Dear residents of Elstree and Borehamwood

I hope that you all enjoyed the Christmas, Chanukah and New Year festivities wherever and whoever you celebrated them with.

I heard the winter coach trips were a great success and you all had a good time because that is why we run them for you.

All the concerts went well. The BBC Concert Band, The Elstree Mozart Players were enjoyed by a couple of hundred people, it might have been more but the snow came and the temperature was minus 5, I believe on the very night of the BBC Concert Band concert. However the ones that braved the really cold weather enjoyed themselves.

We had a Full Council meeting on 18 January and we held a minute's silence to honour Holocaust Day and all the people that died as it was the nearest day to 26 January.

We have a delegation of people from Shoham in Israel on 1 March until 5 March to sign the memorandum of our commitment to twinning the two towns. He has been the backbone of our council for nearly 12 years, but he wants to move on with his work and we thank him for being so loyal to all of us in Elstree and Borehamwood. We all wish him lots luck and happiness in his new position.

My thanks to all the officers that will be still serving all of you and all the town councillors throughout the year.

I am looking forward to the coming months and all our Town Coucillors will do their best for our residents we serve right here in our town.

Visit 'Warm Spaces' In Borehamwood

In response to the cost-of-living crisis, local groups are opening Warm Spaces across Borehamwood during the winter months. It is recognized that many are struggling, even facing a choice between heating their homes or buying food to feed their families. Warm Spaces offer somewhere that is warm, safe, free and welcoming.

The Warm Spaces programme serves as a temporary solution to help alleviate the problems people face during the cold weather. Warm Spaces offer hot drinks, along with biscuits, cakes and the opportunity to charge mobile phones and socialize with others. The scheme has been supported by the HBC Community Engagement team.

St. Michael and All Angels Church of England is located on Brook Road. The Warm Spaces grew out of their existing Welcome Café and takes place in the Church Hall on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 11:30am to 3:30pm weekly. Coffee, tea, biscuits, cakes, cuppa soups and fresh fruit are served to guests. Activities include puzzles, scrabble, keep fit, knit and natter and crafts. Lunch time talks and workshops are held with free fish and chips for all. The Christmas party and sing along were enjoyed by over 40 people. Additionally on Mondays, 11:30am - 3:30pm, St Michael's Hall also plays host to Chatter Tables Warm Spaces.

Communities 1st has opened some of its community centres as Warm Spaces and is in talks to open more. People are encouraged to drop by for free hot drinks and biscuits, board games, bowls and more.

The BECC Centre in Borehamwood is a Hertfordshire Family Support Service which is made up of public health, support for children and families, adult learning, among others. BECC also provides a Warm Spaces hub. They encourage the public to come along and keep warm, have hot drinks and charge their electronic devices. BECC Centre also provides a children's play corner. The Centre is open from 9am - 5pm from Monday to Friday. (The BECC Family Centre, off Shakespeare Drive, Furzehill Road, Borehamwood, WD6 2FD).

Borehamwood Library is at 96 Shenley Road and is part of the Warm Spaces project. Up on the first floor, guests are welcome to read books, do jigsaw puzzles and computing. On the ground floor, free coffee and tea are served, thanks to the generosity of the County Council for the funds. They are open.

We stayed open throughout the pandemic thanks to our dedicated teams and excellent hygiene practices.


I have been deeply touched by the kind words acknowledging my work and all I can say is Thank you. I have gained far more than I ever gave.

Borehamwood schoolchildren to Balmoral Drive

Over a hundred pupils at Saffron Green Primary School in Borehamwood have taken part in an art competition in which they submitted drawings and messages of hope and solidarity with the survivors of the recent fire that destroyed blocks of flats on Balmoral Drive. The fire on 12 August 2022 sadly left 21 households without their homes and possessions.

In a visually stunning tribute, the winning designs have been spraypainted onto the hoarding outside the flats by a local graffiti artist, Lee Bennion. The children's artwork has now been transformed into a 50 feet long unity mural as the flats undergo reparation work.

The paintings sprayed on to the giant mural depict two hands making a heart shape with the wording "stronger together", rainbows and flowers

alongside the phrase "If you want the rainbow, you've got to put up with the rain", a Care Bear style teddy with "we stand with you" written on his tummy and children of different backgrounds holding hands next to the slogan "we all stand together".

The idea of showing support to the fire survivors came from Saffron Green pupil, 6 year old, Ava-Mae Smith who put her hand up in a school assembly during the first week of term on Monday 12 September and asked how she and her schoolmates could help.

Ava-Mae said: "I think we should do drawings for the people that lived in that burned house because I don't like people being sad, I like people being nice and happy and cheerful. I think when they see them then they are going to think happiness and I think it's going to feel like everything is going to be ok and their house is going to be fixed soon. They can start a new life and have the same things they wanted, whatever they managed to take with them they can still start a new

At about the same time, having been in daily contact with many of the survivors who were staying in local hotels, Borehamwood Kenilworth ward Cllr Dan Ozarow was concerned about their emotional wellbeing and was thinking of ways to lift their spirits. He visited the school to discuss ideas of how to do this with the teachers. By coincidence as he left he bumped into Lee Bennion outside and the project was born. Cllr Ozarow says: "In these depressing times, this mural shines as a beacon of hope and unity for our local community. Murder, Mayhem & Mystery - A Journey Through The Dark Side


2023 opens with a brand new Exhibition.





Children, families and community groups come together to 'sow the seeds of love' for Borehamwood & Elstree Mitzvah Day



Mitzvah Day is the UK's largest faith-led day of social action. A Jewish-led celebration, over 40,000 people around the world come together to give their time, not money, to make a difference to the community around us (see mitzvahday.org.uk)

Across Borehamwood and Elstree an estimated one thousand people from faith groups, children and teachers in local schools and community groups engaged in a mass flower-planting project in the lead up to Mitzvah Day on 20 November 2022, coordinated by food poverty charity Gratitude.

Bringing children, families and people of different backgrounds together, the "Sowing the Seeds of Love" project sought to aid local biodiversity, improve the environment and counteract climate change. Volunteers performed weeding and raking of open areas of land in strategic sites in preparation for bulb-planting.

Then on Mitzvah Day itself, dozens of people including local councillors, faith leaders, headteachers of local schools, volunteers and children gathered at Borehamwood Mosque next to Maxwell Park to engage in mass planting of bulbs; including daffodils, narcissus, crocuses and other seasonal flowers.

In total, more than 3,000 bulbs were planted in an initiative that followed the success of last year's Mitzvah Day in which local schoolchildren launched the Children's Climate Emergency Manifesto and their pictures were put on display in a "Homage to Planet Earth" at Gratitude's Hub on Elstree Way.

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society

Elstree and Borehamwood Green Belt Society continues to campaign to save our precious Green Belt from destruction against increasing pressure from development.

New housing is needed but should be sited on brownfield areas if possible. The next Sky Studios developments will inevitably swallow up a large swathe of Green Belt along Rowley Lane. We have been fighting to minimise the impact on our countryside.

A possible solution to the vexed Aldenham Reservoir preservation question seems in sight. The owners, Liberty Lake Leisure, and Hertsmere Planning Committee are discussing an arrangement whereby development of the mere area as a business park will provide funding for the repair of the dam and maintenance of the lake and its surrounds might be agreed. We support this strongly as a Special Circumstance justifying use of Green Belt land, saving the reservoir which is such a valuable community asset.

We have opposed the development proposed on Woodcock Hill and its loss of Village Green Status. We also oppose the solar plant proposed for Butterfly Lane.

Tykeswater Lane, a by-way for all vehicular traffic, continues to cause problems and concerns to local residents. 4 by 4 vehicles churn up the path and make it dangerous for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders as well as disturbing the wild life.

Shenley footpath no 3 is another major cause for concern. Part of the track is used illegally by horse riders thus making the path impassable at times for pedestrians. There is an order to divert the path from its route passing through the Well End Scout Activity Centre. A new bridle path is on hold as there is one objector.

Aldenham reservoir

Plans are moving forward for Jewel of Hertsmere (formerly Liberty Lake Leisure Ltd) and Liberty Aldenham Ltd to submit a planning application on land they own on Watford Road. The land is zoned for employment by Hertsmere Borough Council.

In October members of EBGBS and local environment groups were invited to a meeting by landowner, Nitin Gosrani. His agent explained the proposals and how, if successful, money would be forthcoming, to set up a trust to manage the reservoir and its environs. The Dam Inspector reports show that the dam is a high risk and needs work urgently.


Councillors and members of environmental groups were invited to

a presentation at Fairway Hall on 9 November 2pm - 4pm. A public consultation was held at Allum Hall on 1 December 2pm - 7pm allowing residents the opportunity to talk to the agent about the proposals and receive the details

As well as EBGBS, the Elstree Preservation Society, Aldenham Country Park Trust, Aldenham Country Park Advisory Panel, Aldenham Angling Society and Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council have welcomed the attempt to reach a solution to preserve the Reservoir for public use in perpetuity.

The good news is that permission has been granted for a public footpath to be designated around the reservoir.

This year we will be joined again by Rotary District 1130 members of the Trees for Peace Group who helped plant trees in 2019.





Shoham Town Twinning

I recently accompanied our Town Clerk on a visit to Shoham, Borehamwood & Elstree's newest twin town. Located in Central Israel, Shoham shares many similarities with our area

Our visit focused upon ensuring that the new twinning arrangements deliver tangible economic, social and cultural benefits.

We were warmly welcomed at Shoham's high school where discussions with the headteacher helped identify areas for future collaboration between young people in Shoham and Borehamwood and Elstree. These will include exchange visits and regular interaction over Zoom and other internet platforms.

Some of the most exciting plans will focus on robotics, in which Shoham is an international leader. We visited the youth robotics laboratory and met with members of their international award winning young people's robotics team. This project is led entirely by local youth with support from mentors and funding from local business and the municipality. We had the opportunity to 'meet' a basketball playing robot designed by the young people that had recently won a global award.

We also visited Shoham's innovative 'community gardens': a modern variation on our more traditional allotments. The gardens are council funded, but operated entirely by volunteers from the local community. They grow a variety of produce that is distributed to local families. The gardens are highly sustainable and also provide a hub for both educational and social activities.



In meetings with local officials we discussed a proposed international football tournament involving Borehamwood's three twin towns. We were impressed by the extent to which the streets and buildings in Shoham are accessible to all. Shoham is a world leader on accessibility and trains councils around the world.

When I proposed the twinning motion last year with ClIr Parnell, I stressed that we must deliver tangible benefits for local people. I'm confident that we are on course to achieve this.

Neighbourhood Plan
Elstree and Borehamwood

Work on the Neighbourhood Plan for Elstree and Borehamwood continues. Ultimately this document will contain policies to determine how land is used locally and to help decide the outcome of planning applications in our area.

An opportunity to protect our valued green spaces - we have a unique opportunity in our Neighbourhood Plan to protect green spaces that are important to us. We can designate 'Local Green Space', which would mean that these spaces would be protected to the level of Green Belt. Not every space is suitable for designation as each one needs to meet certain criteria. For example, the space must be fairly small in size, located within the community and – importantly – must be 'demonstrably special' for one or more of the following reasons:

- Recreation the space is used for recreation, informal or formal;
- Wildlife the space is rich in biodiversity;
- **Tranquil** the space offers a spot for reflection in an otherwise urban area;
- Beauty the space is particularly attractive;
- **Historic** the space is notable from a historical perspective.

Many of your have already been nominating potential spaces, suggestions including Thirskcliffe Nature Park, Cowley Hill, and the allotments and Red Road Park.



The Beryl Bike Cycle Hire scheme is now fully operational with financial support from the Town Council. Initial usage figures indicate a strong uptake. The committee is currently focussing upon a more long term project together with the borough and county councils to



review, repair and expand the town's existing cycle highways. The committee is also supporting a Youth Council led initiative to deliver a campaign encouraging people to walk on journeys under a mile and to cycle for all journeys under three miles.
