Compost Corner

This year's allotment open day!

During the Civic Festival every year, local residents of Elstree and Borehamwood have the opportunity to visit one of the town council's three allotment sites.

For an afternoon, interested folk are invited to come along on a guided tour to see what's growing, ask questions, meet plot holders, and see all the beautiful, quirky, and traditional, layouts of the plots, also, to gain tips and inspiration from the many different approaches.

This event gives local people a chance to find out about the highs and lows of 'growing your own', and to consider more closely whether or not this is something they might like to do.

This year, the allotment tour at Melrose Avenue allotments welcomed the Deputy Town Mayor, Councillor Clive Butchins. It's always interesting to note how flowers, fruit, and vegetables fare each year. Last year, for example, plum trees were heavily laden at a similar point in the season, whilst this year they were only just visible!

Every year is different. It seems the changes in weather patterns have affected seed and plant growth, and as said in previous Compost Corner articles, plot holders soon adapt to these challenges whether by increased use of polytunnels, hardier seed/plant varieties suited to a more Mediterranean climate, use of mulch, raised beds, and of course frequent watering... when plots are not already under water!

Undoubtedly, preparing for cultivation and managing an allotment can be hard work, but it has high rewards.

Borehamwood and Elstree Community Radio UPDATE

The steering group, Clive Butchins, Andrew Grady, Nick Male. Sandra Parnell is pleased to report progress.

Starting with producing podcasts is a way of bringing like-minded people (young and old) together and create a core group of people to start an online radio service. Working has already begun with Yavneh College and Elstree Screen Arts Academy on producing podcasts with our team Clive Glover, Bob Redman and Tom Watkins.

Hertswood Academy students will start making their own podcasts in September at the Friday Night Youth Club.

There has been an offer of two rooms for training and meeting at 96 Shenley Rd. Important negotiations for a solid base location which can grow with the project are currently in progress at two different locations. Funding for equipment has been secured from Clarion Foundation.

The group has appointed a new project manager Steve Tann who will oversee things moving forward.

That online service will be added to the Small Scale Digital Audio Broadcasting (SSDAB) system broadcasting across South Herts. This is due to start in late 2024 but may well slip into 2025. By then we would hope to have a thriving radio service for Elstree and Borehamwood with lots of enthusiastic volunteers.

We have a team of experienced enthusiasts (student radio, music radio, hospital radio 3CRand BBC) and volunteers who want to learn more ready to help.

It has been such a great end to the academic year which has created so many memories and as we look forward to 2022-2023, we say a fond farewell to our Year 6 children and wish them all the best for the next chapter of their education.

Mini Police: Year 5 have been working alongside Hertfordshire Constabulary all year on a project called Mini Police. They have studied lots of different aspects of looking after our local community and how to be a conscientious citizen. During the last session, they shared all of their hard work with Year 4 in an assembly. The children worked in small groups to present what they had learned in each session. At the end of the assembly, they were presented with a certificate to celebrate all of their hard work. Well done Year 5!



Link with QE Boys: We have been delighted with our recent partnership with QE Boys secondary school.

This term we took 8 Year 5 children to QE Boys school to participate in some English and maths challenges. There were six schools competing and one of our teams came third overall! They had to work together to solve some very tricky maths challenges and compete in a spelling bee challenge where we got to the final round. The children worked very hard and should be very proud of themselves!

The children were also invited to participate in a science themed day where they had to use forensic science techniques to solve the mystery of who had murdered the head teacher. They used microscopes to look at hair and fibre samples from the crime scene. They analysed finger prints taken from the scene and replicated blood splatters from the crime scene. Both teams then presented their findings to the other schools and successfully solved the mystery.

Sports day 2022: It was a wonderful day of different physical activities for both KS1 and KS2. For some children it was the first time they have participated in a sports day, and I must congratulate everyone for working so well in their teams. Days like today are not possible for me to achieve on my own as head of PE, so I must say a massive thank you to Miss Bowers, Mr Honour and the rest of the staff for all their support in the set up and organisation on the day. Finally, I want to thank our families and the wider community for attending and supporting our children. Massive congratulations to Orange team who were our eventual winners!

Oliver Dowden MP visit: The MP for Hertsmere visited the school in April. He was put through his paces by the school council who grilled him on a number of issues that ranged from rubbish on the local streets to the role of the prime minister. He spoke passionately about the local area and his hopes for education. He then spoke with our Chair of Governors Mrs Forrester and Mr Soyka regarding the ongoing challenges we face as a school and the education system as a whole. All in all it was a very positive experience and we thank Mr Dowden for giving us his time.



Jubilee week: It was an incredible 'off the curriculum' week at school which left quite an impression on everybody. It started with trips to Knebworth House and the Changing of the Guard in London and finished with a tremendous assembly where children shared examples of their work.

School Games Award: This term we were accredited with the Bronze Schools Games mark, which we achieved in less than 12 months. This is a tremendous achievement for our school as a whole, in what has been the first full year of sport since Covid-19. The School Games Mark is a government led awards scheme launched in 2012 to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and into the community. We at Parkside are very proud of everyone involved in helping the school achieve this wonderful goal, and we will use this as a stepping stone to achieve the Silver award next academic year.

Summer fayre 2022: In June, we held our summer fayre and it was great to see so many of our families and local community. Having been a school governor for more than 40 years, a chair for more than 10 years and a governor in ten Hertfordshire schools, this has been my experience. The schools that I know of now have brilliant governors and remarkable chairs. A senior person at Herts for Learning, who support our schools, says that the reason governors do not get paid is because what they do is priceless.

Being a governor is much more demanding now than when I first started at Homeshill Middle School, Borehamwood. The role of chair is even more demanding both in time and responsibilities. There are many wonderful opportunities as chair but also stressful situations like being involved in making staff redundant, declining staff requests for pay increases and on some occasions dealing with staff who are not up to the job. On one occasion I had to meet with an irate parent who was not happy with the format of sports day as he was angry that we did not have events that had emphasised winners and losers. A worrying job for a chair that is never ending is maintaining a viable governing body which means looking out for people who might join. The chair cannot do everything so they have to find people who can be delegated important roles such as safeguarding, special needs, pupil premium and governor training.





National Windrush Monument

An 82-year-old station assistant at Elstree & Borehamwood was a guest of honour at the unveiling of the National Windrush Monument.

Siggy Cragwell was one of a number of VIPs invited to the event at Waterloo station on 22 June with the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge also in attendance along with the Mayor of London.

Siggy was introduced to Prince William who heard how he had come to the UK from Barbados 60 years ago and worked on the railways ever since. They also talked about their shared love of cricket.

Siggy said afterwards: "It was very, very good, I was quite happy to meet Prince William and speak to him. He was a relaxing kind of guy. I've had a wonderful day."

Baroness Floella Benjamin, who is chairman of the Windrush Commemoration Committee said, "The National Windrush Memorial will be part of the British heritage and be seen by millions of people. It has created a figurative representation of the Windrush generation. It will evoke deep emotion and pride."

The monument, symbolising the Windrush generation's courage and resilience since arriving in the UK between 1948 -1971, has been designed by renowned Jamaican artist Basil Watson, as a permanent place of reflection, to foster greater understanding of the generation's talent, hard work and continuing contribution to British society.

The three figures – a man, woman, and child – dressed in their "Sunday best" are climbing a mountain of suitcases together, demonstrating the inseparable bond of the Windrush pioneers and their descendants, and the hopes and aspirations of their generation as they arrive to start new lives in the UK.

Since Siggy's railway career began 60 years ago, he has worked at Marylebone, Bedford, St Albans and Luton stations, and has been a popular figure with Thameslink at Elstree & Borehamwood since 2002.

ClIr Pat Strack, leader of the town council, laid a wreath on behalf of Maria Still in memory of her brother. Studios Rtn Nick Male remembered Bernard's father as a congregant of St Teresa's RC Church and his own father's and grandfather's Naval Service. Nicks father survived when his ship, the Hecla, was sunk during WWII. A new boat was commissioned in it's stead and was a hospital ship during the Falklands war.

Fr Dominic McKenna presided over the service with Tony Wass, Royal British Legion president, reading the Exaltation and Kohema Epitaph. Studios Rotarian, Andrew Grady sounded the two minutes silence.

Frederick (Fred) passed away peacefully on 26 June, aged 89, leaving behind his wife, Sheila, children Heather, Paul and Mark and grandchildren Matthew, Emma, Hannah, Sebastian, Amelia and Oliver. He was much loved by so many.

Fred's funeral was held on Thursday 21 July at 1.30pm in the Lady Chapel at St Albans Abbey. It was attended by family and many friends from the various organisations in which Fred was involved.

Fred was born in 1933 in Walthamstow, the eldest of three children. From the age of 11, he attended Harrow Weald Grammar School and, from there, studied physics and maths at Keele University where he met Sheila. After university he joined Armstrong Siddeley Motors Rocket Division in Coventry where he worked on propellant pumps and combustion chamber design.

When his father died prematurely in 1959, Fred made the decision to take over his father's ironmongery business and this is how he came to run Borehamwood Ironmongers in Shenley Road from April 1960. His proprietorship over many years endeared him to so many local residents. He was ever helpful to identify their needs and had an encyclopaedic knowledge of his stock. Many customers have really fond memories of him and they continue to this day. He became involved with several local organisations and was introduced to Rotary in 1965 by past president Doug Dalton. He was also a Hertsmere borough councillor for Elstree for many years, serving his community to the best of his ability.

Fred became president of the Rotary Club of Elstree and Borehamwood for the first time in 1984 and then again in 2002. When he finished his second presidency of Rotary, he was invited to join Probus and he continued to attend both organisations right up until just before his first hospital stay in March 2022. In 2018, Fred was awarded the Paul Harris Fellowship Award for services to Rotary.

Fred was also involved in the Speaking Newspaper and for many years in amateur dramatics, where he was able to display his singing ability.

His daughter, Heather, says "Dad has always been there for us and we have learnt a lot from him over the years. We have been hugely impressed with his work ethic, honesty and integrity and his commitment to public service. Our lives have been shaped by Dad's positive attitude, adventurous spirit, humour and fortitude in the face of adversity. He will be much missed and never forgotten." Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society (EBGBS) is carrying on with the campaign to save our precious threatened and diminishing Green Belt from over-development.

There is need for houses but they should be carefully planned and eco friendly with solar panels and insulation using the minimum possible green land. Elstree and Borehamwood has become so congested with traffic and consequent air pollution which impacts on the life and health of us all. We must limit building in the town with regard to the expected new housing targets which will lower the forecast number.

A current issue of concern is the eventual fate of the historic reservoir, which is still being discussed by Herts County Council, Hertsmere Borough Council and the owners. We hope it will be run by a Community Interest Company for the public with provision for the upkeep of the dam and grounds.

We are also objecting to the deregistration of Woodcock Hill Village Green, imposition of a huge solar plant along Butterfly Lane and the desecration of Tykeswater Lane [Byway 60] by offroad motor vehicles. This last should be redesignated and closed to motor traffic to preserve the footpath and the safety of pedestrians. Footpath 3 Shenley to Borehamwood promised upgrade is still held up.

We are taking an active part in the new Neighbourhood Plan discussions and liaising with other conservation bodies, local and national. Please support us by joining if you care about our countryside, at its most beautiful in these summer months.

Trailblazing on sustainable transport

The town council has established a sub-committee to deliver an agenda around sustainable transport for Borehamwood and Elstree. It includes representatives of all three tiers of local government ensuring that joinedup thinking prevails.

An action plan was swiftly established:

Cycle scheme

We provided £20,000 seed funding for the Beryl Bikes cycle hire scheme launched this September. We also ring-fenced a further grant of £38,000 contingent upon improvement of the existing cycle lane network. At the instigation of our Youth Council, cycle training will also be available in tandem with the scheme's launch.

Improvement and expansion of existing cycle lane networks

The committee assessed the existing local cycle lane network concluding that it is currently unfit for purpose due to lack of continuous cycle lanes and parts of the network having being obscured by overgrowth. We are working with the county council as part of a new 'cycling and walking plan' to ensure improvements are identified and commissioned.

Electric vehicle charging points

Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council obtained government funding to enable the town council to install two double electric vehicle charging points at Fairway Hall. As well as providing an important public resource this will enable



the council to replace our petrol van with an electric alternative.

On-demand buses

County council investment in this service currently excludes Hertsmere. We will be monitoring developments as these schemes are rolled out, making recommendations for a Hertsmere service should we be able to demonstrate need.

'Walk Under a Mile - Cycle Under Three'

Our Youth Council will be leading this important campaign. Details will be available shortly setting out how to engage with this valuable initiative.

As residential and commerical development around our town increases, the work of this committee in developing clean, sustainable transport alternatives will be increasingly important for our collective future.


Farewell to the 'Patient Assessment Centre'

Back in November 2020, access to local GP practices was severely restricted. The Herts Valleys Clinical Commissioning Group asked for permission to use part of our car park to house two large portakabins for GP consultations by appointment. Led by chair Dr. Ann Goddard, the board agreed at once.

Since then the 'hot hub' or 'Patient Assessment Centre' has been operating at near full capacity and, in the words of Dr. Nicolas Small, Chair of the HV CCG, has 'provided a valuable community service'.


