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Elstree & Borehamwood Museum

At last there is some good news about the re-opening of the museum. After nearly 18 months of closure the museum opened again on Saturday 4 September.

There is still a chance to see the Holby City at 20 exhibition, as it will remain in place until the end of the year. There is still much interest in this TV drama, especially now that the series is coming to a close during the first quarter of next year. If possible the museum will talk to the BBC about updating some of the objects to refresh the displays. Unfortunately the dressing up element of the exhibition will have to be postponed whilst Covid-19 is still around, but there is much to be learned about how the show is produced though the rolling video.

Once we have settled down again, we will be actively working on the next exhibition. This will follow the planned extension of the Northern Line Underground to Elstree, which was cancelled after WWII. There are many exciting exhibits planned as part of this transport based display. Also, next year will see the centenary of bus routes coming to the area. It is planned that, to commemorate this event during the Civic Festival fortnight, we will be bringing some vintage buses into the area which will actually be offering passenger rides.





This information will be updated nearer the time, but there are lots of exciting things to look forward to now that the Museum will be up and running again.

Here is a reminder of our opening times: Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday 12pm - 6pm, Saturday 10am - 3pm, but please check before travelling.

Communities 1st continues to support Elstree & Borehamwood residents



Despite the slow return to normal life, many vulnerable residents continue to feel anxious about venturing outside their homes alone.

Perhaps you or someone you know has experienced a loss of confidence during the pandemic, and is struggling to fetch their own shopping or prescription medicine?

Communities 1st has continued to provide essential services to local residents in vulnerable situations, through volunteer shopping deliveries, telephone calls, prescription medicine collection and even dog walking!

"It's been really valuable to me. I haven't had a support bubble. I think we've got on really well". – Janet, a client using our telephone befriending service since the beginning of the pandemic.

Communities 1st has also continued to run its Community Car Scheme that served as a safe, secure mode of transport for many during the pandemic. All our transport services enforce strict Covid safety measures, including masks, vehicle sanitizing, and regular driver lateral flow tests.

"I found it very useful. The drivers were very helpful and sympathetic, they've gone the extra mile." – Mary, a client who used our Community Car Scheme to get to her vaccination and hospital appointments.

Most recently Communities 1st have launched the Walking Buddies and Shopper Bus Buddy schemes. The Walking Buddies initiative matches local clients with volunteers who accompany them for a walk up the road or to the local shop, so they can feel supported while they build up their confidence to go out. The Shopper Bus Buddy scheme picks up residents from their door and drops them at the local supermarket, providing volunteer support with boarding on and off the bus, carrying bags, and help around the supermarket if necessary.

"It's been a great help for me, some of the drivers have been fantastic. ... To me, it's been a Godsend." – Helen, a client who has been using our Shopper Service since last year.

Getting connected through technology allows you to keep in touch with loved ones, find helpful information and resources, and order shopping online. Youth Council

Having been a Youth Councillor since 2016, the opportunities that have arisen not only to make a positive impact upon myself but also upon the local community have proved to be of invaluable experience.

The Elstree and Borehamwood Youth Council are a youth branch of the local Town Council and aim to improve the local area for young people. Whilst I would love to go into detail about every aspect of my Youth Council experience, I feel the best way to summarise my time would be to provide three key ways in which the Youth Council has benefitted me.

1 – Interest in local politics – Being involved in the Youth Council has meant that I have become immersed in the world of local politics.

Whilst the national media vociferously reports on national politics, the importance of local councils and their role at the heart of the local community is often overlooked. As a result of the need to work closely with the Town Council I have had the opportunity to develop connections with various local councillors and also attend full council meeting as an observer. Having grown up in Elstree and Borehamwood my whole life it was a privilege to observe how seriously town councillors took their responsibilities in representing those in their respective wards.

Additionally, I was provided with two days of work experience at the town council whereby I shadowed various functions of local council ranging from planning to publishing the town crier and organising local events. It is fair to say that I now greatly appreciate the work of our town council and their role in encouraging community cohesion in our local area.

2 – Working with local organisations – A key objective of the Youth Council is to provide a 'helping hand' to various local, charitable organisations.

One of my favourite organisations to work with was 'First Impressions' run by Bob Redman. The work that Bob has done in improving the local area through various projects such as improving the station area to advertising Elstree and Borehamwood's film heritage is remarkable and on various occasions the Youth Council were able to assist First Impressions in their endeavours. For example, we helped to grow new planters once the station had been re-established. Not only did this improve the aesthetics of the station area but also meant that I was appreciative of the great work that so many local organisations do to improve the area for the general public.

3 – Improve meeting etiquette – Prior to joining the Youth Council I had very little experience of conducting and even running meetings. However, I quickly learnt the formalities and processes of running a



meeting. I even served as chair of the Youth Council for a year which certainly helped to further develop my communication and leadership skills

I would certainly recommend joining the Youth Council, the positive impact that it has had not only on myself but on the wider community is invaluable. As well as this I have met some wonderful people throughout my time at the Youth Council. In particular I would like to extend my thanks to Anne Nicodemus (Youth Council secretary).

Summerswood Primary School

Oliver Dowden MP, Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport has worked with Brass Band England (BBE) to promote learning of brass instruments in UK schools.

During June Herts Music Service, in partnership with BBE, worked with many schools across Hertfordshire teaching Year 6 students. Herts Music Service sourced instruments from across the county and obtained new instruments with the funding from the Department of Culture Media and Sport.

Paul Fisher and Dierdre Waller-Box, from Herts Music Service and BBE worked in two local schools, Summerswood Primary in Borehamwood and Fairfield Junior in Radlett to develop basic skills in playing a brass instrument.



Borehamwood Brass members attended two special 'Proms in the Playground' events held at both schools before the end of term.

The hope is that some of the pupils will keep on learning an instrument, to develop a youth band in the coming years. The scheme will continue to run in the next academic year. It is very much hoped that these young people from Summerswood will be able to

entertain the community at town events.



Cllr Pat Strack said "I am full of praise both for the tutors and the players. This was an excellent opportunity to showcase to parents and the whole school. As a Summerswood school governor I was invited to attend the concert given at Summerswood. The children's performance was brilliant. The concert was amazing. Quite clearly performers and audience were really into it, marching, clapping and stamping".

Andrew Grady said "It was so apt that Borehamwood Brass could play with a small ensemble to show what a real brass band sounds like. Borehamwood Brass have served the town well. It will be a great step forward to introduce a whole new generation to this genre of music."

Back to the Future?

In this movie the young people are whisked back 30 years and have to seek a way to get back to the time that they came from. Our children today are starting from much further back than where they should be. Unlike in the movie, this cannot be resolved by a bolt of lightning, and the way things are going it looks as if it will take many years for education to get back to normal.

How many governors, two years ago, knew anything about Zoom or Teams? Yet today we are all familiar with these, and although they might be considered less valuable than face to face meetings there is a place for them. Who, for example, would want to go out in bad weather, later in the year, or would want their staff to do so?

All schools will have new governors, most of whom will not have been in a classroom since they were in school. More experienced governors will have a role in supporting them in the protocols of visiting and reporting.

Back to the future, which is now, I would urge governors to ask a question about the affordability of their uniforms. Unfortunately, a new law aimed at making uniforms cheaper will not be in place this September. The Children's Society report that the average cost for primary children is £315 and for



secondary £337. Hopefully this will enable savings when it comes into force. Fortunately most schools have taken matters into their own hands and recycle uniforms and other relevant clothing.

Teresa had been a part of the Hertsmere Mencap family for as many years as we can remember, regularly attending the Jubilee Club, music, drama, art & crafts, our Coffee Morning and she was always on the minibus to the Magpie Club. She was a friend of everyone. "Teresa was always nice to me, we talked a lot and we were good friends, said Michael, one of our members. Glyn and Linda, who are both members said "She was kind, caring and we are going to miss our special friend."

Paul Moser, Hertsmere Mencap Chair, said "everyone loved Teresa who, with her ready smile, brightened up all our lives. She was so much part of what we do, not only taking part in many activities but also, for instance, making the teas at arts & crafts - she'll be really missed by us all."

But it wasn't only Hertsmere Mencap that loved Teresa. Sandra, a care worker for Mencap, recalls "I would often see Teresa in Borehamwood village. There were so many people who stopped to chat to Teresa that it would take her forever to make it to the other end of the village."

Many of our members knew Teresa from school. Neil, another member, reminisced "I knew Teresa as a shy six-year-old girl. One day I found her crying and asked her what was wrong. Teresa wanted to make friends but was too shy". Neil recalls saying to her "I'll talk to you and I'll be your friend". Neil and Teresa rediscovered each other at Jubilee Club a few years later and were friends ever since.

Teresa had a wonderful sense of humour, always laughing, always happy and telling jokes. She was often heard giggling away and one of her favourite jokes recently was "What's white, fluffy and comes from Canada?" "Teresa was always cheerful; in fact, she was one of the most positive people I knew" recalls Tracey, one of our volunteers. "She was always a delight to be around, always happy and was a real ray of sunshine even when she was feeling uncertain" recalls Amanda, a volunteer, friend and a wonderful support to Teresa during her illness

or Only Fools and Horses, and was known to crack up when watching an episode of Family Guy.

Susan Moser said "I will always remember Teresa for her sensitivity, her sincerity and the love she offered everyone along with her cheerfulness and her ability to embrace the good things in life. She will be remembered by us all – and we will smile as we think of her."

When Teresa wasn't attending one of our activities, she worked in a charity shop in Borehamwood village, which she loved very much. Teresa loved country music; in fact the Jubilee Club was in the midst of organising a country music night for Teresa to join over Zoom. Unfortunately, this was not able to go ahead as Teresa was too ill.

Sadly, Teresa became unwell at the beginning of this year. Teresa's Hertsmere Mencap family immediately rallied around her to give her support with numerous visits, phone calls, food, and accompanying Teresa to her medical appointments.

Losing Teresa is a huge loss for Hertsmere Mencap. She was a very special friend to us all and she has left a void in all our hearts. She will never be forgotten.

best they could be. She introduced many people to the church. Twice a year in June and December, Marijke would coordinate the special flower arrangements made by community organisations for residents to enjoy.


At the monthly showcase of community organisations at All Saints Marijke would organise a band of volunteers to do the refreshments.

Then one of Gratitude's Afghani volunteers went room to room to make up a list from each mum as to what things her family needed. List after list of nappies, shoes, snacks, etc. Now, back to the old library and individual boxes were made up for delivery.

We are very multicultural. Our volunteers come

Music in the Wood

The bandstand working group, made up of interested parties from within the town, mainly drew experience and expertise from the two local Rotary Clubs. It has been working with both local statutory bodies of Elstree and Borehamwood town council and Hertsmere borough council to commission a performance shelter for Meadow Park.

Following permission, the project committee worked with the contractors, Lightmain, and Ian Kershaw and Aaron Niblett from Hertsmere to move the project forward.

Lightmain Ltd was appointed contractor by the town council to build this bandstand. Herstmere paid for the hardstanding and the electrical installation.

The structure was erected at the end of June 2021 in time for the start of a five-week concert series that was organised under Covid-19 restrictions.

The technical details were overseen by Andrew Grady and Norman Shuker, who both have a wealth of expertise to draw from.

The opening ceremony for the shelter took place on 1 September with town and borough councillors and members of the community present. This facility will bring so many benefits for the residents of Elstree and Borehamwood, especially as we emerge out of the Covid-19 restrictions.



Summer concerts in Meadow Park

The town council, with partners, the Meadow Park entertainment project committee and Hertsmere borough council, organised a series of five Sunday afternoon brass band concerts for the pleasure of all the townsfolk. Live music was much welcomed after lockdown. All bands (except Enfield) were from Hertfordshire.

Welwyn Garden City Band played the first concert date on 4 July 2021, including a programme celebrating American Independence Day and recognising 'Big Thankyou Day'. The Woodmen also performed. This band was founded in 1977. It borrowed the nickname of Boreham Wood football club. Originally, all the members lived here. Now, three live in Hemel Hempstead and one in Holt, Norfolk.

On 11 July Hitchin Band, one of the oldest bands in Hertfordshire, celebrating their 150th Anniversary a few years ago, played. They performed a wide range of popular music (https://www.facebook.com/mparkarena/videos/1756743927845391).





Sunday 18 July's concert featured the Enfield Brass Band, performing a varied programme. Our very own 'Writers in the Wood' recited some of their original works before the commencement of the afternoon concert.



First Impressions

Over ten years ago I was invited as town councillor for Hillside Ward to represent the town council on a new group just being formed. From its first meeting I could tell that this group would be very different, and today I'm still excited by the contributions we make in what we call First Impressions.

At the time, plans were being made to upgrade the railway station to create an 'integrated transport interchange'. In plain English that means making it easier for bus users to transfer to the rail service and vice versa.

Local volunteer group Elstree Screen Heritage felt that to be involved in that redevelopment would be an opportunity to create a strong first impression of an active and prosperous suburban community, proud of its unique film and TV heritage and confident of its future.

We all agreed that to achieve that would require the voluntary cooperation of key stakeholders, so as well as Elstree Screen Heritage and the town council, from the start there have been representatives on First Impressions from the borough and county

councils plus the train services operator, now Thameslink.

What we've all learned is that often it takes these organisations to combine their forces in order to achieve remarkable results. These days with the station looking so good and with big plans for future changes it's easy to forget what an eyesore the railway station and sections of Shenley Road were. Because it was so grim and unloved, we were confident we could transform the station and its surroundings into a better-looking, safer-feeling place.

It's now an attractive access point to the area's key source of civic pride, its film and TV activity. This vital local industry generates upwards of £30,000 a day for the regional economy and is rapidly expanding.

We're very proud of our film industry in Borehamwood, and First Impressions has brought it even closer. I think it's made the community more aware. People feel connected; it's made people feel like they belong, and feel proud to belong.

Elstree & Borehamwood's railway station gets a revamp from First Impressions and stakeholders

The long awaited sprucing-up of Elstree & Borehamwood's train station has commenced with First Impressions spearheading the process.

It's occurring under the leadership of chairman Bob Redman and assisted by the town councillors Alpha Bird Collins, LLM and Sandra Parnell along with Patrick Ladbury of Govia Thameslink Railway (GTR) and other stakeholders.

Prior to the commencement of improvements at the station, a consultative survey was carried out by 'First Impressions' with passengers' opinions being prioritised. As a result of the survey, the following proposals from the public emerged and were considered to be tackled with an eye on modernity. Such as: brand new planters placed on the outside of the station for beautification purposes; improved toilet facilities for all; upgraded means to facilitate disabled passengers; additional parking provisions and better signposting among others are being done. There are other issues in the pipeline yet to be completed in the near future.

Over the past ten years 'First Impressions' has continued as a collaboration of the town, borough, and county councils, along with Elstree Screen Heritage and the current railway operator Govia Thameslink Railway.

It is noteworthy that an upsurge of heartfelt thanks and appreciation from the stakeholders goes to GTR for allocating eighty thousand pounds (£80,000) from the 'Passenger Benefit Fund' which was set up to make amends for the train timetable disruption in 2018 that inconvenienced passengers.

Tom Moran, Managing Director for Thameslink and Great Northern, said: "Our improvement programme is making stations smarter, more efficient and more sustainable. It's great to be working with local partners here at Elstree & Borehamwood to make the station a better experience for passengers, and the best asset it can be for the community."



For years the forecourt has been bleak and barren. Displaying colourful banners on the lighting columns has helped but adding six new planters on the 'islands' has now made the area much more attractive at ground level. Another five planters have just been added to the open space on Allum Lane and the large planter, created by 'First Impressions' with help from youth councillors, has been refreshed.

Currently, chairman Redman of First Impressions and Mr. Ladbury of Govia Thameslink Railway are in discussion to have additional benches installed at the station before the end of September, as well as a large digital kiosk to display not only rail information but also information to be provided by key community groups, including the town council.

The forecourt was also recently brightened by the appearance of ten new banners featuring the design of Elstree and Borehamwood's new flag, described elsewhere in this edition of Town Crier.

Finally, Elstree and Borehamwood town is where Elstree Film Studios $\,$

and the BBC Elstree Centre are respectively located with the new Sky Studios currently being built. Many movies and TV programmes are made in this town and viewed around the world.







Defibrillator Campaign

Good news! Good news!


This all started because resident Lawrence Stack brought the idea forward.

McColls has decided to put automated external defibrillators (AEDs) into all their outlets. The rollout began in July. Boreham Wood Youth Football Club have their own defibrillator. Clarion are investigating installing defibrillators in their housing for the elderly.

The Defibrillator Campaign team, Clive Butchins, Sandra Parnell and Pat Strack, responded to a public request to put defibrillators in three local shopping streets: Howard Drive, Hartforde Rd and Elstree High St. The AED in Leeming Rd is at the Community Shop and there is one at the church at Rossington Avenue.

A defibrillator has been installed at the Village Food and Wine Store in Elstree village.

The two that would have been installed in Hartforde Rd and Howard Drive will now be installed in Manor Way and at Borehamwood Multipurpose Day Service at 100 Avcliffe Road.



Money is still being raised from the public to pay for batteries and pads that need renewing once an AED is five years old. The batteries and pads cost £150 for each AED. The ten primary schools and Hertswood School are our priority. This will cost £1,650. All other AEDs we have donated to the venues have become the responsibility of the recipient.

Hertfordshire Constabulary have added a 24/7 AED outside the police station at the Civic Offices.



ELSTREE & BOREHAMWOOD DEFIBRILLATOR PROJECT LOCATIONS







St Michael's Hall hosts climate pilgrims

St Michael and All Angels, Borehamwood hosted the Young Christian Climate Network relay pilgrimage to COP26 on Tuesday, 10 August.

The church organised a community meal and provided overnight accommodation for the walkers in St Michael's Hall. The Right Reverend Dr Alan Smith, Bishop of St Albans, said, 'It is wonderful to greet the pilgrims as we work together for the good of the planet. Caring for creation is a theme that runs through the entire Bible, from start to finish. Christians are called to be good stewards of the planet and to care about the environment. This is an area where many young people are taking the lead. Your relay to Glasgow for COP26 demonstrates that you are taking a lead and you are turning up the heat on climate issues. I call on us all in the communities of this diocese to hear the call and

turn up the heat on climate issues so we can turn down the heat on the planet.'

Starting from Carbis Bay in Cornwall, site of the G7 summit, in June and ending in Glasgow for the climate talks in November, the pilgrimage will cover more than 1,000 miles and involve hundreds of walkers in a relay to call for climate justice for the world's poorest and most vulnerable. Travelling with them is The Pilgrim, the boat which is the symbol of the YCCN's call for climate justice.





Camp Unity 2021

Camp Unity 2021, a multifaith residential programme for 6-11-year-olds, began this year with 42 campers, three parent volunteers, several youth and assistant youth leaders, a few hardy trustees and a camp director all wishing to sleep on the campsite.

Despite the cold temperatures and a bit of rain, the programme ran for five nights from Sunday to Friday 15 - 20 August 2021, and was held at One Oak field in Aldenham Country Park.

Among the highlights this year were a visit from the Chief Constable of Hertfordshire, Charlie Hall QPM, a squad car demonstration by the local Borehamwood police, plus an informal visit from the High Sheriff of Hertfordshire, the Honourable Lionel C Wallace, DL.

Focusing on what makes Elstree and Borehamwood unique, we also took the children to a 'splash' session at the Venue leisure centre, to work on a garden allotment at Stapleton Road, to the working farm and attractions at Aldenham Country Park, and more. Sincere thanks to all of the vendors who accommodated us.

The children responded energetically to the outdoors, running through fields by day and staying up late by the campfire at night, allowing them respite after nearly 18 months under government guidelines and three extended lockdowns.

This year the group was more diverse by religion than previously, with more Jewish, Muslim and Asian children rounding out the majority Christian cohort. Nearly half of the children had attended our 2019



programme. Some of the nations represented this year included: Canada, Czechia, Hungary, India, Ireland, Japan, Lithuania, Nigeria, Philippines, Poland,

Romania, Slovakia, Turkey, UK and USA.

Camp Unity aims to bring local communities together to promote friendships among children who might not ordinarily have a chance to meet, to encourage exploration of the outdoors, and to help build confidence. Our local Covid-19 vaccination centre now welcomes walk-ins!!

The spring edition of Town Crier announced that the first Hertsmere Covid-19 vaccines were delivered on 7 January at a GP-run vaccination centre based at Allum Hall in Elstree. Several months later, the summer edition reported that by early May over 50,000 doses had been given to 30,000 patients.

Since then, over 70,000 vaccinations have been delivered at Allum Hall, the largest Covid-19 vaccination centre in Hertsmere. If socially-distanced, that many patients would stretch from Elstree to Leicester!

In August the centre took another key step by starting to offer walk-in Covid-19 vaccination clinics, making it easier than ever for local people to get their first vaccination, or their second jab eight weeks after the first. As well as continuing to serve patients with prior appointments, clinics offer both the Astra Zeneca and Pfizer vaccines to anyone aged 16 or older who turns up.


By the end of August more than 500 people had taken advantage of being able to 'grab a jab' without having to book in advance and without having to be registered with a GP or needing to provide ID.

Dr Kate Page, senior partner at Fairbrook Medical Centre in Borehamwood and Hertsmere locality chair for Herts Valleys clinical commissioning group says: "We've worked hard to provide patients with a friendly and efficient service through our team of NHS clinicians and care coordinators working alongside volunteers organised by Communities First. Patients aren't having to wait long - even with walk-ins - and we're all very glad to see so many younger patients, for whom the freedom to just turn up has helped them decide to get that all important first jab.'

Given the popularity of the walk-in appointments, the Allum Hall vaccination centre is likely to continue to offer walk-in clinics throughout the autumn for first and second doses.

And there's more good news!

Allum Manor has also supported the local response to coronavirus by hosting a NHS Patient Assessment Centre (PAC), offering



Located in temporary buildings in a sectioned-off part of the car park, the PAC opened on 1 December 2020 and is available by appointment only from 10:30am to 6pm Monday to Friday for patients who have been referred by their GP or by NHS111. Testing for Covid-19 is NOT part of the service.

The PAC continues to work at full capacity; many of its current patients are children who would otherwise have to go to a hospital A&E department. To the immense relief of their parents, a visit to the PAC means a GP can see their child by appointment. This service has provided so much value to the community that the trustees of Allum Manor have agreed to extend hosting the PAC to the end of the year.

During the pandemic, through the excellent technical skills of our volunteers, we managed to keep going with all the weekly audio recordings and deliveries to our listeners.

We achieved this by doing the recordings remotely, rather than using our recording studio in Radlett. So, listeners to our Radlett, Elstree, Borehamwood and Shenley talking newspaper continued to receive what they needed - local news, magazine-style articles and much appreciated humour.

These recordings, on USBs (memory sticks), are posted off to our mainly blind and visually impaired recipients who then listen to them on their easy-to-use players. All equipment and postage is supplied free of charge. Others who feel isolated or have problems with reading due to strokes or other conditions also benefit from this service.

We also keep in periodic touch with those who request it by phone calls. These calls provide a general catch-up opportunity, plus give us feedback on the recordings. All these services are run by our friendly, dedicated team of volunteers, including some with visual impairment. We are currently still considering our possible return to our recording studios.

Environment

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society hosted a Zoom conference with Chris Berry of the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England. Chris was able to explain about the process and procedures for the Hertsmere Local Plan (HLP).

Among other groups attending were representatives from Woodcock Hill Village Green, Elstree Village Preservation Society, Radlett Society and Green Belt Association and Allum Fields Association.

The whole event was very informative and useful. The Q&As at the end helped the different groups to understand how the HLP could affect them.

The Hertsmere Local Plan and policies may be viewed on Hertsmere borough council's website. The draft HLP will go to the executive in mid-September, then to full council. There will be a six week consultation period when the residents can put their views. Exhibitions will be held around the borough and publicity arranged so that residents can see what is proposed. The draft HLP will then go to the next stage in 2022.



Shenley footpath no 3

Cllr Sandra Parnell with the trustees at Well End Activity Centre including scouters, Carol and Len Denbigh, was leading on the diversion in 2016 with the designated responsible officer at Hertsmere borough council (HBC) planning.

The trustees of the Scout Activity Centre applied to Hertsmere borough council to have the footpath diverted from across their fields (blue 3 to 3 on the plan) to A to B close to Well End Road. This is a safeguarding issue for the centre.

The footpath runs across the fields into Cowley Hill, Borehamwood. HBC and user groups are agreeable to the diversion. That requires a dedication of A to B as a bridleway and with suitable width and surface. The new route, which only carries permissive footpath status at present, has been used by horses. The overall level of use has made the surface very difficult for walkers, and in any case the current width is unsuitable for people and horses together. There

was a kissing gate on the new route but it was removed in June 2020, by the Scout Activity Centre.

Use of the original footpath has increased dramatically since Covid. Phil Wadey of the British Horse Association has advised horse riders that it is illegal for riders to use this present footpath as it is not a bridleway. For health and safety, especially of young people that need to use the Scout site during the coming months, we need this to be a priority!



The continued use of the present footpath can compromise the safeguarding of young people using the Well End Activity Centre.

Doug Stack, Scout Association spokesman stated that the diversion order was due to be made in summer 2020.

All parties are agreed that the footpath diversion order should be achieved asap. However, as there is one outstanding objection, all is on hold. The matter will need to be referred to the Secretary of State to adjudicate. There is no timescale for this process.

The existing footpath through the Well End Scout Activity Centre cannot be closed off until the other path has been 'made".

Woodcock Hill Village Green committee continues to raise funds to instruct a barrister to represent us at the public inquiry.

Aldenham reservoir

The five yearly dam survey was undertaken in August 2021. There is great concern that the water level has been lowered too far.


This has had a two-pronged effect; there are muddy patches at the edges which have caused problems to both pedestrians and dogs, and natural habitats are exposed to predators. Algae growth flourishes in shallower water. This was controlled in the past by Aldenham Sailing Club volunteers spreading a natural dye into the water which inhibited the growth of the algae. The ecological impact as well as health implications are being investigated by Hertsmere's environmental health officers.

The survey of the dam undertaken in 2016 advised that there was no imminent danger to the fabric. Allowing the water to be lowered and raised is likely to cause cracks, as this destabilises the foundations when they are flooded then dried out.

The advisory panel await with interest the findings of this latest survey. Parkrun returned on Saturday 24 July with permission to continue on the Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd section until 5 October (https://www.parkrun.org.uk/aldenham).

Talks are ongoing between the landowners, Herts county council and Hertsmere borough council. The panel members resolved to contact their members to implore the interested parties to come to a resolution that will save this historic community asset. Ann Goddard, chair of Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society, states "This 'Jewel in the Crown', situated in the heart of the green belt, is unique to both the town and Hertfordshire. A way must be found to ensure that generations to come will benefit from the amenity value and scenic views."

Draft Hertsmere Local Plan

Hertsmere borough council has unveiled its list of development sites to fulfil targets set by the Government.

In Borehamwood, this includes 2,155 new homes. Two new neighbourhoods would be created. The land off Cowley Hill has been earmarked for 800 homes along with a primary school, while land north and south of Barnet Lane, between Deacons Hill Road and Furzehill Road, has been proposed to accommodate 325 homes in total, along with a possible secondary school.

The plan states the proposal off Barnet Lane "secures the village green", probably Woodcock Hill.

The remaining seven sites are Elstree Way corridor (685 homes), Organ Hall Farm (165), The Point (150) plus entertainment and leisure facilities, Well End Lodge (15), Lyndhurst Farm (10) and land off Green Street (5).

A new healthcare facility proposed for a site in Allum Lane would relocate Schopwick surgery from Elstree closer to Borehamwood.

Elstree Way, Stirling Way, Imperial Place, Borehamwood Enterprise Centre and Theobald Court would be protected for economic development. The Sky Studios development, under construction between Rowley Lane and the A1 would be expanded to become a "Media Quarter".

A further 50 hectares of land next to the current construction site is earmarked for the development of additional sound stages and supporting facilities, including the proposed second phase of the Sky Studios scheme.

Other areas of Hertsmere will be built on too, to meet housing targets.

The draft local plan has been issued for approval by Hertsmere borough council before going to public consultation this autumn. For further information go to the Hertsmere council website.

Hertfordshire Fire and Rescue Service barbecue safety

General safety

- Make sure your barbecue is in good working order;
- Ensure the barbecue is on a flat site, well away from a shed, trees or shrubs;
- Keep children, garden games and pets well away from the cooking area;
- Never leave the barbecue unattended;
- Keep a bucket of water or sand nearby for emergencies;
- Ensure the barbecue is cool before attempting to move it.



Charcoal barbecues

- Use only enough charcoal to cover the base to a depth of about 50mm (2 inches):
- Only use recognised fire lighters or starter fuel and only on cold coals – use the minimum necessary and never use petrol;
- Never put hot ashes straight into a dustbin or wheelie bin they could melt the plastic and cause a fire.

Gas barbecues


- Make sure the tap is turned off before changing the gas cylinder;
- Change cylinders outdoors if possible or in a well-ventilated area;
- If you suspect a leak to the cylinder or pipe work, brush soapy water around the joints and watch for bubbles tighten to fix but do not overtighten;
- After cooking, turn off the gas cylinder before turning off at the controls to ensure any residual gas in the pipe work is used up.


