

# Town Council relaunches saved Reel Cinema with "Spectacular" film and television exhibition

## Actress Michelle Collins opens Elstree & Borehamwood's rebranded "Reel Studio 70" cinema

A year after it was threatened with closure before Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council and Hertsmere Borough Council stepped in to save it, Borehamwood's independent local cinema has been officially relaunched with a spectacular exhibition to celebrate both its film and television heritage and its current thriving industry.

EastEnders star Michelle Collins (Cindy Beale) was invited to cut the ribbon for the refurbished cinema and exhibition launch with Town Mayor Alpha Collins, as a life-size Stormtrooper from Star Wars looked on. Invited guests from Elstree's film sector, local residents and dignitaries packed out the exhibition hall for the opening.

The exhibition is free to enter and open to the public during cinema opening times, seven days a week. It includes a striking set of information panels at the cinema entrance which recount the 110-year history of film and television at Elstree.

In the main hall a display case boasts memorabilia loaned by former film and TV industry workers and their families. These include much-loved historic artefacts dating back decades such as the actual MGM lettering from its studios' tower (from the 1960s), a crew's jacket worn by Scooter on The Muppets Show (1976), photos of King Charles' visit to Elstree Studios to open its sound stages (1999) and the model of Tower Bridge used in Paddington in Peru (2024).

Meanwhile a gallery of framed photos and film posters adorns the adjacent wall with the original George Lucas Stage plaque at Elstree Studios from the year 2000.

Finally, an isolation booth to the rear of the hall offers an immersive experience with a screen showing a series of short documentaries and video interviews with film cast, crew and directors who had filmed at Elstree such as Steven Spielberg and Stanley Kubrick. Visitors can select and watch these via interactive software which was produced by The Elstree Project under the auspices of Howard Berry, Principal Lecturer in the Film Department at University of Hertfordshire, whose students also helped with this initiative.

Relaunched as "Reel Studio 70 Borehamwood," the name evokes nostalgia for the town's historic Studio 70 cinema that was demolished in 1981 to make way for office blocks.

As part of the deal to save the independently-run cinema, aside from housing the free public exhibition, a screen and cinema theatre will be made available periodically for community use.

Councillor Dan Ozarow, Curator of the Exhibition and Deputy Mayor of Elstree & Borehamwood Town Council said: "This is an incredibly proud day for our town and this initiative has been truly communityled. Former and current film industry workers and their families, local councillors, students, TV stars and residents have all come together not only to keep Hollywood in Borehamwood, but now to encapsulate both the historic heritage and current vibrancy of our film and television sector in this spectacular exhibition."

Councillor Jeremy Newmark, Leader of Hertsmere Borough Council said: "I'm so pleased that our councils have delivered for local people, saved valuable jobs and underscored our deep seated and long term commitment to the film industry in our area."

Saving the cinema and establishing the film and television exhibition is the first stage of the Town Council's ambitious Culture and Creativity Strategy. This aims to revitalise the cultural fabric of Elstree & Borehamwood and revitalise our public space.

## **Paul Welsh**

Paul Welsh MBE (18 July 1953 - 4 September 2024) was a distinguished British film historian and a fervent advocate for the preservation of the UK's cinematic heritage. His enduring commitment to the film industry, particularly in relation to Elstree Studios, left an indelible mark on the preservation and celebration of British cinema.

Paul's passion for film history was evident through his extensive work in

documenting and promoting the legacy of Elstree Studios. He authored "Elstree Confidential," a comprehensive volume that chronicles his 50 years of encounters with stars and visits to film sets in Borehamwood's studios. This work stands as a testament to his deep connection with the film community and his dedication to preserving its history.

Beyond his literary contributions, Paul played a pivotal role in the establishment and success of the Elstree and Borehamwood Museum. As one of its founders and most steadfast supporters, he was instrumental in curating exhibitions and events that highlighted the rich film heritage of the area. His efforts ensured that the legacy of Elstree Studios and its contributions to British cinema were recognized and celebrated by both locals and visitors.

In recognition of his significant contributions to film preservation

and history, Welsh was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE). His passing on 4 September 2024 was met with profound sadness within the film community. Elstree Studios paid tribute to him, acknowledging his unwavering advocacy and the lasting impact of his work.

Paul Welsh's legacy continues to inspire film historians and enthusiasts. His life's work not only preserved the history of British cinema but also ensured that future generations could appreciate and learn from the rich tapestry of stories and achievements that define the UK's film industry.

## **Cookster: The Darkest Days**

Cookster: The Darkest Days is the highly anticipated British crime drama based on the true-life story of crime author Jason Cook. The film stars Craige Middleburg (Gassed Up), Nick Moran (Lock Stock and Two Smoking Barrels), Tracy Shaw (Coronation Street) and Indonesian actress and model Elvira Devinamira (Suami Yang Lain).

The film follows Jason's life story from 1981 to 1993 and deals with themes such as bullying, dyslexia, peer pressure and drug addiction. The film features a plethora of stellar performances, especially from British acting veterans Nick Moran and Tracy Shaw, who give a real sense of gravitas to the scenes that they are in. Craige Middleburg and Samuel Staite (Dig Me No Grave) both shine on screen as two very different Jasons from two different eras of his life, both eventually colliding head-on to the same destructive point of substance abuse.

Nick Moran said, "When Jason asked me to play his dad in a film so very personal to him, it was an honour and an obligation to help him bring his truth to his very genuine film." Tracy Shaw said, "It was great to be a part of telling Jason's life story on screen. Playing Jason's mother was an honour with the responsibility of finding true emotions to share with the audience.

This stylish, gritty and unique British gangster film is directed by Stephen Roach (The Crucifix) and was produced by prolific filmmaker Djonny Chen of Silent D Pictures in co-production with Jason Cook. The film features music by DJ Luck & MC Neat, The Midnight and Louise Browne. The film was shot on location in and around Borehamwood utilising the help of local people and businesses

# Return to Oz: A darker journey back to the emerald city



Released in 1985, Return to Oz is a follow-up to the beloved 1939 classic The Wizard of Oz. Directed by Walter Murch, the film departs from the cheerful tone of its predecessor, diving into a much darker and eerie portrayal of L. Frank Baum's Oz stories, primarily drawing inspiration from The Marvelous Land of Oz and Ozma of Oz. The film stars Fairuza Balk as a young Dorothy Gale, whose return to Oz reveals a land far removed from the colorful utopia she once knew.

The story begins with Dorothy being treated for her dreams of Oz, only to find herself transported back to a decayed and broken version of the magical land. The Yellow Brick Road is in ruins, the Emerald City lies in disarray, and her old friends are missing. A menacing new villain, the Nome King, has taken control, aided by the sinister Princess Mombi, who collects severed heads for her personal use. Return to Oz was a commercial failure upon release, with critics and audiences finding its dark themes and unsettling imagery too jarring for children. However, the film has since gained a cult following, appreciated for its unique take on the Oz mythos, impressive practical effects, and hauntingly beautiful visuals.

Though not a feel-good family film, Return to Oz stands as a bold and imaginative exploration of Baum's universe. It delves into themes of courage and resilience, offering a grittier, yet ultimately hopeful, vision of Oz that continues to captivate viewers seeking a deeper and darker fairy tale.

# Young Sherlock Holmes: A whimsical origin story

Young Sherlock Holmes, released in 1985 and directed by Barry Levinson, offers an inventive glimpse into the imagined teenage years of the legendary detective. Written by Chris Columbus, the film combines mystery, adventure, and fantasy, presenting a speculative origin story of how Sherlock Holmes and Dr. John Watson first met.

Set in Victorian England, the story begins when John Watson, a new student at Brompton Academy, befriends a precocious and observant young Sherlock Holmes. Their friendship quickly deepens as the pair stumble upon a sinister conspiracy involving a string of mysterious deaths. Each victim appears to have been driven to madness and suicide by terrifying hallucinations induced by a secret toxin. Holmes, ever the inquisitive mind, takes on the case with his characteristic wit, determination, and burgeoning deductive skills.

Young Sherlock Holmes is notable for its groundbreaking special effects, including one of the first-ever uses of fully computer-generated imagery (CGI) to create a living stained-glass knight. Though not a box office success upon release, the film was praised for its inventive storytelling, charming performances, and rich period detail. Nicholas Rowe as Sherlock Holmes and Alan Cox as Watson deliver compelling performances, capturing the youthful energy of their characters.

While not directly tied to Arthur Conan Doyle's canon, the movie has since gained a cult following for its blend of action, mystery, and heart. It remains a delightful reimagining of Holmes's early years, appealing to fans of both the detective genre and coming-of-age adventures.

## The Dam Busters (1955): A cinematic classic celebrates 70 years

The Dam Busters, directed by Michael Anderson and released in 1955, is one of the most iconic British war films. It dramatizes the true story of Operation Chastise, an ambitious World War II mission led by Royal Air Force Squadron 617 to destroy German dams and cripple industrial production in the Ruhr Valley. The film, adapted from Paul Brickhill's book The Dam Busters and Guy Gibson's memoir Enemy Coast Ahead, highlights innovation, heroism, and sacrifice.


Central to the mission was Barnes Wallis, a British engineer who developed the revolutionary "bouncing bomb." These bombs skipped across the water's surface to breach heavily defended dams. Wallis, played by Michael Redgrave, is portrayed as a dedicated and brilliant mind who faced skepticism and challenges in developing his invention. Richard Todd delivers a commanding performance as Wing Commander Guy Gibson, the leader of the daring raid.

The film's climax showcases the tense and meticulously executed bombing runs. Remarkable for its time, the special effects relied on scale models and practical techniques to depict the bomb tests and dam breaches, creating an enduring sense of realism. Eric Coates's stirring Dam Busters March further cemented the movie's place in cinematic history.

Jurassic World: Rebirth, directed by Gareth Edwards, introduces Scarlett Johansson and Mahershala Ali to the franchise. The film aims to revitalize the series with a fresh narrative and is scheduled for release on July 2, 2025.

Wicked: For Good continues the adaptation of the acclaimed musical, exploring the complex relationship between Elphaba and Glinda. The film is slated for release on November 21, 2025.

## **BICS Annual Art Competition 2024**

## **Youth Council Achievements 2024**

#### Overview

The Youth Council has enjoyed numerous and varied achievements from their work programme over last year, benefitting from the vibrant contributions of several new Youth Councillors, who already had experience of attending and supporting groups, like Luci at Herts Youth Network & Friday Night Club, and Aspen at JLGB, and who was also a panelist at 2023 Question Time event. Needless to say, every Youth Councillor deserves a big thank you for every contribution, making a real difference to the town.

It's also important to acknowledge the incredible contributions of regular adult attendee Bob Redman, 'Friend of the Youth Council', whose links with local groups such as Borehamwood and Elstree Community Radio (BECR) have given Youth Councillors an amazing opportunity to promote their activities in the wider community, and Councillor Tushar Kumar, who acts as a vital and important link between themselves and the Town Council.

## Guest speakers at Youth Council meetings

Emma Turner and Charlie Mackey from Herts County Council asked to attend to speak to YCllrs, to get views about how to engage better with young people, and for their input into a Cycling

and Walking Infrastructure Plan. Ideas were for example, to hold workshops to promote walking in green spaces, recording and putting on Facebook high street interviews.

Emma returned with Anustia Vettiuelu to feedback progress, and give another opportunity for Youth Councillors to contribute to the Walking, Wheeling, and Cycling Strategy.

John Cartledge also spoke to Youth Councillors about Teddy's Trail, a publication identifying walking routes around Hertsmere (available from EBTC). He suggested ideas they could get involved in.

At their October 2024 meeting, ClIr Dan Ozarow and Emma Petrou attended to discuss their plans for a new youth venue at Smith's Social Club offering a safe space to meet others and for expression, music, performance, games, activities, speakers etc. Youth Councillors are keen to continue to support the development of this valuable community asset.



## Representing the Youth Council at Committee and Partnership meetings

Youth Councillors attend Town Council committee meetings throughout the year, a chance to input their views and influence decision making. The Youth Council was invited to lead on Walk Under a Mile, Cycle Under 2, Scheme (WUAMS) discussed at the Sustainable Transport Sub Committee, which Amelie and Patience helped lead. Amelie was interviewed for two podcasts about the scheme with Bob for BECR.

Amelie also represented the young people of Hertsmere at a public event discussing active and sustainable transport solutions in Hertsmere, engaging with the community and sitting alongside other panelists including Transport Planning Managers, the police, a university lecturer and councillors. The Hertsmere Big Green Transport Talk was a well-attended event held in Elstree Studio's and the Youth Council had an opportunity to highlight aspects relevant to young people and our future requirements for transport in the area.

Considerable input was also made in other committees – the Youth Council's bee box initiative, and maintenance of rose planters outside the REEL Cinema are some ways Youth Councillors contribute to the work of the Environment and Planning Committee.

Youth Councillors also help grow town twinning contacts through the International Affairs Committee, subassist Council events through the Entertainment Committees, and raise concerns regarding the train station and public transport around Elstree and Borehamwood at the Transport & Community Safety Forum. The Youth Council also holds a seat on Sky Studio's Community Board.



## **Events and initiatives**

Youth Councillors have continued to participate in council run events



throughout the year, and develop their own initiatives. As well as their bee box initiative, YCllrs took on the maintenance of the planters in Centenary Place originally planted up by them in 2014, and they are now joining Rotary litter picks in the town. They have also been invited by the Borough Council to input into the re-wilding of the copse in Elstree. YCllr representatives always take part in the





moving Remembrance Sunday parade, and lay wreaths at the war memorials in Elstree, and Shenley Road.

In November last year, the Youth Council ran a 'Youth Question Time' event at the Civic Offices, which involved a panel comprised of local politicians and representatives from local groups, who answered questions from young people in the audience. The event was a resounding success, and saw passionate debate over topics such as housing, the economy and the environment – stay tuned on the YC TikTok for clips of the debates!

## Publicity and social media

Youth Councillors create their own promotional posters and leaflets (notably Sam who designed the QT Event, Bee Box Sponsorship Initiative, and Walk Under A Mile Scheme, all impressive and professional looking posters). A PowerPoint presentation was recently created by 2024 chair, Nathan, and vice-chair Sam, and there are plans to do presentations to school assemblies, youth groups and others as part of the recruitment drive.
