you've all gone the extra mile.

'It's been a great success and means so much to have protected so many of your residents. Everyone involved should know that by the end of the summer you will have saved many hundreds of lives. That's a quite extraordinary achievement. I thank and congratulate you all.'

Camp Unity 2021

Camp Unity 2019, a multi-faith residential overnight summer camp that brought Borehamwood primary school-aged children together for a week of outdoor adventure, recently received an award from the Hertsmere borough council for its contribution to the celebration of diversity.

After receiving the award, Father Dominic McKenna of St Theresa's Church, a trustee, said: 'We set out to create a life-changing experience for our local children and thankfully, it was a success. From the moment they arrived, to the Lord Lieutenant's visit, to the fire safety demonstration from our Borehamwood fire department, it was a week filled with fun and activities. It was also a great opportunity for parents to meet and make friends across cultures with neighbours they might never otherwise speak with'.

The creative force behind Camp Unity is camp director Rivka David. This energetic teacher and life-coach has more than 20 years of experience working with children, introducing them to enjoying the outdoors. But even she was amazed at 'how quickly the children got on with each other and the warm friendships they formed around the campfire, over hot cocoa and roasted marshmallows'.

Former town mayor and current Brookmeadow ward councillor Victor Eni, also a trustee, praised the camp for its community vision and spirit. 'Camp Unity is a unique experience for our town, where children of all backgrounds can meet, play and have fun together. It is thrilling to be part of the organising team.'

First aider Jirina Horinek, a full-time nurse in the NHS, was pleased to have stayed at camp with her son. 'Thankfully, there were no significant medical issues, and the children spent much time together doing projects in the woods'.



Other trustees, including Rumbi Hitchcock from the St John Apostolic Church of the World and Rabbi Jeff Berger, communal leader and interfaith champion, also dedicated much time during the week to ensure the camp was a fabulous experience for the children.

Though postponed last year during the coronavirus pandemic, trustees kept in close contact with the children during the first months of lockdown through a home seed-planting project. 'In April, we delivered a parcel of 17 varieties of seeds plus compost to any child interested in cultivating a vegetable garden, checking-in with the children regularly via Zoom until July 2020 when lockdown restrictions were lifted. Some results were quite impressive.' said Kashif Merchant, trustee and member of the Muslim community.

Supported by grants from Hertfordshire county council, Hertsmere borough council and other charities, the camp is open to residents of the Elstree/Borehamwood area. After much preparation and with a likelihood of release from lockdown in late June, Camp Unity 2021 is scheduled for 15-20 August - government guidelines permitting.

Help save Woodcock Hill Village Green

Members and other residents have been donating money to raise £20,000 to engage a barrister and other experts to fight Taylor Wimpey's threat to deregister part of Woodcock Hill Village Green.

Woodcock Hill Village Green Committee needs strong representation to challenge the offer of replacement land which:

- is far inferior ecologically;
- means the loss of five ponds and aquatic habitats;
- is far distant from the present site for most Borehamwood residents;
- means noise and air pollution will replace the peace and tranquillity;
- is closer to Elstree;
- involves a long, dangerous and hilly journey from south west Borehamwood.

In the long term Taylor Wimpey want to build there. They have asked that the site be considered in the Hertsmere Local Plan for 110 homes. If they win but don't get planning permission they will fence the site in and let it deteriorate.



Inspectors will hold a public inquiry to decide the fate of the site. Our fundraising events held at 44 Carrington Avenue have raised over £1000.

On Sunday 13 June a joint event with Studios Rotary was held as it coincided with the first Woodcock Hill Village Green working party. Studios Rotary Club ended the Great British Spring Clean.

Hertfordshire county council officers have been in negotiations with Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd to keep its gate open (between the hours of 9am-5pm). This has now been extended until the end of September, and during this time it can erect no further fencing. HCC officers are hoping this will allow time for the discussions with Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd to continue, with our aim still being to find a long-term solution to allow the community to enjoy this asset.

Elstree and Borehamwood town council has given a grant to Aldenham Renaissance to install a new cashless exit barrier from the car park. It will be tap and go for credit and debit cards. This will bring the barrier into the 21st century and bring benefits to Aldenham Country Park users and to Aldenham Renaissance.

Solar energy plant application

In January 2021 Hertsmere council received an application for a massive solar energy farm from Elstree Green Limited - a small subsidiary company owned by solar energy developer ENSO and backed by the giant Australian investment bank Macquarie.

The proposed industrial scale plant would cover 20 fields (320 acres) of farmland between Elstree and Radlett owned by Hilfield Farm and Slades Farm, all in the Green Belt so arguably an "inappropriate development". Estimates are for 125,000 solar panels (each 4 x 6 feet) mounted in long rows on wooden stands, 20 shipping containers (each 40 feet long) containing large industrial lithium-ion storage batteries, 32 large inverters and transformers, as well as miles of cabling. The whole site will be surrounded by two metre high wire fencing and CCTV cameras. The site includes at least nine public footpaths and bridleways which will be surrounded by the fencing.


Adequate recognition has not been given to the cost of decommissioning the solar plant. The batteries contain lithium which

is highly toxic. In 35 years' time, it will definitely be required to recycle everything. The panels also include toxic materials so recycling these (all 125,000!) will be difficult and expensive. Old panels are being put in landfill. There is only one experimental recycling plant (in France run by Veolia) where it costs £60 per panel to recycle. Panels typically last 20 years so all will be replaced during 35 years. Twice as many to recycle!

Strong opposition comes from local residents across Radlett and the town, resulting in the largest number of objections ever lodged to any application – over 1,400. The formal application date has now passed but Elstree Green Limited continues submitting further documents making amendments, "corrections" and technical annexes.

Hertsmere continues to accept any further public comments.

District 1130 London received a request from Wayne, Michigan, for a Tuesday twilight club to link up with their Tuesday lunchtime meeting. One club took up the invitation and this is what happened:

They were so interested in our joint international project, with Modi'im and Hertzeliah Rotary Clubs in Israel, that Wayne RC has donated £500. The project will help non-verbal autistic children to use computers to help express themselves. The project was started by Rtn. Sandra Parnell when she was president and continued by both Nick Male and Victor Eni during their presidencies. Covid-19 has slowed the project but not stopped it.

The Wayne RC president Laura Mack and her husband are both retired judges. They say that the UK's Nightingale courts are far ahead of what is happening in the US to deal with the backlog of court cases. Strangely, through the media everyone has now seen the 'I am not a cat' incident. A child introduced a cat filter to the image of a participant in a online court hearing that could not be removed.

We will keep in touch with Wayne RC and know they would like to hear from other clubs in the district.

Roger Morris, the managing director of Elstree Studios gave an inspiring and fascinating talk about the past, present and future of media in Elstree and Borehamwood.

The Elstree Studios are owned by Hertsmere Borough Council and over £3.5 million is paid to HBC every year, helping with local expenditure as well as providing employment at many levels.

Even during lock down prestigious programmes continued to be made there eg. 'Strictly Come Dancing', 'The Chase', 'Pointless'. Literally the jewel is 'The Crown' filmed by Netflix. Much of the backlot sets are for the outside of Buckingham Palace including the gates etc. The attention to detail in the different periods the 'The Crown' spans is essential. Strict enforcement of lockdown rules ensured the safety of all. The studios worked at 98 % capcity during lockdown.

Roger gave an insight into the exciting new £33 billion project in the Town; the building of the 33 acres, Sky Studios. Films, TV programmes etc. will be made there for Warner Brothers, Disney, Netflix and Universal Studios. Opening is forecast in 2022 and work is moving quickly.


These will all be supported by a media hub in the town offering work across the many facets of production, and ancillary occupations.

The local technical school has been renamed the Elstree Screen Arts Academy

The third Studios and smallest is the BBC Centre producing East Enders and Holby City.

The talk included lots of insights and anecdotes into productions and the high esteem in which the Studios are held around the world.

There is a plan to build a fourth studios in the town but that is in the very early stages of discussion at the moment.

Samaritans

Lockdown is finally easing, and we are all looking forward to more normality – spending time with family and friends, doing the things we enjoy, perhaps getting away for a few days.

This has been a huge undertaking with partners Elstree and Borehamwood town council, Hertsmere borough council and the band stand committee consisting of members from the two Rotary Clubs within the town, Elstree & Borehamwood and The Studios Club. The technical team of Norman Shuker and Andrew Grady have been in consultation with Lightmain and Hertsmere borough council officers to deliver this new structure with all requirements to be fit for purpose.

Congratulations to the appointed contractors Lightmain for triumphing in adversity, delays with materials and Covid-19 restrictions

notwithstanding. Well done to town and borough staff for seing this through to fruition.

The structure delivered by a project committee and Elstree and Borehamwood town council will to be erected by July in time for some of the planned series of concerts.





The Old School House

Built in 1896, with a school room and office, as the second National school for Borehamwood village, it has huge community significance. A total of 66 pupils could attend up to 1914. This replaced an earlier school which became the 'Mission Room', now the Social Club. The building was also used for Elstree parish council meetings.

The building is a red brick square with a fishscale tile hung gable end to the main school hall, a large window at one end and large inserted double doors at the other. There is a former projecting side wing (former headteacher's office) with a boarded gable end next to the decorated chimney stack, comprising a recessed doorway with a boarded door window with a sloping brick sill and brick headers above a recessed doorway with boarded door and brick headers above a similar window to the side with two single storey additions with a sloping roof.

The building is owned by the Federation of Synagogues Trust Ltd. Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society wishes to work with the owners to restore the Old School House to its former glory. Rule 2 (a) of its construction: "Generally, to promote and safeguard rural and residential amenities and in particular to protect features of natural, architectural or historical beauty and interest".



Annual Report 2020/21



Mayor's summary

Summing up at the council meeting on 4 May 2021, the Town Mayor Cllr Simon Rubner said "I particularly felt honoured to work with local charities providing essential services and supplies throughout lockdown – Gratitude and Goods for Good. It always amazes me how local volunteers step forward to meet the demands that are put on Elstree and Borehamwood. They work selflessly and their efforts should not go forgotten and unnoticed. I was also pleased to become a vaccination volunteer in various locations, including Allum Hall." The mayor also provided introductions to a number of virtual events including concerts as well as attending in person where possible (e.g. the opening of the cycle hub at the railway station).

Community services

Hall bookings: Fairway Hall remained closed for the period of the municipal year with works taking place to modernise the building; including the maple sprung flooring being re-laid (for the first time in 25 years). The hall and offices were also made Covid-19 compliant in line with government guidelines and a mandatory risk assessment was drawn up by the town council.

Council Offices: A skeleton caretaking staff continued to work at Fairway Hall whilst measures were put in place to facilitate the continuation of Council services and its democratic processes by home working and remote meetings on the Zoom platform.

Recognising the increased demand in allotment plots from a growing waiting list, the council responded by increasing the number of plots at each site by reclaiming waste ground as follows:

- 9 new plots created at Allum Lane;
- 6 new plots created at Melrose Avenue;
- 1 new plot created at Stapleton Gardens.

To keep plot holders fully informed, a 40 page allotment handbook was prepared and issued together with a newsletter ("BEAN's'talk" covering Covid-19 updates, plot inspections, site improvements and useful

contacts). The council pledged to use c.£25,000 of section106 monies to install a locker shed and additional fencing at Stapleton Gardens.

Planning and Consultations: The council continued to consider planning applications referred to it by Hertsmere borough council as a statutory consultee. 168 were considered in total. Comments were made on 16 of these with concerns including issues of smaller unit developments failing to meet local needs for family sized homes and over the high levels of retrospective applications locally.

Site and street maintenance: In partnership with local businesses, the council maintains the film plaques in Borehamwood, 47 benches and ten notice boards. Both war memorials, St Nicholas and All Saints churchyards (and church clocks) are maintained by the grounds team.

Grants: In 2020/21 the town council was proud to have assisted the following organisations with grant awards (or CIL expenditure) to contribute to the cost of local activities which are of benefit to the community (or a section of it):

- Aldenham Renaissance £5,000 (costs of Covid-19 and new "touchless" car park system);
- Penniwells Riding Centre £500 (costs of Covid-19);
- Boreham Wood Football Club £1,600 (stadium board);
- Borehamwood 2000 FC £768 (towards costs of goal posts);
- The Chai Centre (Jewish Life Centre) £5,000 (Hanukkah event);
- All Saints Church £500 (lighting);
- St Michael and All Angels £5,500 (building improvements).

Two tranches of special grants were made to ten local schools totalling £29,946 to pay for IT equipment (laptops and tablets) enabling students in need to continue their studies remotely.

Leisure and entertainment

Replacement events and activities were held to compensate for the reduction in entertainment services the council was able to host due to the pandemic. These included:

- A virtual talent show (young pianist taking the £75 prize and trophy);
- Two virtual flower festivals (entries displayed on noticeboards and online); and
- Virtual literary festival (with Writers in the Wood and Tony McHale co-creator of Holby City).

Christmas switch on display: The Christmas lights cheered up the community by lighting as usual on Shenley Road, Manor Way, Leeming Road and Elstree with a virtual switch on event conducted by the mayor and special celebrity guests from the BBC flagship show EastEnders; Lorraine Stanley (playing Karen Taylor) and Davood Ghadami (playing Kush Kazemi).

Flag completion: A competition was held to design the first ever town flag (representing the spirit of Elstree and Borehamwood). The winner, 11 year old Lily Saron, was announced in the Town Crier magazine and the flag will be flown throughout the parish area.



Town Crier: Despite the lockdown, four editions of the ever popular town magazine were published as usual and distributed to 16,000 residents and businesses. The publication was appreciated even more this year in lifting the spirits of the community and in providing useful information.

Teddy's Trails: The council published walking book and local history guide, Teddy's Trails, sold 197 copies in the year, proving popular as residents sought outdoor activities to pursue during the pandemic.

Coach trips: There were none (taking special account of the vulnerability of the target users of this service, i.e. senior citizens).

Remembrance Sunday: Because of restrictions, the Remembrance Service took place with limited numbers attending (the event was filmed and streamed online). To mark VE Day (75th anniversary) and VJ Day, the town council erected a commemorative bench near the Borehamwood war memorial.

Children and young people

School swimming: The council supported local schools in meeting the cost of travel to The Venue swimming pool for lessons when this was a permitted activity. Savings against this budget were deployed to support the initiative to provide IT support to schools during the pandemic.

Youth Council: In a true spirit of determination, the Youth Council continued to meet virtually throughout the year on the Zoom platform.

Public access report and communications

The report contents were approved by the council on 4 May 2021 and the report is available for inspection by any elector in the parish area by contacting the town council offices or viewing on the council website (www.elstreeborehamwood-tc.gov.uk). The report is published in the quarterly Town Crier publication distributed to every resident in Elstree and Borehamwood (16,000 copies). Copies are available at the town and borough council's offices and at Borehamwood library.


