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

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### Compost Corner

#### Bee Aware

With bee numbers on the decline, Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council has provided safe areas for bee hives to be situated on all three of its allotment sites.

As well as providing the delicious honey we so love, bees are essential to our human existence. When they are collecting pollen, nectar and water from flowers for food, they pollinate three quarters of all crops. Without them and other pollinating insects, the food chain is under threat.

Bees are continually under threat due to loss of habitat, the changes in weather conditions with wetter, colder spring and summer months, parasitic mites that decimate hives and nests, as well as use of pesticides.

To make your garden (and allotment) more bee-friendly you can do several things:

- Provide water in the form of a pond, bird bath, or pot necessary for diluting honey stores, and for cooling the hive or nest in summer;
- Plant single-flowering plants mint (all herbs), beans, plants from allium family, asters, sunflowers, hollyhocks, foxgloves, and learn to love dandelions!
- Choose plants that will provide a succession of flowers for as long as possible;
- Leave flowering plants in place even ivy is an important source of late-season winter food.

Check out the British Beekeepers Association website www.bbka.org.uk for advice on bee-friendly trees and shrubs.

If you spot a swarm of bees, please let us know at the Town Council so we can put you in touch with one of our local beekeepers who is looking for new swarms.

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In 2021, Borehamwood Foodbank supported over 10,200 people with emergency food packages. We saw a 35% increase in need for our services.

Prior to the pandemic, many people coming to Borehamwood Foodbank for support were individuals, but Covid-19 has driven up demand from families.

That's why we're so grateful to the support we receive from Hertsmere Community Foundation, Tesco, and other businesses, as well as individual donors, which have meant we can arrange some fun activities at our family school lunch sessions over the school holidays.

Over the Easter break, we held two additional sessions, which had almost 60 children at each session. They had the opportunity to do some planting, play some games and dance. There were arts and craft activities and every child left with a delicious home cooked lunch, a food package and an Easter egg.

A huge thanks also to our kind-hearted volunteers who prepare for, cook for and host the sessions – we couldn't do it without them.

#### Foodbanks and donors help the needy

Times are difficult for some families and individuals in Elstree and Borehamwood to put food on their respective tables due to the economic hardship they are faced with. Food insecurity and keeping warm are two challenges they are being confronted with. The situation is the result of the economic downturn and Covid-19 pandemic.

It is worth pointing out that all is not lost, given the generosity of donors to the three food banks, namely WD6 Food Support, Gratitude Food Bank and Borehamwood Food Bank. The foodbanks are strategically located in various parts of Borehamwood where they distribute food, sanitary items and clothing, among other essential products to the needy throughout the year.

To begin with, WD6 Food Support serves about sixty-plus families on a weekly basis. The food bank is opened twice a week on Wednesday and Friday from 3:15pm - 4:30pm throughout the year. The users of the service can walk in and are self referred. This food bank also gives toys to children and a whole turkey per family during the Christmas holidays. They can be located at Parkside Community Primary School on Aycliffe Road.

Gratitude Food Bank is open to the public daily from 10am - 5pm.

People are self referred and are given fruit, vegetables, sanitary items and clothes. It has a 'babies corner' with nappies and other accessories for babies and toddlers. The founders of the food bank divulged: "Gratitude Food Bank resulted from the biblical story of Jesus Christ's feeding of the five thousand people." Their location is 289 Shenley Road.

It is also great to mention Borehamwood Food Bank which is part of the Trussel Trust. This food bank helps local people in crisis with emergency food for three days per visit. Both perishable and non perishable foods are distributed. During the holidays, hot meals are prepared for those who use their services. Additional services are provided in collaboration with other organizations such as the Citizen's Advice Bureau. Its policy is also self referral and it is opened eight times monthly in a calendar year. One can easily locate this food bank at Saint Teresa's Catholic church, 291 Shenley Road.

It is noteworthy that the above named food banks are doing a great job helping local needy people who are experiencing food poverty to get something to feed their families. Thanks are due to the many volunteers, donors and supermarkets who continue to reach out to their fellow human beings. Yes, indeed, all are geared toward assisting to alleviate hunger and deprivation in Elstree and Borehamwood.

#### **Penniwells**


Penniwells RDA Centre provides riding and stable management sessions to people of all ages and disabilities.

## Cowley Hill Primary School

### Support for Ukraine through the Sunflower Appeal

When the conflict started in Ukraine many members of our community asked what we could do to help the people who are affected.

We teamed up with our local church, St Michael & All Angels, and worked with the Revd Louise Collins to plan how we could help. After some investigation she shared the Sunflower Appeal with us. Within one week our children and families had come together and sent in a variety of items that would support families affected by the conflict within the countries bordering Ukraine.

Our donations made their way to the centre in Willesden and then directly by lorry to the refugee sites. We were really pleased to be able to help and know that we have played our part in supporting others.



#### Foodbank

The children of Cowley Hill continued to support local families at Christmas by making lovely boxes of cheer.

These hampers contained special Christmas foods and a game for families. A personalised card made them extra special. The weight of the food was a fantastic 67.47kg and we collected a huge £203 to allow the food bank to buy items that they were short of. Well done Cowley Hill community.

#### International week 7 to 11 February

7 to 11 February was "International week" which provided us with the opportunity to celebrate and recognise our diverse school and our individual identities.

Our week started with an assembly delivered by our wellbeing ambassadors and school council members as they explored diversity and equality with pupils.

During the week, each class engaged with exciting learning activities such as food tasting, dancing and music, art, games and listening to different stories. Each class explored different countries and learnt about different famous international artists, creating fantastic art pieces.

We then had a whole school international dress up day where pupils came dressed in traditional clothing or colours



representing their identity, home flags or their class country focus.

#### VegFest 2022

Members of our eco warrior team, from upper key stage 2, worked with a VegFest representative to prepare our vegetable beds for the summer term.

They cleared the beds and planted onions and runner beans in preparation for the VegFest 2022 competition. They were pleased to see success from the Brussels sprout planting. We can't wait to see our produce as it grows. The eco warriors are planning on using the food that we grow to cook for our after school club. They are exploring ways to help with sustainability.



#### The Queen's Jubilee

We are very pleased to announce that every pupil at Cowley Hill has recently participated in an activity for the Rotary Club's celebration of the Queens Jubilee.

The children created their own pennants which will be displayed across parks, streets and open areas in Borehamwood during the celebration. The children have used a range of media in their art lessons for their wonderful creations. Well done to all of the children for their excellent work.

## Kenilworth Primary School

We are very busy at Kenilworth School developing our outdoor learning environment. We have recently been joined by goats, chickens and now ducks in the early years. The pupils at Kenilworth are enjoying caring for these animals.

Miss Hardaker, the nursery teacher, reports 'Nursery are currently helping to look after the ducklings. The children are very interested in them and have learnt the word 'ducklings.' They watched them in their box where they dozed under the warming lamp. When the ducklings were out for us to have a closer look some of the children wanted to touch them. Learning to stroke gently rather than trying to pick up or poke a duckling was a bit tricky at times. The children can't wait to watch them grow over the next few weeks.'

Our eco-council have also been incredibly busy this half term, leading a campaign to raise funds for a new vegetable patch. They created an excellent fundraising video explaining why they feel Kenilworth needs a vegetable patch, and we would like to thank the community for all of their generous donations. Working with the Aviva community fund and local businesses we have raised £1500 and work will begin to create this patch over the course of the next few weeks.



Our junior travel ambassadors have also been busy promoting safe and active travel to and from school. They organised a fantastic week of activities during 'The Big Walk and Wheel' at the end of March, including a bling your bike competition and the return of our biker's breakfast - where the children came to school early to share breakfast together before cycling and scooting on the school playground. We had a lot of fun and learned how important it is to be active.






#### If you could go back in time!

When Cher first sang this in 1999, schools were not the same as they are today but in 1977 when I became a governor they were even more different.

At that time children sat in rows and a piece of chalk was all the technology a teacher needed. There were no white-boards, no computers and films were shown using a Kodak projector with reels of celluloid. The blackboard or an overhead projector were the central point of the room and children wrote with fountain pens. Homework was only done in secondary schools, girls did needlework and boys did woodwork.



The role of governors too, has changed remarkably. I became a governor because I wanted to support our community but our contribution, save one activity, was minimal. That one activity was and still is our most significant function, which is the appointment of the headteacher. There is nothing more important that we are involved in and which has the most long lasting effect. Unfortunately, this is more so if we get it wrong.

Governors only used to come to the school for three meetings  $\alpha$  year. There were no committee meetings, learning walks or health and safety visits. It was very cosy, and I did not feel we were

doing much worthwhile. It was only with the onset of OFSTED that the role of governors was put under scrutiny. In the last ten years the expectations and role of governors has catapulted forward such that their role is now recognised as fundamental for a good or better school.







The good news is ... Camp Unity 2022 is again preparing an adventure-filled week for primary school children (6-11 years old) to run for 5 nights from Sunday-Friday, 31 July - 5 August 2022.

## Environment

#### Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society Annual General Meeting

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society has campaigned to keep the lovely countyside around us 'green and pleasant' in the face of intense pressure for housing development.

We try to balance the need for decent affordable homes with preservation of fields,woods and natural habitats for creatures sharing this planet with us. So we welcome the rethinking of the draft Local Plan which would have allowed overdevelopment.

Woodcock Hill and Aldenham Reservoir are two endangered green spaces. We have been active in opposing the deregistation of Woodcock Hill as a village green and for Aldenham Reservoir to be retuned to its previous water levels. Happily the well loved path round the reservoir has been declared a right of way with the welcome assistance of councillors of all political parties and Herts county council.





The reservoir should be in public ownership with maintenance and costs borne by a community interest company with cooperation of local authorities, the current owners and local conservation organisations. The historic clay dam remains a potential problem though recent surveys have shown no immediate danger. Surely the sacrifice of land south of Watford Road for housing in exchange for funds for dam repair would constitute the 'exceptional circumstances' needed to justify using Green Belt land.

The proposed solar plant off Butterfly Lane we rejected as vastly oversized and using agricultural land needed for food production and inappropriate in green belt. Solar panels on public building and houses would be preferable combined with insulation.

Our MP Oliver Dowden CBE met us recently and pledged his support for revision of the housing targets imposed by central government decree.

We combine with local conservation bodies such as Radlett Green Belt Society and Aldenham Parish Council and have advice from Herts CPRE, The Country Charity.

Please join the Green Belt Society for the trifling fee of £5 per annum and add weight of numbers to our arguments.

#### Woodcock Hill Village Green The story continues

Part 1 Virtual Public Inquiry 24 - 18 January

By 21 March written evidence from Woodcock Hill Village Green (WHVG) committee expert rebuts all Taylor Wimpey (TW) has said regarding the required increase in biodiversity (Government Act 2018) on the replacement land in Elstree as compared to release land at Byron Ave in Borehamwood over time. TW have upped the offer to pay a new management committee (to be called Village Green Committee) from £100,000 to £350,000 to last 15 years. This is only for the replacement land if they win. Our expert believes that TW should commit for at least 30 years.

Our experts at the top of the hill challenge TW's landscape plan for the replacement and retained land by Leslie's bench. It is a landscape plan not retention or replacement of a nature reserve or local wild life site as it is now.

Our expert also challenged TW evidence that the London Loop walkers use Barnet Lane. The author of the London Loop changed his map

some years ago to encourage users to ignore the boring and unsafe route from Allum Lane via Deacons Hill Road, to walk from the station through the estate and enter WHVG by the Byron Avenue entrance. Our expert actually met three walkers doing just that during his visit.

Although the village green was not in the now shelved Hertsmere Local Plan, the site BE6 off Barnet Lane and Furzehill Rd and HEL 197, adjacent to Hartfield Avenue were proposed for building homes. WHVG will continue to monitor these proposals and the threat of a 2000 pupil secondary school by the caravan park at Barnet Lane.

#### **Aldenham Country Park**

#### Aldenham Country Park Trust Ltd

ACPT Ltd, set up to save Aldenham Country Park in 2009, was successful in getting Hertfordshire county council (HCC) to agree to set up tenders for management of the country park, excluding the reservoir.

ACPT Ltd has been working since 2011 to have all the footpath around the reservoir registered as a public right of way. Submissions by HCC & ACPT Ltd have been made to the Planning Inspectorate. The inspector will visit the site in June. Board members of ACPT Ltd are confident that this will at last be a designated footpath, thanks to the hard work of HCC officers. Thanks to all the users of the footpath who gave evidence of use twice 'as of right' between 1954 and 1974.

The future of Aldenham Reservoir has been a serious concern and now all political parties and local authorities are united in working for a positive outcome.


The work to ensure that the gates and fencing will be removed has been an ongoing effort by HCC officers. This is a great result as HCC was able to avoid an expensive court case set for April 2022. A lease was highlighted where a clause precluded any structures being erected. Thank you Caroline Clapper.

This is such good news, due to the hard work of many people behind the scenes, driven by the ACP Advisory Panel. This panel was set up over 30 years ago and was chaired by a county councillor until Aldenham Renaissance took over in 2012.

The panel: statutory bodies: HCC, officers; HBC, Lucy Selby; EBTC, Pat Strack, chair; Aldenham PC, Estelle Samuelson; and environmental groups, EBGBS, Ann Goddard and Clive Butchins; Radlett Society and Green Belt Association, Clive Glover; Aldenham Country Park Trust Ltd, Sandra Parnell; Elstree Village Preservation Society, Noman Shuker; Aldenham Renaissance, Tim Waygood and Andy Robb; Bushey Forum, Philip Nowlan and users groups; Aldenham Sailing Club, Richard Jenkins; Aldenham Angling Society, Alan Whittingham; Park Run, Simon Townsend and Aldenham CP Users Debbie Hougie. The panel meets regularly to address problems that have occurred at ACP more especially since HCC gave up the lease of the reservoir in 2015.

#### Aldenham Angling Society

Their lease was extended on 31 March for another year.

#### Aldenham Sailing Club

The club would, if the water levels were restored, seriously consider reestablishing sailing at the reservoir. If there were to be CPO or CIC there may be a way to get sailing re-established at the reservoir.

#### Aldenham Park Run

Their successful weekly event continues.

# Annual Report 2021/22



#### Mayor's summary

Summing up at the council meeting on 11 May 2022, the Town Mayor Cllr Farida Turner said "I felt especially honoured to meet the Ukrainian refugees in Borehamwood recently. I wanted them to know that they are very welcome in our town and that we will do everything we can locally to support them in this time of need, especially in helping them to communicate with family and loved ones. My chosen charity, as you know, is the Foodbank who do an amazing job in providing essential support to families in Elstree and Borehamwood. I was staggered to find out just how much they do – not just food but school uniforms and practical advice and help of all kinds. I was also fascinated to see the volunteer work at the vaccination centre in Allum Manor – the sheer scale and professionalism of that operation was beyond words".

#### **Community services**

**Hall bookings:** Fairway Hall was open for the entire municipal year with a total usage of 1,535 hours (total income of £26,866).

The council continues to produce a biannual newsletter for all plot holders and a dedicated page (Compost Corner) is published quarterly in the Town Crier magazine. The biggest achievement was the installation of a locker shed ay Stapleton Gardens funded through s.106 Developer monies.

**Planning and Consultations:** The council continued to consider planning applications referred to it by Hertsmere Borough Council as a statutory consultee. 282 were considered in total. Comments were made on 36 of these with concerns including issues of smaller unit developments failing to meet local needs for family sized homes and concerns over the high levels of retrospective applications locally.

**Site and street maintenance:** The council maintains the film plaques in Borehamwood, 56 benches and 10 notice boards. Both war memorials, St Nicholas and All Saints churchyard (and church clocks) are maintained by the grounds team. A dedicated bench to keyworkers to thank them for their work during the height of the pandemic was unveiled by the mayor adjacent to the Tesco's roundabout.

**Fireworks night:** Fireworks night returned to Meadow Park with a bang celebrating the music of James Bond films. The event was attended in a safe environment by some 5,000 residents/visitors (the only free on entry fireworks display in the local area of this size).

**Christmas switch-on display:** The Christmas lights were lit in person by EastEnders star Lorraine Stanley (playing the character of Karen Taylor in the BBC flagship show). Extra lights were installed on the trees outside of All Saints church to give a festive feel to the high street. All activities – including the ice-skating rink, Santa's grotto and live music resumed.

**Town Crier:** Four editions of the popular town magazine were published and distributed to 16,000 residents and businesses. The publication is available online and in hard copy format at the Elstree and Borehamwood railway station, library, museum and Communities First.

**Teddys trails:** This local walking book and local history guide, Teddy's Trail's, continues to popular with 251 copies being sold to date. Updates are published monthly on the council's website.

**Coach trips:** There were none (taking special account of the vulnerability of the target users of this service, i.e. senior citizens) with this much used service resuming in summer 2022.

#### Children and young people

**School swimming:** The council was delighted to supported local schools in meeting the cost of travel to The Venue swimming pool for lessons as this was a permitted activity following the end of Covid-19 restrictions.

Youth Council: The Youth Council continues to grow and has actively encouraged recruitment. It has had increased input into council decision making with representation at the Sustainable Transport Subcommittee and Neighbourhood Plan steering group. The Youth Council is planning to launch a public awareness initiative to reduce car travel locally – "Walk Under a Mile" scheme. Plans were made to launch a question time event later in the year with local MP, Oliver Dowden

and political leaders to increase civic pride and civic awareness for young people in Hertsmere.
